OBJECTIVE

To transmit a letter from the Sister City Association of Garden Grove requesting cosponsorship of the 6th annual Strawberry Stomp 5K on Saturday, May 25, 2019.

BACKGROUND

The Sister City Association of Garden Grove (Association) is a local non-profit organization that is in good standing with the Internal Revenue Service and has been serving the Garden Grove community since 1989. They are currently working with the Secretary of State to come current with the State, as they are with the Federal Government. Each year, the Association sends Garden Grove youth to our sister city, Anyang, South Korea, and also hosts their youth as part of their student exchange program. All proceeds from their fundraising efforts go directly toward sending students overseas and hosting the incoming exchange students.

DISCUSSION

The Association is requesting City Council approval for co-sponsorship of the 6th annual Strawberry Stomp 5K on Saturday, May 25, 2019.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Co-sponsorship for the 6th annual Strawberry Stomp 5K will have an impact to the City's General Fund. The cost to provide Police, Fire and Public Works staff required to support this event is approximately \$12,642. The Association has committed to reimburse the City a total amount of \$1,000 toward the City's costs, therefore the impact is reduced to an approximate amount of \$11,642. The Association is striving

to make this event self-sufficient and with continued success they hope to contribute a larger amount each year until they are able to pay the full amount for City support.

RECOMMENDATION

OBJECTIVE

To request City Council authorization for two City employees to participate in the CentralSquare 2019 national conference in San Antonio, Texas, on March 17-20, 2019.

BACKGROUND

CentralSquare Technologies came forth as an industry leader in public safety and public administration software after a merger of four public-sector-serving software companies: Superion, TriTech Software Systems (including Zuercher Technologies), and Aptean. Following the merger, CentralSquare Technologies is organizing a national conference in San Antonio, Texas, to bring together its 7,500 public sector agencies and to accelerate smarter collaboration among its customer community.

DISCUSSION

The City entered an agreement with CentralSquare Technologies (formerly Superion) for its ONESolution Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) software to replace the City's current financial and human resources software system ("PICK") on September 11, 2018. As the City prepares for implementation of ONESolution, it is invaluable to send City staff to this conference to take advantage of networking and training opportunities with similar public sector agencies.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The cost for two City employees to participate in the conference, including related travel and lodging, is approximately \$4,000. Funds for this expense will be paid from the current ERP budget.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

• Authorize City staff to participate in the CentralSquare 2019 national conference in San Antonio, Texas on March 17-20, 2019, including travel, lodging, food, and other ancillary expenses.

To secure City Council authorization to purchase 98 Microsoft Windows Server Datacenter Edition and 100 Microsoft Windows Server Licenses including three years Software Assurance in the amount of \$90,932.70 from Crayon Software Experts, LLC, pursuant to IFB No. S-1248.

BACKGROUND

The City's current data center is at near capacity. In use applications utilize 80% of current data center resources. On September 11, 2018, City Council approved an estimated \$574,000.00 budget for the acquisition of hardware/software and related licenses required to support upcoming Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) implementation. Based on this approval a formal bid process to acquire additional server licenses was completed.

DISCUSSION

Two (2) bids were received and opened on January 7, 2019. Both bids were found to be responsive. Bid results were as follows:

The ERP Capital Fund will absorb the financial impact of the purchase not to exceed \$90,932.70.

MATTERS FROM THE MAYOR, CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS, AND CITY MANAGER

Council Member Brietigam expressed support for public safety and noting false rumors, he assured that the City will be increasing police officer positions for a total of 179 sworn positions.

Council Member O'Neill commented that he hoped everyone had a nice New Year and expressed optimism for 2019. He encouraged using the Garden Grove App for reporting issues. In response to Mr. Raber's concern about RV parking without a city permit, he encouraged communication with neighbors and with the City if there is a problem, and that the City will issue citations.

Council Member T. Nguyen encouraged everyone to help make the City better and take the Park Master Plan Survey available online until February 8th. She also encouraged people to apply as a City Commissioner, and noted the deadline is tomorrow, January 9th. She noted that serving as a commissioner is a good opportunity for civic engagement and to learn about City government. She wished her best friend a Happy Birthday.

Council Member K. Nguyen announced the third annual Orange County Women's March for families and friends of all ages, scheduled on Saturday, January 19, 2019, in downtown Santa Ana. She commented that when she attended the march last year it was an amazing experience to see so many people on the street. She noted that the march will have Folklorico and Native American dancers along the route. She reiterated the deadline for applying as a commissioner and encouraged District 6 residents to contact her with their interest to serve. She also encouraged everyone to take the Park survey, stressing the importance for the Council Members to receive input from the community.

Council Member Klopfenstein announced that neighborhood meetings hosted by Community Services Department to receive community input for the Park Master Plan will be held on February 9th at Bell Intermediate School, and on February 21st at the Community Meeting Center. She reported out information from Vector Control regarding the three different types of the Aedes mosquito, which are a day-

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biting mosquito that are black and white and can lay eggs on the calcium buildup in outdoor pots that can be dormant for a year. These three types of mosquitoes are the yellow fever mosquito, Asian tiger mosquito, and Australian backyard mosquito that are capable of transmitting dengue, chikungunya, yellow fever, and Zika. She stressed the importance of best practices by dumping and draining water, covering up when outside by wearing long sleeves and long pants, and use mosquito repellent. More information is available on the Vector Control website, and there will be a PowerPoint posted online in the City Manager's Weekly Memo this week.

Council Member Bui welcomed the Pacifica High School students in the audience and commented that he is happy to see students coming to the meetings to see how the City works. He stated that in about a month he will oversee three hours of daily television programming, and offered a free spot of a half hour a week for the City to provide a forum for issues such as Vector Control and Public Safety.

City Manager Stiles announced the Boys and Girls Club of Garden Grove's upcoming annual art exhibit to be held on Thursday, January 17, 2019, at 6:00 p.m. at the Community Meeting Center.

Mayor Jones stated that he would like to honor two people: Jack Hanshaw, an esteemed member of our Garden Grove community, who was involved with development of the City in the formative years during the 1950's, 60's and 70's, passed away on Christmas Day; and Saimi Hayes, who passed away on Sunday, January 6, 2019. Saimi was a retired 34 year employee with the City who worked for the Police Department and ended her tenure with the City as a supervisor at the Senior Center. She will be remembered for her warmth and smile.

OBJECTIVE

To transmit a recommendation from the Planning Commission to approve an amendment to Planned Unit Development No. PUD-103-82 (REV. 2018) to reconstruct an existing onpremise freeway-oriented static and digital sign and increase the digital display area from 298.47 square feet to 477 square feet for Toyota Place automobile dealership, located at 9444-9670 Trask Avenue, Garden Grove, and within the subject planned unit development, subject to conditions of approval.

BACKGROUND

The subject Planned Unit Development is located at the south side of Trask Avenue, west of Brookhurst Street and consists of two automobile dealership developments: (i) Toyota Place, located on the center and eastern portion of the PUD, and (ii) Garden Grove Nissan, located on the westerly portion of the PUD, adjacent to the SR-22 Magnolia Avenue off ramp. The subject sign is located on the Toyota Place site adjacent to the SR-22 Freeway and approximately 1,225 feet, west of the center line of the Brookhurst Street on ramp to the SR-22. The site maintains a General Plan Land Use Designation of Heavy Commercial. The properties to the north, across Trask Avenue, are zoned R-1 (Singlefamily Residential) and R-3 (Multi-family Residential) and are developed with single-family homes and multi-family homes. The property to the east, across the SR-22 Brookhurst Street off ramp, is zoned PUD-110-96 and is developed with an automobile dealership (Hyundai of Garden Grove). The properties to the west, across the SR-22 Magnolia Avenue off ramp, are zoned PUD-107-96 and are developed with a two story office building and restaurants (Brodard Chateau, Mae's Café and In N Out). The site abuts the Garden Grove (22) Freeway to the south.

On September 13, 1982, the City approved Planned Unit Development No. PUD-103-82, which proposed the development of a multi-tenant automobile sales and service facility. The purpose and intent of this PUD was to establish development and design parameters for the 10.2-acre site for the development of automobile sales facilities and associated accessory uses and structures. The existing freeway-oriented sign was included as part of the PUD's original approval in 1982, and is referenced in condition of approval "S" of Planning Commission Resolution No. 3240. Since then, the PUD was amended to allow a sign height of up to 65 feet, allow digital displays, and allow increased sign copy area. In the early 2000's, the Garden Grove Agency for Community Development participated with the automobile dealers to upgrade the sign to its current state.

DISCUSSION

The proposed amendment is to reconstruct an existing on-premise freeway-oriented digital sign and increase the digital display from 298.47 square feet to 477 square feet for the Toyota Place automobile dealership. The following table reflects the proposed changes to the sign:

As indicated above, the proposed amendment will reduce the height of the sign by 10 feet, reduce the overall display by 142 square feet, increase the digital display area by 178 square feet, improve the lighting technology, and remove other nearby dealerships' business identification from the sign. The automobile dealerships displayed on the sign do not wish to participate in the upgrade of the sign and have agreed to relinquish their display rights to Toyota Place. As such, this Amendment has been initiated solely by Toyota Place for the modification and upgrade to the freeway-oriented digital sign.

The proposed amendment would establish new development standards and conditions of approval governing the sign, as follows:

- 1. The existing freeway-oriented digital auto center identification sign may be replaced with a 55-foot high on-premise freeway-oriented electronic reader board sign that is substantially consistent with the approved set of plans submitted with the request for approval of PUD-103-82 (REV. 2018), except as modified herein. The sign shall not be operated as a billboard.
- 2. The maximum height of the on-premise freeway-oriented electronic

readerboard sign shall be 55 feet, measured from grade to top of sign. The maximum overall display area of the sign shall be 688.75 square feet. Minor modifications to the sign design determined to be in substantial conformance to the approved set of plans may be reviewed and approved by the Community and Economic Development Director or his/her designee.

- 3. The sign illumination, including the LED screen, shall be dimmed at dusk and shall not cause light and glare on adjacent residential properties, streets, and freeway right-of-way. Maximum output of light during nighttime hours shall be at a level between 5 and 15 percent, subject to approval of the City Manager or his designee. In no case shall the nighttime light level of the sign exceed 15 percent. The digital display may not change copy between the hours of 12:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m. in order to reduce light and annoyance impacts to the adjacent residential neighborhoods. During all other times, the images on the reader board shall be maintained at minimum 8-second intervals and shall not change more frequently. The face of the reader board sign shall be angled so that both sign faces are directed in-line with the Garden Grove Freeway right-of-way.
- 4. The on-premise freeway-oriented electronic reader board sign shall comply with the CalTrans standards for lighted and readerboard signs that are adjacent to the freeway right-of-way.
- 5. The applicant shall allow the advertising of community events, as approved by the City Manager. Said advertising shall not exceed ten (10) percent of the overall advertising time the readerboard is changing copy.

The proposed amendment and new sign will result in improvement to the site and reduce potential off-site impacts related to light and glare. Additionally, the reduction in number of displays on the sign will enhance the visual appeal of the sign and the improved digital technology will create a safer, more sophisticated business sign for the automobile dealership. Since overall sign height and sign area are being reduced, and new digital technology is being used that will automatically adjust the digital lighting intensity in response to ambient conditions, there will be a reduced impact to nearby residential properties and increased safety for vehicles traveling in the vicinity of the sign. The public interest, health, and welfare are further served by the new requirements that the lighting of the sign be directed and shielded so as not to cause light and glare on any adjacent residential properties, that the sign comply with the requirements of CalTrans for lighted signs adjacent to freeways, and that advertising of community events be allowed.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no fiscal impact to the City regarding this proposed amendment.

City Attorney Summary

This Ordinance amends the provisions of Planned Unit Development No. PUD-103-82 to establish new development standards and conditions of approval for an on-premise freeway-oriented electronic reader board sign for the Toyota Place automobile dealership to be constructed in place of the existing freeway-oriented digital auto center identification sign. The Toyota Place automobile dealership is located on the south side of Trask Avenue west of Brookhurst Street at 9444 and 9670 Trask Avenue and includes Assessor's Parcel Nos. 098-090-49, 098-090-63 and 098-090-64. The subject sign is located adjacent to the Garden Grove Freeway on the parcel identified as Assessor's Parcel No. 098-090-63. Pursuant to the amendment, the digital display area of the sign will be increased by 178 square feet, but the maximum height of the sign will be reduced by 10 feet, and the overall sign display area will be reduced by 142 square feet.

Additionally, the updated development standards and conditions of approval require that the lighting of the sign be directed and shielded so as not to cause light and glare on any adjacent residential properties, that the sign comply with the requirements of CalTrans for lighted signs adjacent to freeways, and that advertising of community events be allowed.

PUD-103-82 (REV. 2018), AMENDING PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT NO. PUD-103-82 TO ALLOW FOR RECONSTRUCTION OF AN EXISTING ON-PREMISE FREEWAY-ORIENTED DIGITAL SIGN FOR THE TOYOTA PLACE AUTOMOBILE DEALERSHIP ON PROPERTY LOCATED AT 9444 TRASK AVENUE, ASSESSOR'S PARCEL NO. 098-090-63.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Planning Commission of the City of Garden Grove, in regular session assembled on December 6, 2018, does hereby recommend City Council approval of an Amendment (PUD-103-82 (REV. 2018)) to the Planned Unit Development No. PUD-103-82 to allow for reconstruction of an existing on-premise freeway-oriented digital sign for the Toyota Place automobile dealership located at 9444-9670 Trask Avenue., Parcel Nos. 098-090-49, 098-090-63, and 098-090-64.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED in the matter of Planned Unit Development No. PUD-103-82 (REV. 2018), the Planning Commission of the City of Garden Grove does hereby report as follows:

- 1. The subject case was initiated by Electra-Media Inc. (EMI) represented by Ariana Diverio, on behalf of the property owner, CAR NOA GGT, LLC (Toyota Place).
- 2. The applicant requests approval of an amendment to the provisions of Planned Unit Development No. PUD-103-82 to establish new development standards and conditions of approval to facilitate the reconstruction of an existing on-premise freeway-oriented digital sign for Toyota Place automobile dealership. The Toyota Place automobile dealership is located on the south side of Trask Avenue, west of Brookhurst Street, at 9444 and 9670 Trask Avenue and includes Assessor's Parcel Nos. 098-090-49, 098-090-63, and 098-090-64. The subject sign is located adjacent to the Garden Grove Freeway on the parcel identified as Assessor's Parcel No. 098-090-63. Pursuant to the proposed amendment, the digital display area of the sign will be increased by 178 square feet, but the maximum height of the sign will be reduced by 10 feet, and the overall sign display area will be reduced by 142 square feet.
- 3. The subject site has a General Plan Land Use Designation of Heavy Commercial and is zoned Planned Unit Development No. PUD-103-82.
- 4. The proposed PUD amendment is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") (Public Resources Code Section 21000 et. seq.) pursuant to Article 19, Section 15311 and Article 5, Section 15061 of the CEQA Guidelines (California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Section 15000 et seq.)

- 5. Existing land use, zoning, and General Plan Land Use designation of the areas included in this Amendment and in their vicinity have been reviewed.
- 6. Report submitted by City staff was reviewed.
- 7. Pursuant to a legal notice, a public hearing was held on December 6, 2018, and all interested persons were given an opportunity to be heard.
- 8. The Planning Commission gave due and careful consideration to the matter during its meeting of December 6, 2018; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, FOUND AND DETERMINED that the facts and reasons supporting the conclusion of the Planning Commission, as required under Municipal Code Section 9.32.030, are as follows:

FACTS:

The subject Planned Unit Development (PUD-103-82) is located at the south side of Trask Avenue, west of Brookhurst Street, and consists of two automobile dealership developments: (i) Toyota Place, located on the center and eastern portion of the PUD, and (ii) Garden Grove Nissan, located on the westerly portion of the PUD, adjacent to the SR-22 Magnolia Avenue off ramp. The subject sign is located on the Toyota Place site adjacent to the SR 22 Freeway and approximately 1,225 feet west of the centerline of the Brookhurst Street on ramp to the SR-22. The site maintains a General Plan Land Use Designation of Heavy Commercial. The properties to the north, across Trask Avenue, are zoned R-1 (Single-family Residential) and R-3 (Multi-family Residential) and are developed with single-family homes and multifamily homes. The property to the east, across the SR-22 Brookhurst Street off ramp, is zoned PUD-110-96 and is developed with an automobile dealership (Hyundai of Garden Grove). The properties to the west, across the SR-22 Magnolia Avenue off ramp, are zoned PUD-107-96 and are developed with a two-story office building and restaurants. The site abuts the Garden Grove (22) Freeway to the south.

On September 13, 1982, the City approved Planned Unit Development No. PUD-103-82, which proposed the development of a multi-tenant automobile sales and service facility. The purpose and intent of this PUD was to establish development and design parameters for the 10.2-acre site for the development of automobile sales facilities and associated accessory uses and structures. The existing freeway-oriented auto center identification sign on the site was included as part of the PUD's original approval in 1982, and is referenced in condition of approval "S" of Planning Commission Resolution No. 3240. The sign was subsequently upgraded to its current state pursuant to subsequent amendments allowing increased height, digital displays, and increased sign copy area. The

existing sign is currently 65 feet in height, and consists of seven (7) static displays and one (1) digital display totaling 830.91 square feet in area. The digital display area is currently 298.47 square feet.

The applicant is proposing that the provisions governing the PUD be amended to allow the reconstruction and replacement of the existing sign with a 55 foot onpremise freeway-oriented digital sign consisting of two (2) static displays and one (1) digital display totaling 688.75 square feet in area, with the digital display area being 477 square feet. The existing displays identifying other businesses would be removed, and the sign would include upgraded digital technology that will automatically adjust the digital lighting intensity in response to ambient conditions, resulting in reduced light and glare impacts. The proposed amendment includes development standards and conditions of approval intended to minimize the visual and aesthetic impact of the sign.

FINDINGS AND REASONS:

- 1. The Amendment is internally consistent with the goals, policies, and elements of the General Plan. The subject site has a General Plan Land Use Designation of Heavy Commercial. Auto dealerships and associated signs are consistent with the Heavy Commercial General Plan Land Use Designation, which is intended to provide a variety of more intensive commercial uses, including automotive sales uses. The proposed amendment is also consistent with Goal LU-5 of the General Plan's Land Use Element, which encourages economically viable, vital, and attractive commercial centers throughout the City, in that it will help enable the commercial uses on the subject site to remain commercially viable through the use of updated visible and effective signage. Reducing the height of the sign by 10 feet, reducing the overall display by 142 square feet, increasing the digital display area by 178 square feet, and removing other nearby dealerships' business identification from the sign within the subject Planned Unit Development is also consistent with Policy LU-6.6 of the Land Use Element, which seeks to ensure that appropriate and compatible signage is provided within commercial centers. The improvement to the lighting technology and conditions of approval related to sign lighting intensity will also ensure there is an enhanced degree of compatibility between the proposed use and surrounding properties.
- 2. The Amendment will promote the public interest, health, and welfare. The modifications to the sign will result in improvement to the site and reduce potential off-site impacts related to light and glare. Additionally, the reduction in number of displays on the sign will enhance the visual appeal of the sign and the improved digital technology will create a safer business sign for the automobile dealership. Since overall sign height and sign area are being reduced, and new digital technology is being used that will automatically adjust the digital lighting intensity in response to ambient conditions, there will be a reduced impact to nearby residential properties and increased safety for vehicles traveling in the

vicinity of the sign. Additionally, the updated development standards and conditions of approval require that the lighting of the sign be directed and shielded so as not to cause light and glare on any adjacent residential properties, that the sign comply with the requirements of CalTrans for lighted signs adjacent to freeways, and that advertising of community events be allowed. The new sign will result in improvement to the site and reduce any potential off-site impacts relate to light and glare. Additionally, the reduction in number of displays on the sign will enhance the visual appeal of the sign and the improved digital technology will create a safer, more sophisticated business sign for the automobile dealership. Adherence to the new development standards and conditions of approval will ensure the public interest, health, safety, and welfare.

INCORPORATION OF FACTS AND FINDINGS SET FORTH IN STAFF REPORT

In addition to the foregoing, the Planning Commission incorporates herein by this reference, the facts and findings set forth in the staff report.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Planning Commission does conclude:

- 1. The Amendment possesses characteristics that would indicate justification of the request in accordance with Municipal Code Section 9.32.030.
- 2. The Planning Commission recommends that the City Council approve Planned Unit Development No. PUD-103-82 (REV. 2018) and adopt the draft Ordinance attached hereto as Exhibit "A".

OBJECTIVE

To present for introduction and first reading an ordinance revising Chapter 8.48 of the Municipal Code to comply with SB 946 relating to sidewalk vendors, and to update the City's regulations pertaining to vending on the public right-of-way.

BACKGROUND

On September 17, 2018, Governor Brown signed Senate Bill ("SB") 946, adding Chapter 6.2 (commencing with Section 51036) to Part 1 of Division 1 of Title 5 of the California Government Code, relating to sidewalk vendors. Pursuant to SB 946, municipalities are prohibited from banning sidewalk vending within their jurisdictional boundaries – including within local parks, but may adopt a program to regulate sidewalk vendors to the extent permitted by the bill. Additionally, SB 946 decriminalizes street vending, making violations of any local regulatory program punishable only by administrative citation.

DISCUSSION

The proposed ordinance updates Chapter 8.48 of the Municipal Code to update the City's regulations of food vending from roaming motor vehicles (e.g. ice cream trucks) and to establish a program to regulate sidewalk vendors in the City to the maxim extent permissible under SB 946. Consistent with the bill, sidewalk vendors would be required to annually obtain a permit from the City prior to selling food or merchandise on the City's sidewalks. Sidewalk vending without a valid permit would be punishable by administrative fines ranging from \$250 to \$1,000 as prescribed by statute.

Sidewalk vendors would be required to comply with operational requirements, which are necessary to protect the public health, safety, and welfare, including without limitation:

- Sidewalk vendors can only operate on sidewalks and on no other portion of the public right-of-way (such as medians or any other portions of the streets).
- Sidewalk vendors shall maintain a clean and trash-free 10-foot radius around their vending area.
- No sidewalk vendor shall operate (1) within 5 feet of a marked crosswalk, a fire hydrant or fire call box, or a driveway; (2) within a marked bus zone, or within 40 feet of a sign designating a bus stop; (3) within 18 inches from the edge of the curb; (4) within the immediate vicinity of a certified farmers' market or a swap meet; or (5) within 500 feet of any area designated for a temporary special permit or their parking areas (e.g., Strawberry Festival).
- Stationary sidewalk vendors (i.e., vendors operating from a fixed location) are prohibited in all residential zones. Roaming sidewalk vendors are permitted in residential zones between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
- Sidewalk vending is prohibited within 500 feet of a school site between the hours of 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. when school is in session or during graduation ceremonies.

A violation of the foregoing requirements would be punishable by administrative fines ranging from \$100 to \$500 as prescribed by statute. Unregulated sidewalk vending has the potential to create traffic hazards, obstruct sidewalks, generate litter, interfere with use and enjoyment of City parks, produce noise in residential neighborhoods during hours of rest, and impede students' access and safe routes to school sites.

Adoption of the proposed ordinance will mitigate potential adverse impacts stemming from sidewalk vending and further preserve the public safety, health, and welfare of the community.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

None. The Ordinance provides that fees to defray the costs of processing permits shall be adopted by City Council resolution.

MUNICIPAL CODE PERTAINING TO VENDING ON THE PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY AND
REGULATING SIDEWALK VENDORS

City Attorney Summary

This Ordinance revises Chapter 8.48 (Vending on Public Right-of-Way) of the Garden Grove Municipal Code to update the City's vending regulations and comply with Senate Bill 946 pertaining to sidewalk vendors. The Ordinance establishes new licensing and permitting requirements for sidewalk vendors in compliance with the new State regulations enacted in 2018.

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 946 (an act to add Chapter 6.2, commencing with Section 51036, to Part 1 of Division 1 of Title 5 of the Government Code) establishes requirements for local regulation of sidewalk vendors;

WHEREAS, the City seeks to implement sidewalk vending regulations to provide a licensing and permitting process and impose operational requirements for sidewalk vendors in the City to comply with SB 946 and protect the health, safety, and welfare of the community; and

WHEREAS, the City finds that the regulations set forth herein are directly related to objective health, safety, and welfare concerns.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1:</u> The foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein.

<u>SECTION 2</u>: Chapter 8.48 of Title 8 of the Garden Grove Municipal Code is hereby amended in its entirety to read as follows:

Section 8.48.010 Purpose

The purpose of this chapter is to establish a program to regulate vending in the public right-of-way in accordance with state law. The reasonable time, place and manner regulations set forth in this chapter are necessary to protect the public health, safety and welfare by, among other things, minimizing potential conflicts between motor vehicles and pedestrians and vendors in the public right-of-way, ensuring unobstructed pedestrian travel on City sidewalks and safe and unfettered access to school sites, and limiting the potential for noise and disruption in residential zones. Furthermore, regulations are necessary to prevent unsanitary conditions, and to ensure trash and debris in the areas vending is taking place are removed by vendors.

Section 8.48.020 Definitions

The following terms used in this chapter shall have the meaning indicated below:

"Certified farmers' market" means a location operated in accordance with Chapter 10.5 (commencing with Section 47000) of Division 17 of the Food and Agricultural Code and any regulations adopted pursuant to that chapter.

"Food" means any type of edible substance or beverage intended primarily for consumption by human beings.

"Immediate vicinity" means within five hundred (500) feet.

"Merchandise" means small and easily carried or worn items that are not food, including but not limited to, souvenirs, toys, articles of clothing, flowers, etc.

"Public right-of-way" means the area dedicated to public use for street or pedestrian purposes, including privately owned and maintained roads within the city that are generally held open to the public for purposes of vehicular and pedestrian traffic and includes alleys, driveways, highways, medians, parkways, planter strips, roads, sidewalks, and streets.

"Roaming sidewalk vendor" means a sidewalk vendor who moves from place to place and stops only to complete a transaction.

"School" means any public or private educational institution which is run by the state or a subdivision thereof or which is licensed by the state to offer pre-school,

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elementary or secondary academic instruction, including kindergartens, elementary schools, middle or junior high schools, and high schools.

"Sidewalk" means that portion of the public right-of-way provided for the primary use of pedestrians along or adjacent to the street, including a public pathway provided for the primary use of pedestrians.

"Sidewalk vendor" means a person who sells food or merchandise from a pushcart, stand, display, pedal-driven cart, wagon, showcase, rack, or other nonmotorized conveyance, or from one's person, upon a sidewalk or other pedestrian path. This definition includes "roaming sidewalk vendor" and "stationary sidewalk vendor."

"Stationary sidewalk vendor" means a sidewalk vendor who vends from a fixed location.

"Swap meet" means a location operated in accordance with Article 6 (commencing with Section 21660) of Chapter 9 of Division 8 of the Business and Professions Code, and any regulations adopted pursuant to that article.

"Temporary special permit" means a permit issued by the City for the temporary use of, or encroachment on, the sidewalk or other public area, including, but not limited to, an encroachment permit, special event permit, or temporary event permit, for purposes including, but not limited to, filming, parades, athletic events, public assemblies, carnivals, festivals, and outdoor concerts.

"Vend, vends, or vending" means to sell, offer for sale, expose or display for sale, solicit offers to purchase, or to barter food or merchandise, or to require someone to negotiate, establish, or pay a fee before providing food or merchandise, even if characterized as a donation.

Section 8.48.030 Vehicular Food Vending (Food Trucks)

Vending of prepared food products from stationary motor vehicles is only permitted pursuant to Title 9 (Land Use) and Chapter 6.16 of this Code. Vending of prepared food products from roaming motor vehicles is permitted on the public right-of-way in compliance with Chapter 6.16 (Food Handling) of this Code and Vehicle Code Section 22455, subject to the following additional requirements:

- A. The time between stopping the vehicle to dispense any item of food and the time the vehicle leaves the location shall not exceed 10 minutes;
- B. The vehicle must move at least 500 feet between each stop;
- C. The parked location of the vehicle must be at least 100 feet from an intersection to minimize impacts on traffic flow and the potential obstruction of sight lines and observation.

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- D. The opening of the vehicle from which sales are made must face the sidewalk or such other direction so that customers are not required to stand in the vehicular right-of-way.
- E. No vending from motor vehicles is permitted within 1000 feet from any school while children are going to or leaving such school during school opening or closing hours, or during the noon or lunch-time recess period.

Section 8.48.040 Vending on Sidewalks

- A. A sidewalk vendor shall only operate on sidewalks and no other portion of the public right-of-way.
- B. No sidewalk vendor shall sell food on any portion of the sidewalk without first obtaining the following:
 - 1. A business license pursuant to Chapter 5.01 and 5.02 of this Code.
 - 2. A sidewalk vending permit pursuant to Section 8.48.080 of this Chapter.
 - 3. A Health Department permit pursuant to Chapter 6.16 of this Code.
 - 4. Such other permits as may be required by State or local law, such as a secondhand dealer permit under Chapter 5.38 of this Code for the sale of secondhand goods.
- C. No sidewalk vendor shall sell merchandise on any portion of the sidewalk without first obtaining the following:
 - 1. A business license pursuant to chapters 5.01 and 5.02 of this Code.
 - 2. A sidewalk vending permit pursuant to Section 8.48.080 of this Chapter.
- D. At all times, a sidewalk vendor shall be in possession of a valid identification, business license, sidewalk vending permit, and Health Department permit, if applicable.
- E. A sidewalk vendor shall maintain a clean and trash-free 10-foot radius around his or her pushcart, stand, display, pedal-driven cart, wagon, showcase, rack, or other nonmotorized conveyance during hours of operation.
- F. No pushcart, stand, display, pedal-driven cart, wagon, showcase, rack, or other nonmotorized conveyance shall be chained or fastened to any pole, sign, tree, or other object in the public right-of-way or left unattended.

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- G. For public safety reasons, including pedestrian and vendor safety, a sidewalk vendor shall not operate in the following locations:
 - 1. Within 50 feet of the roadway of any freeway on-ramp or off-ramp.
 - 2. Within 5 feet of a marked crosswalk.
 - 3. Within 5 feet of any fire hydrant or fire call box.
 - 4. Within 5 feet ahead and 45 feet to the rear of a sign designating a bus stop.
 - 5. Within a marked bus zone.
 - 6. Within 10 feet of a transit shelter.
 - 7. Within 5 feet of a driveway.
 - 8. Within 18 inches from the edge of the curb.
 - 9. Where placement impedes the flow of pedestrian traffic by reducing the clear space to less than 4 feet or as necessary to comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act.
 - 10. Where placement impedes access to or the use of abutting property, including, but not limited to, residences and places of businesses. This requirement is intended to preserve emergency access for the Police, Fire Department, or medical personnel.
- H. No sidewalk vendor shall willfully make, continue, or cause to be made or continued, any loud, unnecessary, or unusual noise that disturbs the peace or quiet of any neighborhood, or that causes discomfort or annoyance to any person of normal sensitivities, subject to the standards established in Section 8.47.050 of this Code.

Section 8.48.050 Vending in City Parks

In addition to the requirements set forth in Section 8.48.030 herein, no sidewalk vendor shall sell food or merchandise in any park owned or operated by the City, except as provided by this Section, subject to the following requirements:

A. No stationary sidewalk vendor shall sell food or merchandise in a park if the operator of the park has signed an agreement for concessions that exclusively permits the sale of food or merchandise by the concessionaire.

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- B. No sidewalk vendor shall sell food or merchandise in a park when the park has been designated for a temporary special permit issued by the City, including nearby parking lots used to accommodate the event. A prohibition of sidewalk vendors pursuant to this Section shall only be effective for the limited duration of the temporary special permit.
- C. A sidewalk vendor shall be restricted to operating within the posted hours of the park.

Section 8.48.060 Vending in Residential Areas

In addition to the requirements set forth in Section 8.48.030 herein, the following restrictions shall apply to sidewalk vendors in residential zones:

- A. Stationary sidewalk vendors are prohibited.
- B. A roaming sidewalk vendor shall move from place to place and stop only to complete a transaction.
- C. A sidewalk vendor shall be restricted to operating within the limited hours of 8:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Section 8.48.070 Vending Near Schools

In addition to the requirements set forth in Section 8.48.030, no sidewalk vendor shall operate within 500 feet of any school property from 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. when school is in session or during graduation ceremonies.

Section 8.48.080 Sidewalk Vending Permits

- A. Application. To obtain or renew a Sidewalk Vending Permit, a sidewalk vendor must provide the following as part of their application:
 - 1. Valid California Driver's License or Identification.
 - 2. The name, address, and telephone number of the applicant.
 - 3. Whether the applicant intends to operate as a stationary or a roaming sidewalk vendor.
 - 4. The expiration date of the applicant's City business license.
 - 5. Proof of a valid County health permit for prepared food products for vending.

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- 6. Proof of a valid State Department of Tax and Free Administration Seller's Permit and additional licenses from State or local agencies to the extent required by law.
- 7. A description of the food or merchandise offered for sale or exchange.
- 8. Payment of an application or renewal fee, which shall be established by resolution of the City Council to defray the costs of processing the application for, or renewal of, a permit.
- 9. A certification by the sidewalk vendor that to his or her knowledge and belief, the information contained on the form is true.
- 10. If the sidewalk vendor is an agent of an individual, company, partnership, or corporation, the name and business address of the principal.
- 11. Such other information deemed necessary by the City Manager or designee.
- B. Expiration. Permits shall expire one year after the date of issuance.
- C. Transfer of Permit. Permits are not transferable.
- D. Renewal of Permit After Revocation. A person whose permit is revoked may not renew their permit for one year from the date it is revoked.

Section 8.48.090 Prohibition of Vending During Farmers' Markets, Swap Meets and Special Events

- A. No sidewalk vendor shall operate in areas located within the immediate vicinity of a permitted certified farmers' market or a permitted swap meet, including nearby parking lots used to accommodate the event, during the limited operating hours of that certified farmers' market or swap meet.
- B. No sidewalk vendor shall operate in areas located within the immediate vicinity of an area designated for a temporary special permit issued by the City, including nearby parking lots used to accommodate the event, during the limited duration of the temporary special permit.

Section 8.48.100 Violations

A person found in violation of this chapter shall be subject to the following:

A. Operating without a valid sidewalk vending permit:

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- 1. An administrative fine not exceeding two hundred fifty dollars (\$250) for a first violation.
- 2. An administrative fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) for a second violation within one year of the first violation.
- 3. An administrative fine not exceeding one thousand dollars (\$1,000) for each additional violation within one year of the first violation.
- 4. The administrative fines listed in paragraph (A) may be reduced from \$250 to \$100, \$500 to \$200, and \$1,000 to \$500 upon submission of proof of a sidewalk vending permit before such fines are due.
- B. Operating as a sidewalk vendor in violation of this chapter, other than the failure to possess a valid sidewalk vending permit:
 - 1. An administrative fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100) for a first violation.
 - 2. An administrative fine not exceeding two hundred dollars (\$200) for a second violation within one year of the first violation.
 - 3. An administrative fine not exceeding five hundred dollars (\$500) for each additional violation within one year of the first violation.
 - 4. The city manager, or designee, may rescind a sidewalk vending permit issued to a sidewalk vendor for the term of that permit upon the fourth violation or subsequent violations.
- C. A sidewalk vendor may contest an administrative fine or the rescission of a sidewalk vending permit pursuant to the provisions set forth in Sections 1.22.030 through 1.22.060 and Section 1.22.080 under this Code.
- D. A sidewalk vendor who has been issued an administrative fine under this Chapter may request a determination of his or her ability to pay the administrative fine pursuant to the provisions of Government Code Section 51039(f). If the sidewalk vendor shows proof to the satisfaction of the hearing officer (if the request is made at the time of an administrative appeal hearing), or the City Manager or his or her designee (if the request is made at any other time), that he or she meets the criteria set forth in Government Code Section 68632, subsections (a) or (b), the fine amount shall be reduced to 20 percent of the original fine amount.
- E. Violations of the regulations of this Chapter not specifically applicable to sidewalk vending and sidewalk vendors and Section 51039 of the Government Code shall be subject to criminal or civil enforcement pursuant to Chapter 1.04

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and/or 1.22 of this Code, in addition to any other applicable penalties or remedies prescribed by law.

SECTION 3: If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, words or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

<u>SECTION 4</u>: The Mayor shall sign and the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same, or the summary thereof, to be published and posted pursuant to the provisions of law and this Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after adoption.

OBJECTIVE

To present for introduction and first reading of an ordinance implementing a construction and demolition waste recycling program consistent with the California Green Building Standards Code and Waste Management Act recycling requirements.

BACKGROUND

On January 1, 2011, the California Green Building Code (Part 11 of Title 24, California Code of Regulations) known as the CALGreen, became effective and mandated 50 percent of construction and demolition material to be diverted from landfills. The California Building Standards Commission adopts new and/or updated standard construction codes every three years. In 2016, CALGreen was revised by the California Building Standards Commission, effective on January 1, 2017, which increased the construction and material diversion requirements from 50 percent to 65 percent. It is expected that the 2019 CalGreen (which will become effective in 2020) will raise the diversion requirement to 75%.

In addition, the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (California Public Resources Code Sections 40000 et seq.) (Assembly Bill 939) requires local municipalities to prepare, adopt and implement source reduction and recycling plans to reach landfill diversion goals and to make substantial reductions in the volume of waste materials going to landfills.

DISCUSSION

The City has adopted the CALGreen through the triennial adoption of the California Building Standard Codes (GGMC § 18.04.010). The City is implementing the CALGreen through the regular building permit processing process. However, the CALGreen provides limited enforcement authority. The proposed construction and demolition waste recycling program provides more clarity for City staff, contractors and property owners as to specific recycling requirements. The program includes a requirement for security deposits, diversion plans and diversion reporting, that will assist the City in monitoring and obtaining compliance. This program will further assist the City in demonstrating its compliance with Waste Management Act diversion requirements. In anticipation of additional revisions to the State's regulations expected to increase the diversion requirement to 75%, the proposed ordinance will require the diversion "as set forth by State law and regulations."

FINANCIAL IMPACT

None. The program will include the implementation of a fee to defray the costs of managing it.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE ADDING CHAPTER 18.60 TO TITLE 18 OF THE GARDEN GROVE MUNICIPAL CODE IMPLEMENTING A CONSTRUCTION AND DEMOLITION WASTE RECYCLING PROGRAM

City Attorney Summary

This Ordinance adopts regulations implementing a construction and demolition waste recycling program consistent with waste reduction requirements of the California Green Building Standards Code and the Waste Management Act of 1989.

WHEREAS, the California Waste Management Act of 1989 (California Public Resources Code Sections 40000 et seq.) requires the City of Garden Grove to prepare, adopt and implement source reduction and recycling plans to reach landfill diversion goals, and is required to make substantial reductions in the volume of waste materials going to landfills, or face fines up to \$10,000 per day;

WHEREAS, the California Green Building Standards Code (Part 11 of Title 24, California Code of Regulations) known as CALGreen became mandatory on January 1, 2011, concurrent with other parts of the 2010 California Building Standards Code (Title 24) and mandated 50% diversion of construction and demolition material;

WHEREAS, every three years the California Building Standards Commission adopts new and/or updated standard construction codes;

WHEREAS, the 2016 CALGreen went into effect on January 1, 2017, and increased the construction and demolition material diversion requirement to 65% for the majority of demolition and construction projects; and

WHEREAS, the City Council adopts this ordinance to implement a Construction and Demolition Waste Recycling Program consistent with CALGreen and Waste Management Act of 1989 requirements.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE DOES HEREBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1:</u> Chapter 18.60 is hereby added to Title 18 of the Garden Grove Municipal Code to read as follows:

CHAPTER 18.60

CONSTRUCTION AND DEMOLITION WASTE RECYCLING PROGRAM

18.60.010 Declaration of purpose.

The purpose of this chapter is to promote the recycling of Construction and Demolition Waste to reduce the amount of such material that is landfilled, to protect the public health, safety, and welfare, and to assist the City and the Garden Grove Sanitary District in meeting State of California mandated Construction and Demolition Waste diversion requirements.

18.60.020 Definitions.

"Applicant" means any individual, firm, limited liability company, association, partnership, political subdivision, government agency, municipality, industry, public or private corporation, or any other entity whatsoever who applies to the city for the applicable permits to undertake any construction, demolition, or renovation project within the city.

"C&D Compliance Official" means the person designated by the City Manager who is authorized and responsible for implementing this chapter.

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"Construction" means the building, rehabilitation, remodeling, renovation or repair of any facility or structure or any portion thereof including any tenant improvements to an existing facility or structure.

"Construction and Demolition Waste" means used or discarded materials which results from the Construction or Demolition of any facility or structure and which is removed from the premises during the Construction or Demolition.

"Construction and Demolition Waste Recycling and Disposal Report Summary" means a completed form submitted by an Applicant for any Covered Project approved by the city documenting the Applicant's compliance with the requirements of this chapter. The form is submitted after completion of demolition and/or construction of a project.

"Covered Project" has the meaning set forth in Section 18.60.050(A).

"Demolition" means the decimating, razing, ruining, tearing down or wrecking of any facility, structure, pavement or building, whether in whole or in part, whether interior or exterior.

"Diversion Requirement" means the percentage of Construction and Demolition Waste for each Demolition and/or Construction Project that must be diverted from landfills.

"Divert" means to use material for any purpose other than disposal in a landfill or a transformation facility.

"Project" means any activity that requires an application for a building or demolition permit or any similar permit from the city.

"Recycling" means the process of collecting, sorting, cleansing, treating, and reconstituting materials that would otherwise become solid waste, and returning them to the economic mainstream in the form of raw material for new, reused, or reconstituted products which meet the quality standards necessary to be used in the marketplace.

"Universal Waste" are any of the hazardous wastes that are listed in section 66261.9 of Article 1, Chapter 11, Division 4.5 of Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations, which includes electronic devices, batteries, electric lamps, fluorescent tubes and bulbs, high intensity discharge lamps, sodium vapor lamps and lamps that contain added mercury, mercury-containing equipment, CRT, CRT glass, and non-empty aerosol cans.

"Waste Reduction and Recycling Plan" means a completed form submitted by an Applicant for any Covered Project approved by the city to manage compliance with this chapter. The form is submitted when applying for a demolition or construction permit.

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18.60.030 Designated recyclable and reusable materials.

Designated recyclable and reusable materials means all Construction or Demolition material that fits within any of the following categories:

- A. Masonry building materials including all products generally used in construction including, but not limited to asphalt, concrete, rock, stone, and brick.
- B. Wood materials including all dimensional lumber, fencing, or construction wood that is not chemically treated, creosoted, CCA pressure treated, contaminated, or painted.
- C. Vegetable materials including trees, tree parts, shrubs, stumps, logs, brush, or any other type of plants that are cleared from a site for construction or other use.
- D. Metals including all metal scrap such as, but not limited to, pipes, siding, window frames, door frames, and fences.
- E. Roofing materials including wood shingles as well as asphalt, stone, and slate based roofing material.
- F. Salvageable materials includes all salvageable materials and structures including, but not limited to wallboard, doors, windows, fixtures, toilets, sinks, bath tubs, and appliances.
- G. Any other construction or demolition debris that is non-hazardous and available for recycling or reuse.

18.60.040 Minimum Construction and Demolition Waste Diversion requirements.

- A. All Covered Projects shall reuse, recycle, or Divert the minimum percentage amount of designated recyclable and reusable materials as set forth by State law and regulations. The 2016 CALGreen (Part 11 of Title 24, California Code of Regulations) requires a minimum diversion of 65%, which is expected to increase to 75% for the 2019 edition that will be applicable in 2020.
- B. Every person engaging in any Construction or Demolition in connection with a Covered Project shall comply with the requirements of this chapter.

18.60.050 Covered Projects.

A. All construction, demolition, addition, alteration, and remodel Projects that generate Construction and Demolition Waste within the city requiring a permit are required to divert the minimum percentage amount of designated recyclable and

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- reusable materials from landfills. Concurrent permits at the same site are considered "one" Project for the purposes of this chapter.
- B. Documentation and diversion requirements for city-sponsored Construction and Demolition Projects shall be included in the Project contract with the city. These Projects shall only be considered Covered Projects if the city identifies them as such on a project-by-project basis. Typically, a city sponsored Project would only be designated as a Covered Project if the city's Project contractor does not contract for solid waste handling services with the authorized franchise waste hauler of the Garden Grove Sanitary District or the City.

18.60.060 Security Deposit and Waste Reduction and Recycling Plan required.

- A. Except as otherwise specified in this chapter, each Applicant who applies for a building or an encroachment permit for a Covered Project shall submit a Waste Reduction and Recycling Plan as prescribed by the C&D Compliance Official. No building permit, encroachment permit, or an exemption is issued for Covered Projects unless a Waste Reduction and Recycling Plan has been approved by the C&D Compliance Official.
- B. Except as otherwise specified in this chapter, each Applicant who applies for a building or an encroachment permit for a Covered Project, shall remit a security deposit to the C&D Compliance Official or his/her designee in the amount established by resolution of the City Council. The security deposit is remitted at the same time the permit application is filed, and is in the form of cash or cash equivalent such as a cashier's check or credit card payment to the city.

18.60.070 Exemptions.

Neither a Waste Reduction and Recycling Plan nor a security deposit is required for the following:

- A. Work for which only a plumbing permit, only an electrical, or only a mechanical permit is required.
- B. Seismic tie-down projects.
- C. Installation of pre-fabricated patio enclosures and covers where no foundation or other structural building modifications are required.
- D. Installation of pre-fabricated accessories such as signs or antennas where no structural building modifications are required.

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- E. Other work that the C&D Compliance Official determines will not produce Construction or Demolition Waste.
- F. City-sponsored projects.

An Applicant may file with the C&D Compliance Official an application for exemption which shall include the grounds for an exemption. The C&D Compliance Official shall determine if the exemption complies with this section.

18.60.080 Refund of security deposit.

- A. The C&D Compliance Official may authorize the refund of any security deposit, which was erroneously paid or collected.
- B. The C&D Compliance Official may authorize the refund of any security deposit when the building permit application is withdrawn or cancelled before any work has begun.
- C. The C&D Compliance Official may authorize the refund of a security deposit when the Applicant has satisfactorily submitted the Construction and Demolition Waste Recycling and Disposal Report Summary as identified in Section 18.60.140, and at least the minimum diversion requirement is met.
- D. If the C&D Compliance Official determines that the diversion requirement has not been achieved, he or she shall determine on a case-by-case basis whether the Applicant has made a good faith effort to comply with this chapter. The C&D Compliance Official may authorize a partial refund of a security deposit when less than the minimum diversion requirement is met. The partial refund shall not exceed that portion of the security deposit that is in the same ratio as the demonstrated amount of diverted waste.

18.60.090 Forfeiture of security deposit.

Applicants shall forfeit the security deposit to the city under the following circumstances:

- A. If the C&D Compliance Official determines that the Applicant has not made a good faith effort to comply with this chapter.
- B. If the applicant fails to submit the documentation required by Section 18.60.060 and 18.60.140 within the required time period.
- C. Upon sixty (60) days after a permit's expiration date.

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18.60.100 Use of security deposits.

Moneys received by the city as security deposits are used only for:

- A. Payment of security deposit refunds.
- B. Administrative costs of the program established by this chapter not covered by the application fee.
- C. Programs to Divert from landfill disposal the waste from Construction, Demolition, and alteration Projects, and other recycling programs.
- D. Programs whose purpose is to develop or improve the infrastructure needed to Divert from landfill disposal the waste from Construction, Demolition, and alteration projects, and other recycling programs.

18.60.110 Diversion of waste.

For the purposes of this chapter, "diverted" or "diversion" means a reduction of the amount of waste being disposed in landfills by any of the following methods:

- A. Use of new construction methods, as approved by the C&D Compliance Official, that reduce the amount of waste generated.
- B. On-site re-use of the waste.
- C. Delivery of the waste from the site to a certified recycling facility.
- D. Other methods as approved by the C&D Compliance Official.
- E. All of the waste diversion methods which may qualify for a refund of a security deposit are subject to the reasonable conditions specified by the C&D Compliance Official.

18.60.120 Certified recycling facilities.

For the purposes of this chapter, a certified recycling facility means a recycling, composting, materials recovery, or re-use facility which (a) has obtained all applicable federal, state, and local permits; (b) is in full compliance with all applicable regulations; and (c) diverts from landfill disposal the minimum percentage established in this chapter of all incoming waste from Construction and Demolition activities. The C&D Compliance Official may maintain a list of certified recycling facilities. Any facilities not included in the list maintained by the C&D Compliance Official shall first be approved by the C&D

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Compliance Official before being accepted as a certified recycling facility for purposes of compliance with the requirements of this chapter.

18.60.130 Application fee.

As a part of any application for, and prior to the issuance of, any building or demolition permit that involves the creation of Construction or Demolition material, every Applicant for Covered Projects, unless exempt, shall pay to the city a cash fee sufficient to compensate the city for all expenses incurred in reviewing the Waste Reduction and Recycling Plan and reviewing performance of the plan. The amount of this fee shall be established by resolution of the City Council.

18.60.140 Reporting.

- A. Demolition Projects. Within sixty (60) days following the completion of Demolition of a Covered Project, the Applicant shall, as a condition precedent to release of the security deposit, submit documentation to the C&D Compliance Official reporting on compliance with the diversion requirements of this chapter. The documentation shall consist of a final completed Construction and Demolition Waste Recycling and Disposal Report Summary showing actual data of tonnage of materials recycled and diverted, supported by originals or certified photocopies of receipts and weight tags or other records of measurement from certified recycling facilities, recycling companies or contractors and/or landfill and disposal companies. Receipts and weight tags will be used to verify whether materials generated from the Project have been Diverted or are to be recycled, reused, salvaged, or otherwise disposed of.
- B. Construction Projects. Within sixty (60) days following the completion of Construction of a Covered Project, the Applicant shall, as a condition precedent to release of the security deposit, submit documentation to the C&D Compliance Official reporting on compliance with the diversion requirements of this chapter. The documentation shall consist of a final completed Construction and Demolition Waste Recycling and Disposal Report Summary showing actual data of tonnage of materials recycled and diverted, supported by originals or certified photocopies of receipts and weight tags or other records of measurement from certified recycling facilities, recycling companies or contractors and/or landfill and disposal companies. Receipts and weight tags will be used to verify whether materials generated from the Project have been Diverted or are to be recycled, reused, salvaged, or otherwise disposed of.
- C. Demolition and Construction Projects. If a project involves both Demolition and Construction, the report and documentation for the Demolition Project must be submitted to, and approved by, the C&D Compliance Official before issuance of a building permit for the Construction Project. If the Applicant has not met the

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diversion requirement for Demolition, the C&D Compliance Official may, in addition to other remedies set forth in this chapter, require a higher percentage of diversion for Construction than that established by State law or regulation, provided that the higher percentage for Construction is no higher than the amount necessary to cover the shortfall in diversion from Demolition. In the alternative, the Applicant may submit a letter certifying that no designated recyclable or reusable materials were generated from the Project. In which case, the certification shall be subject to verification by the C&D Compliance Official.

18.60.150 Universal Waste Disposal.

Universal Waste (such as batteries, electronic waste, electronic lamps, cathode ray tubes/glass, non-empty aerosol cans) shall be diverted from landfills and disposed of in accordance with State laws and regulations.

18.60.160 Appeal.

Notwithstanding any provision of this Code to the contrary, an Applicant may appeal to the City Manager any decision of the C&D Compliance Official under this chapter. Notice of appeal from the decision of the C&D Compliance Official must be filed in writing with the City Manager's Office within ten (10) calendar days of the date of the decision being appealed. The notice of appeal shall set forth in concise language that particular decision or decisions complained of and the reason why the person feels aggrieved thereby. Failure to file a written notice of appeal within the time prescribed herein constitutes a waiver of any objection to the decision(s) of the C&D Compliance Official and such decision(s) shall be final; otherwise the decision of the City Manager is final. The City Council may establish an application fee by resolution to defray the costs of processing appeals.

18.60.170 Violations.

In addition to the forfeiture of the security deposit per section 18.60.090 of this chapter, violations of this chapter are punishable per Chapters 1.04 and/or 1.22 of this code.

<u>SECTION 2:</u> If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, words or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

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<u>SECTION 3</u>: The Mayor shall sign and the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same, or the summary thereof, to be published and posted pursuant to the provisions of law and this Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after adoption.

OBJECTIVE

To present for introduction and first reading of an ordinance amending the municipal code to increase penalties for violations of the City's building and safety codes and to add a prohibition against commercial advertisements for unlawful activities and uses.

BACKGROUND

AB 2598 and AB 2164 became effective early this year and amended Government Code sections 36900 and 53069.4, respectively, to increase the penalties for violations of local building and safety codes and to permit the immediate issuance of administrative fines or penalties for the violation of building and safety codes resulting from the illegal cultivation of cannabis. The proposed ordinance will revise the Garden Grove Municipal Code to implement these recent amendments to State law.

DISCUSSION

In addition to implementing the new authority to increase penalties for violations of the City's building and safety codes, the proposed ordinance further enhances the City's code enforcement program by adding a prohibition against commercial advertisements for activities or uses that violate the code. For example, the new prohibition will prohibit advertisements of illegal short term rentals, marijuana dispensaries, illegal gambling, topless servers at coffeehouses, and other activities prohibited by the code.

As to short term rentals, they are not, and have not been, permitted by the code in

residential zones. However, short-term vacation rentals have become very popular in the last few years. The Land Use Code outlines permitted uses in residential zones. It is a "permissive" zoning code – any use not specifically indicated in the code is prohibited. Section 9.32.020.E.1 of the code provides that no building, structure, or land shall be used, occupied, or maintained, for any purpose or use except as specifically provided in the code. Short term rentals are the same as hotels or motels, which are defined as places rented to transients for a term of less than 30 consecutive days. Hotels/motels are commercial uses that are only allowed in commercial zones with a conditional use permit. Thus, renting out a residence in the City's residential zones for less than 30 days is prohibited.

Although the City has enforced the illegal use of residential properties as short term or vacation rentals for many years, the number of complaints has recently increased substantially and the City is now allocating more resources to enforce the code against short term rental uses. Complaints from residents include noisy parties disturbing the peace of the residential neighborhoods, increased vehicular traffic, and parking shortages. Enforcement of the prohibition against short term rentals can be very time and resource intensive because it can be very difficult to verify the violation. Unlike most other code enforcement cases, these violations are frequently not in plain view.

Many owners, operators, and facilitators of unlawful short term rentals in the City's residential zones that engage in the short term rental business, use advertisements to make their unlawful short term rentals available to the general public and rely on those advertisements to secure customers. Prohibiting advertisements for unlawful short term rentals would help in reducing the supply of unlawful rentals and in reducing the occurrence of this unlawful activity by making it more difficult for prospective renters and owners and operators to connect with each other and to enter into rental agreements. The prohibition against the commercial advertisement of activities or uses that violate the code is therefore necessary to allow for more effective enforcement of the City's code and to help in the preservation of the public health, safety, and general welfare in the City. Furthermore, there is no right to advertise illegal activity. (See, Pittsburg Press Co. v. Pittsburgh Commission on Human Relations, (1973) 413 U.S. 376, 388; Central Hudson Gas & Elec. Corp. v. Pub. Serv. Comm'n of New York, (1980) 447 U.S. 557, 566.)

ACTIVITIES AND USES

City Attorney Summary

This Ordinance revises the administrative penalties for violations of the Building and Safety Codes as authorized by recent amendments to State law and establishes a prohibition against commercial advertisements for unlawful activities and uses to enhance the City's Code Enforcement Program.

WHEREAS, AB 2598, Chapter 970 of 2018 Statutes amended Government Code section 36900 to increase the penalties for violations of local building and safety codes;

WHEREAS, AB 2164, Chapter 316 of 2018 Statutes amended Government Code section 53069.4 to permit the immediate issuance of an administrative fine or penalty for the violation of building and safety codes resulting from the illegal cultivation of cannabis;

WHEREAS, it is well-established under the law that commercial speech that proposes an unlawful transaction, or is misleading or related to unlawful activity is excluded from First Amendment protection and may be freely regulated by the government;

WHEREAS, the United States Supreme Court has held that the government may prohibit advertising for commercial activity that is itself illegal without offending the First Amendment to the United States Constitution, as such speech is not entitled to protection. (See, <u>Pittsburg Press Co. v. Pittsburgh Commission on Human Relations</u>, (1973) 413 U.S. 376, 388; Central <u>Hudson Gas & Elec. Corp. v. Pub. Serv. Comm'n of New York</u>, (1980) 447 U.S. 557, 566);

WHEREAS, any person or entity wishing to avoid the impact of this ordinance's prohibition against advertising illegal activities under the code need only delete or remove and avoid publishing any advertisements for unlawful activities in the City of Garden Grove's jurisdictional limits; and

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WHEREAS, under the principle of permissive zoning, any land use not expressly allowed by Title 9 of the Garden Grove Municipal Code is prohibited. Section 9.32.020.E.1 provides that no building, structure, or land shall be used, occupied, or maintained, for any purpose or use except as specifically provided in the code, and in any permit approved under the code;

WHEREAS, the Garden Grove Municipal Code provides that any short-term, transient, or vacation rentals of property or a portion thereof for less than 30 days in exchange for any form of compensation is prohibited in all residential zones as this land use is not provided for nor permitted in Chapters 9.08 and 9.12 thereof:

WHEREAS, many owners, operators, and facilitators of unlawful short-term rentals in the City's residential zones that engage in the short-term rental business, use advertisements to make unlawful short-term rentals available to the general public and rely on those advertisements to secure customers, such that prohibiting advertisements for unlawful short-term rentals would reduce the supply of unlawful rentals and reduce the occurrence of this unlawful activity by making it significantly more difficult for prospective renters and owners and operators to connect with each other and to enter into rental agreements;

WHEREAS, section 3 of is ordinance is intended to reduce the amount of illegal activity presently occurring and to prevent new illegal activity from occurring, by prohibiting advertisements by which owners, operators, and facilitators engaging in illegal activities seek customers;

WHEREAS, a purpose of this ordinance is to reduce the proliferation of the illegal land use of unlawful short-term, transient, and vacation rentals and the associated negative effects caused by this illegal land use on the City's residents, businesses, and visitors, including excessive traffic, reductions in available parking, unlawful conversions of residential property, unlawful conversions of existing affordable housing units into illegal short term vacation rentals, and inundation of the City's low-density, quiet residential neighborhoods with commercial visitors and activity that adds traffic, noise, and destroys their quiet, low-density residential character; and

WHEREAS, the City intends that the prohibition on advertisements for unlawful short-term, transient, and vacation rentals will apply to the extent of, but not beyond, the limit of the City's power, consistent with the First

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Amendment to the United States Constitution and Article I, Section 2 of the California Constitution, and any preemptive state or federal laws.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE DOES HEREBY ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>: The foregoing recitals are true and are hereby incorporated by reference as the City Council's findings and purpose for this ordinance.

<u>SECTION 2:</u> Section 1.22.010 of Title 1 of the Garden Grove Municipal Code is hereby amended to read as follows:

1.22.010 Authority and Fines

- A. Any person violating any provision of the Garden Grove Municipal Code may be issued an administrative citation by an enforcement officer and shall thereby be subject to an administrative fine as provided for in this chapter. For purposes of this chapter, a violation of the Garden Grove Municipal Code shall include any violation of the Municipal Code, any code adopted by reference by the City Council, including, but not limited to, all codes adopted by reference in Title 18 of the Municipal Code, and the failure to comply with any condition of approval imposed pursuant to any land use entitlement, any permit, license, or other authorization issued or approved pursuant to the City Council adopted ordinances, including, but not limited to, those violations specified in Section 1.22.110 herein. The violations referred to in this subsection are collectively referred to in this chapter as Municipal Code violations. For purposes of this chapter, an administrative citation for an administrative fine may be issued to any responsible person for any violation referred to in this chapter.
- B. Each and every day a violation of the Municipal Code exists constitutes a separate and distinct offense.
- C. An administrative fine shall be assessed by means of an administrative citation issued by an enforcement officer and shall be payable directly to the City of Garden Grove through the Finance Department. Except as set forth in subsection D, a citation may be issued by an enforcement officer upon the determination by such officer that a violation of the Municipal Code exists.

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D. **Continuing Violations.**

- 1. When a continuing violation exists pertaining to a building, plumbing, electrical, or other similar structural or zoning issue that does not create an immediate danger to health or safety, a citation for such a violation shall not be issued pursuant to this chapter unless the responsible person has first been provided with a reasonable period as determined by the enforcement officer, but in no event less than five calendar days, in which to correct or otherwise remedy the violation. When such a violation creates an immediate danger to health or safety, a citation may be issued immediately.
- 2. Notwithstanding Subdivision (1) above, in the case of an administrative citation issued for violation of Section 9.52.030 pertaining to the illegal cultivation of cannabis, the citation may be issued immediately, except that the City will provide a reasonable period as determined by the enforcement officer, but in no event less than five calendar days, in which to correct or otherwise remedy the violation if all of the following are true:
- (i) A tenant is in possession of the property that is the subject of the administrative action.
- (ii) The rental property owner or agent can provide evidence that the rental or lease agreement prohibits the cultivation of cannabis.
- (iii) The rental property owner or agent did not know the tenant was illegally cultivating cannabis and no complaint, property inspection, or other information caused the rental property owner or agent to have actual notice of the illegal cannabis cultivation.
- E. Except as otherwise specified for those Municipal Code violations referred to in subsections F **through H** and G, in the case of administrative citations issued for violation of the Municipal Code, administrative fines shall be assessed in the amount of \$1,000.00 for each violation.
- F. For each violation of the Municipal Code that would otherwise be determined to be an infraction, administrative fines shall be in the following amounts:
 - 1. A fine of \$100.00 for a first violation;
- 2. A fine of \$200.00 for a second violation of the same Municipal Code provision within one year from the date of the first violation; and

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- 3. A fine of \$500.00 for each additional violation of the same Municipal Code provision within one year from the date of the first violation.
- G. In the case of an administrative citation issued for violation of Sections 8.64.030, 8.64.040 or 8.64.050(A) or any provision of Chapter 8.84 of this Code, administrative fines shall be assessed in the following amounts:
 - 1. A fine of \$300.00 for a first violation;
- 2. A fine of \$600.00 for a second violation of the same provision within one year from the date of the first violation; and
- 3. A fine of \$1,000.00 for each additional violation of the same provision within one year from the date of the first violation.
- H. In the case of an administrative citation issued for violation of Title 18 (Building Codes), administrative fines shall be assessed in the following amounts:
 - 1. A fine of \$130.00 for a first violation;
- 2. A fine of \$700.00 for a second violation of the same provision within one year from the date of the first violation; and
- 3. A fine of \$1,300.00 for each additional violation of the same provision within one year from the date of the first violation; and
- 4. A fine of \$2,500.00 for each additional violation of the same provision within two years from the date of the first violation if the property is a commercial property that has an existing building at the time of the violation and the violation is due to failure by the owner to remove visible refuse or failure to prohibit unauthorized use of the property.
- I H. In addition to the administrative fine schedule as set forth above, and pursuant to Government Code Section 38773.5(b), the City may recover, at its discretion, attorneys' fees and costs in any action, administrative proceeding, or special proceeding to abate any nuisance arising out of a Municipal Code violation. The recovery of attorneys' fees and costs shall be by the prevailing party, and limited to those individual actions or proceedings in which the City elects, by direction of the City Manager at the initiation of that individual action or proceeding, to seek recovery of its own attorneys' fees. In no action, administrative proceeding, or special proceeding shall an award of

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attorneys' fees to the prevailing party exceed the amount of reasonable fees incurred by the City in such matters.

J ‡. Nothing in this chapter shall require the City to proceed with an administrative citation and fine in lieu of the penalty provisions set forth in Chapter 1.04 or any other legal options available to the City. An administrative citation may be utilized in place of, or in addition to, any other remedy allowed by the Municipal Code or state law.

<u>SECTION 3</u>: Chapter 8.02 is hereby added to Title 8 of the Garden Grove Municipal Code to read as follows:

Chapter 8.02

PROHIBITION OF COMMERCIAL ADVERTISEMENTS FOR UNLAWFUL ACTIVITIES AND USES

Sections:

8.02.010 Prohibition of Commercial Advertisements for Unlawful Activities and Uses.

SECTION 4: If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion of this ordinance is, for any reason, held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, words or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

OBJECTIVE

To request that the City Council award a contract to CleanStreet to provide street sweeping and catch basin cleaning services.

BACKGROUND

Street Sweeping is an integral element of the City's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination Systems (NPDES) permit, removing approximately 280 tons of debris per month from city streets. With the additional requirements of option 2 of the state mandated Trash Amendment, street sweeping and catch basin cleaning are of even greater importance to assist the city in meeting the goal of zero trash and debris entering our storm drain system and the ocean.

The existing street sweeping and catch basin cleaning agreement expires on January 31, 2019. To ensure continued service, RFP S-1246 was issued and advertised on December 6, 2018. A mandatory pre-proposal meeting was held on December 14, 2018, with six (6) companies in attendance.

DISCUSSION

Three (3) proposals were received and opened on January 2, 2019. The Source Selection Committee (SSC) reviewed and scored all proposals.

The SSC selected the highest scoring proposer, CleanStreet, as they demonstrated understanding of the project, offered a work plan that best fit the needs of the City, and has the ability to perform all services requested.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The new CleanStreet agreement is for an approximate 7 year term and is estimated to cost \$6,422,291.12 over the term of the contract, approximately \$917,470.16 annually. This estimated cost does not include the contractual renewal obligations for CPI adjustments not to exceed 4% annually. The prior 6 year term agreement was in the amount of \$4,629,667.20, approximately \$771,611.20 annually. The new contract is anticipated to cost \$1,792,623.92 above the prior contract over the term of the contract. This substantial increase is partly due to the recently implemented State mandated Trash Amendment regulations requiring the City to provide more frequent monitoring and cleaning of storm drain catch basins.

Additionally, the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) is currently considering whether prevailing wages will be required for street sweeping services. Currently, street sweeping is not subject to the payment of prevailing wages. If the DIR declares that street sweeping is subject to prevailing wages, there may be additional increased costs.

The contract will continue to be funded by the General Fund and Water Enterprise Fund. The increased contract costs for fiscal year 2018-19 will be absorbed in the fiscal year 2018-19 budget. Ongoing cost escalations will be budgeted through the regular biennial budgetary process.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Award a contract to CleanStreet in the amount of \$6,422,291.12 for the approximately seven year term of the contract through December 31, 2025;
- Authorize the City Manager to execute the agreement and make minor modifications as needed thereto;
- Authorize the City Manager to update the terms of the agreement should the Department of Industrial Relations require the payment of prevailing wages for street sweeping services;
- Authorize the City Manager or his designee to provide additional funding for the agreement should the Department of Industrial Relations require the payment of prevailing wages for street sweeping services; and
- Authorize the City Manager to exercise each optional term of the agreement, through December 31, 2025.

The initial term of the Agreement shall be from February 1, 2019 through December 31, 2021 (the "initial term"), with options for CITY to extend the term of the Agreement for up to four (4) additional years total. Option periods shall be exercised two (2) years at a time at the sole option of the City. This Agreement may be terminated by the CITY without cause. In such event, the CITY will compensate CONTRACTOR for work performed to date in accordance with fee schedule (Attachment "B") which is incorporated herein by reference. CONTRACTOR shall present documentation satisfactory to CITY to establish completion of any work for which payment is sought.
- 2. **Services to be Provided.** The services to be performed by CONTRACTOR shall consist of tasks as set forth in CITY's Request for Proposals No. S-1246 ("RFP") and in CONTRACTOR'S Proposal (Attachment "B"), both of which are hereby incorporated herein by reference. All work shall be performed in accordance with the RFP and Scope of Work, Exhibit "A". The RFP, Proposal and this Agreement do not guarantee any specific amount of work.

- 3. **Compensation.** CONTRACTOR shall be compensated as follows:
 - 3.1 Α. Amount. CONTRACTOR's compensation shall be based on the volume of services provided and the price per unit of service set forth in the Unit Price Column of Attachment "B," as such prices may be periodically adjusted pursuant to Subsection 3.1.B, below. Pricing shall remain firm during the initial term and during each option period. All compensation shall be payable in arrears for work completed. Except as authorized by the City Manager as provided below, compensation for the initial term (through December 31, 2021), shall not exceed Three Million Three Hundred Ninety Seven Thousand Seven Hundred Fifteen Dollars and 48/100 (\$3,397,715.48). Notwithstanding the forgoing, the City Manager may, in his or her authorize additional compensation discretion, CONTRACTOR to account for extra work requested by CITY, unit volume increases, or other unanticipated factors, provided such additional compensation shall not exceed an aggregate amount of ten percent (10%) of the not-to-exceed amount stated above for the initial term or option period, as applicable. Any increases in compensation in excess of this ten percent (10%) contingency amount shall require an amendment to this Agreement.
 - Compensation Adjustment. At least thirty (30) days prior to the В. commencement of the first option period, and thirty (30) days prior to the ending of each option period thereafter during the term of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR may, by written notice, request an increase in the price per unit of service set forth in the Unit Price Column of Attachment "B" for the term of the relevant option period. Any pricing increase shall be calculated based on the percentage change in the United States Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics "Consumer Price Index for All Urban Angeles-Long Consumers" for the Los Beach-Anaheim metropolitan area, Subgroup "all items" for the two-year period ending the preceding November 30th. However, in no event shall any such increase exceed four (4) percent. In the event such a pricing increase is approved in conjunction with CITY's exercise of an option period, the parties shall execute an amendment to this Agreement reflecting such increase, including an updated Attachment "B."
 - 3.2 <u>Payment</u>. For work under this Agreement, payment shall be made per invoice for work completed. For extra work not a part of this Agreement, a written authorization by CITY will be required, and payment shall be based on the schedule included in Proposal (Attachment "B").
 - 3.3. <u>Termination</u>. CITY shall have the right to terminate this Agreement, without cause, subject to Section 3.4 below, by giving thirty (30) days

written notice of termination to CONTRACTOR. If CITY terminates the Agreement, then the provisions of Section 3.2 shall apply to that portion of the work completed. CONTRACTOR shall have the right to terminate this Agreement only upon breach of the Agreement by CITY, after providing CITY thirty (30) days written notice and an opportunity to cure.

- 3.4. <u>Damages</u>. If either party breaches this Agreement, the breaching party shall be liable for monetary damages caused by such breach, in addition to any other remedies as may be authorized by law. Damages for failure of CONTRACTOR to complete sweeping of zones in the hours required are difficult or impossible to ascertain. Therefore, the parties hereto agree that failure of CONTRACTOR to complete sweeping zones during days and hours posted for notices of violation, except on holidays or inclement weather, shall result in liquidated damages of \$500.00 for each incomplete sweep of a time-based zone per day (maximum \$1,000 per day) to reimburse CITY for losses sustained. CITY may deduct such damages from payment due CONTRACTOR or draw on the letter of credit referred to in Section 3.5 for such damages, in addition to any other remedies legally available.
- 3.5. Security for Compliance. Prior to the commencement of any work, CONTRACTOR shall furnish or cause to be furnished to the CITY security in the form of a letter of credit, in a form approved by the City Attorney, or such other comparable security instrument as may be approved by the City Attorney, in the minimum amount of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00), securing the faithful performance by CONTRACTOR of all the terms and conditions of this Agreement, including liquidated damages provided for under Section 3.4 above.

4. <u>Insurance Requirements</u>.

- 4.1 <u>COMMENCEMENT OF WORK.</u> CONTRACTOR shall not commence work under this Agreement until all certificates and endorsements have been received and approved by the CITY. All insurance required by this Agreement shall contain a Statement of Obligation on the part of the carrier to notify the CITY of any material change, cancellation, or termination at least thirty (30) days in advance.
- 4.2 <u>WORKERS COMPENSATION INSURANCE</u>. During the duration of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR and all subcontractors shall maintain Workers Compensation Insurance in the amount and type required by law, if applicable.
- 4.3 <u>INSURANCE AMOUNTS</u>. CONTRACTOR shall maintain the following insurance for the duration of this Agreement:
 - (a) Commercial general liability *in an amount not less than* \$5,000,000 per occurrence, including products liability; (**claims**

made and modified occurrence policies are not acceptable); Insurance companies must be acceptable to CITY and have an AM Best's Guide Rating of A-, Class VII or better, as approved by the CITY.

- (b) Automobile liability in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit; (claims made and modified occurrence policies are not acceptable); Insurance companies must be acceptable to CITY and have an AM Best's Guide Rating of A-, Class VII or better, as approved by the CITY.
- (c) Excess liability, following form, coverage shall be provided for any underlying policy that does not meet the insurance requirements set forth herein (claims made and modified occurrence policies are not acceptable). Insurance companies must be acceptable to CITY and have a Best's Guide Rating of A-Class VII or better, as approved by the CITY.

An Additional Insured Endorsement, **ongoing products and completed operations, including products liability,** for the policy under section 4.3 (a) shall designate CITY, its officers, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers as additional insureds for liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall provide to CITY proof of insurance and endorsement forms that conform to city's requirements, as approved by the CITY.

An Additional Insured Endorsement for the policy under section 4.3 (b) shall designate CITY, its officers, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers as additional insureds for automobiles owned, leased, hired, or borrowed by the CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall provide to CITY proof of insurance and endorsement forms that conform to CITY's requirements, as approved by the CITY.

An Additional Insured Endorsement for the policy under section 4.3 (c) shall designate CITY, its officers, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers as additional insureds under the excess liability policy. CONTRACTOR shall provide to CITY proof of insurance stating the excess liability policy follows form, additional insured endorsement forms, and the schedule of underlying policies with policy numbers that conform to CITY's requirements, as approved by the CITY. Information for the excess policy only needs to be provided if the underlying policies do not meet the policy limits set forth herein.

For any claims related to this Agreement, CONTRACTOR's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects CITY, its officers, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the CITY, its officers, officials, employees,

agents, or volunteers shall by excess of the CONTRACTOR's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

If CONTRACTOR maintains higher insurance limits than the minimums shown above. CONTRACTOR shall provide coverage for the higher insurance limits otherwise maintained by the CONTRACTOR.

- 5. Non-Liability of Officials and Employees of the City. No official or employee of CITY shall be personally liable to CONTRACTOR in the event of any default or breach by CITY, or for any amount which may become due to CONTRACTOR.
- 6. **Non-Discrimination.** CONTRACTOR covenants there shall be no discrimination against any person or group due to race, color, creed, religion, sex, marital status, age, handicap, national origin, or ancestry, in any activity pursuant to this Agreement.
- 7. **Independent Contractor**. It is understood and agreed to that CONTRACTOR, including CONTRACTOR's employees, shall act and be an independent contractor(s) and not agent(s) or employee(s) of the CITY, and that no relationship of employer-employee exists between the parties. CONTRACTOR's assigned personnel shall not obtain or be entitled to any rights or benefits that accrue to, or are payable to, CITY employees, and CONTRACTOR shall so inform each employee organization and each employee who is hired or retained under this Agreement. CITY is not required to make any deductions or withholdings from the compensation payable to CONTRACTOR under the provisions of this Agreement, and is not required to issue W-2 Forms for income and employment tax purposes for any of CONTRACTOR's assigned personnel. CONTRACTOR hereby expressly assumes all responsibility and liability for the payment of wages and benefits to its assigned personnel, and all related reporting and withholding obligations. CONTRACTOR hereby agrees to indemnify and hold CITY harmless from any and all claims or liabilities that CITY may incur arising from any contention by any third party, including, but not limited to, any employee of CONTRACTOR or any federal or state agency or other entity, that an employer-employee relationship exists by reason of this Agreement, including, without limitation, claims that CITY is responsible for retirement or other benefits allegedly accruing to CONTRACTOR's assigned personnel.
- 8. Compliance with Law. CONTRACTOR shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, codes, and regulations of the federal, state, and local government. CONTRACTOR shall comply with, and shall be responsible for causing all contractors and subcontractors performing any of the work pursuant to this Agreement to comply with, all applicable federal and state labor standards, including, to the extent applicable, the prevailing wage requirements promulgated by the Director of Industrial Relations of the State of California Department of Labor. The City makes no warranty or representation concerning whether any of the work performed pursuant to this Agreement constitutes public works subject to the prevailing wage requirements.

- 9. **Notices.** All notices shall be personally delivered or mailed to the below listed address, or to such other addresses as may be designated by written notice. The following addresses shall be used for delivery of service of process:

- 10. <u>Contractor's Proposal</u>. This Agreement shall include CONTRACTOR'S Proposal which shall be incorporated herein by reference. In the event of any inconsistency between the terms of the RFP, the Proposal and/or this Agreement, this Agreement shall govern. In the event of any inconsistency between the RFP and/or the Proposal, the RFP shall govern.
- 11. <u>Licenses, Permits, and Fees</u>. At its sole expense, CONTRACTOR shall obtain a Garden Grove Business License, all permits, and licenses as may be required by this Agreement or by any other applicable requirements.
- 12. <u>Familiarity with Work</u>. By executing this Agreement, CONTRACTOR warrants that: (1) it has investigated the work to be performed; (2) it has investigated the site of the work and is aware of all conditions there; and (3) it understands the facilities, difficulties, and restrictions of the work under this Agreement. Should CONTRACTOR discover any latent or unknown conditions materially differing from those inherent in the work or as represented by CITY, it shall immediately inform CITY of this and shall not proceed, except at CONTRACTOR'S risk, until written instructions are received from CITY.
- 13. **Time of Essence**. Time is of the essence in the performance of this Agreement.
- 14. Limitations Upon Subcontracting and Assignment. The experience, knowledge, capability, and reputation of CONTRACTOR, its principals and employees were a substantial inducement for CITY to enter into this Agreement. CONTRACTOR shall not contract with any other entity to perform the services required without advance written approval of the CITY. This Agreement may not be assigned voluntarily or by operation of law, without the prior written approval of CITY. If CONTRACTOR is permitted to subcontract any part of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall be responsible to CITY for the acts and omissions of its subcontractor as it is for persons directly employed. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create any contractual relationship between

any subcontractor and CITY. All persons engaged in the work will be considered employees of CONTRACTOR. CITY will deal directly with and will make all payments to CONTRACTOR.

- 15. **Authority to Execute.** Each of the undersigned represents and warrants that he or she is duly authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement and that such execution is binding upon the entity for which he or she is executing this Agreement.
- Indemnification. CONTRACTOR agrees to protect, defend, and hold harmless CITY and its elective or appointive boards, officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims, liabilities, expenses, or damages of any nature, including attorneys' fees, for injury or death of any person, or damage to property, or interference with use of property, arising out of, or in any way connected with performance of the Agreement by CONTRACTOR, CONTRACTOR'S agents, officers, employees, subcontractors, or independent contractors hired by CONTRACTOR. The only exception to CONTRACTOR'S responsibility to protect, defend, and hold harmless CITY, is due to the sole negligence of CITY, or any of its elective or appointive boards, officers, agents, or employees.

This hold harmless agreement shall apply to all liability regardless of whether any insurance policies are applicable. The policy limits do not act as a limitation upon the amount of indemnification to be provided by CONTRACTOR. This indemnification provision shall survive the termination of this Agreement until all claims or actions affected by this indemnification provision are finally resolved.

- 17. Additional Services. The City anticipates the need for sidewalk/parking lots/catch basin sweeping services in the future, however, the services may or may not be required on a regular basis. The City will determine if and when sidewalk/parking lots/catch basin sweeping is to be performed. Such additional services shall be performed upon request by CITY at the compensation rate set forth in CONTRACTOR's Proposal.
- 18. **Street Sweeping Wastewater.** CONTRACTOR shall be responsible, at its sole expense, for disposing of wastewater in a lawful manner. Discharges of wastewater by CONTRACTOR shall be in compliance with any and all applicable requirements of regulatory agencies, including but not limited to the Orange County Sanitation District. CONTRACTOR shall be solely responsible for such discharges and shall defend and indemnify and hold harmless CITY and Garden Grove Sanitary District in accordance with Section 16 herein with regard to such discharges.
- 19. **Attorney Fees.** In the event any dispute between the parties with respect to this Agreement results in litigation or any non-judicial proceeding, the prevailing party shall be entitled, in addition to such other relief as may be granted, to recover from the non-prevailing party all reasonable costs and expenses, including but not limited to attorney fees, expert consultant fees,

court costs and all fees, costs and expenses incurred in any appeal or in collection of any judgment entered in such proceeding. The amount of such fees, costs and expenses may be determined in such proceeding or in a separate action brought for that purpose. To the extent authorized by law, in the event of a dismissal by the plaintiff or petitioner of the litigation or non-judicial proceeding within thirty (30) days of the date set for trial or hearing, the other party shall be deemed to be the prevailing party in such litigation or proceeding.

20. **Appropriations.** This Agreement is subject to and contingent upon funds being appropriated therefor by the Garden Grove City Council for each fiscal year covered by the term of this Agreement. If such appropriations are not made, this Agreement shall automatically terminate without penalty to the CITY.

Furnish All Labor, Materials, Traffic Control, Equipment and Transportation, Be Responsible For Locating Dump Sites, Do All Work Required For Proper Removal and Disposal of Debris from City Of Garden Grove Public Right of Ways and Catch Basins

I. INTRODUCTION TO THE CITY

The City of Garden Grove is located in Orange County California. Incorporated in 1959, the City has nearly built out of its 18 square miles. In its brief history, the City of Garden Grove has grown from a small farming community to a city of approximately 180,000 residents.

The City of Garden Grove regularly sweeps approximately 1,500 scheduled curb miles per month. Special sweeps are primarily on an as-needed basis, and estimated at 215 hours annually. Sidewalk sweeping is estimated at 50 curb miles annually, also on an as-needed basis. Parking District #2 lot is swept 26 times per year; all other parking lots are swept weekly. 995 catch basins are cleaned on an annual basis.

II OBJECTIVE OF THE REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL

The City desires to contract with a qualified firm for municipal sweeping and catch basin cleaning services. The submitted proposals should reflect a two (2) year contract term with the option to extend said agreement for four (4) additional years total. Option years shall be exercised two (2) years at a time at the sole option of the City. The request for proposal (RFP) is specifically seeking:

- A. Regularly scheduled curb mile sweeping
- B. Centerline/intersections/ median curb mile sweeping
- C. Sidewalk curb mile sweeping
- D. Special hourly rate sweeping
- E. Parking lot sweeping
- F. Catch basin cleaning

Each of these elements is discussed in detail in the following sections.

III. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

Whenever the following terms are used within the scope of work and or this agreement, the parties mutually agree that they shall have the following meaning:

- (a) "City Manager means the fully appointed City Manager of the CITY or his authorized representative.
- (b) "Debris" means all litter, rubbish, plant life waste, sand, dirt, garbage, and other foreign material removable from a paved street or catch basin.
- (c) "Director of Public Works" means the official designated as the Director of Public Works of CITY, or any of his authorized representatives.
- (d) "Street" means all dedicated public rights-of-way within the existing or future corporate limits of the City of Garden Grove, which are paved.
- (e) "Street Sweeping" means the removal by street sweepers of all debris from all portions of a street, including but not limited to street intersections, the areas adjacent to curbs and raised medians, such as left turn pockets, and the striped areas of arterial streets.
- (f) "Sweepings" means all debris removed from streets and sidewalks by street sweeping.
- (g) "Curb Mile" A curb mile equals 5,280 feet and is the measurement used to designate those miles predetermined by the City to be swept by the street sweeping contractor.
- (h) "Special Sweeps" Special sweeps are those required by the CITY other than regular scheduled street sweeping and involving unusual conditions such as traffic hazards, parades, etc.
- (i) "Re-sweeps" Re-sweeps are those sweeps required of the contractor when previous sweeps have been deemed by the CITY to be of poor quality, or when a street or sections of a street have been missed by the contractor during regularly scheduled street sweeping. Re-sweeps are completed the same day and at the expense of the contractor.
- (j) "Quality of Sweeping" The street sweeper shall leave designated areas of sweeping free of dirt, litter, plant life debris, other foreign materials, and visual dust in accordance with the CITY's standards of cleanliness.

IV. SCOPE OF WORK

<u>Services to be Provided</u>. The Scope of Work is not all-inclusive, but is part of the Agreement, and is therefore offered to assist in the Proposer's understanding of the City's work requirement. The City is seeking a Contractor to provide frequent and

regularly scheduled sweeping services for curb and gutter segments of all public streets, public alleys and public parking lots, to include sidewalks and catch basins within the City's jurisdiction. This includes quarterly reporting on total tonnages collected, along with tonnages from site specific catch basin areas to help comply with the State Mandated Trash Amendments. Sweeping services shall be provided through motorized alternate fuel sweeping vehicles, which comply with the Air Quality Management District's Rule 1186.1 (Less Polluting Sweepers). Sweeping shall include along all centerlines, medians, intersections, islands, left turn lanes, and painted center-medians. In addition, City seeks sweeping services prior to and after any special events.

Work to be Done – Regularly Scheduled Street Sweeping. CONTRACTOR shall furnish all labor, material and equipment necessary, and shall sweep all existing streets and alleys, in accordance with the area map attached hereto and as designated and scheduled by the CITY. The Sweeping process shall include removal and disposal of all accumulated debris, with *CONTRACTOR* responsible for location of local dumpsites and associated costs thereof. The regularly scheduled street sweeping shall be adhered to by CONTRACTOR unless deviation there from is authorized by the Director of Public Works. CONTRACTOR shall consistently follow daily sweeping routes as directed by the CITY. Street Sweeping shall start no earlier than 5:00 am and will conclude when the route for the day is completed. Arterial/Collector streets are to be swept starting no earlier than 5:00 a.m. and Residential Streets no later 8:00 a.m.

Work to be Done – Centerline/Intersections/Median Curb-Mile Sweeping. CONTRACTOR shall furnish all labor, material and equipment necessary, and shall sweep all existing centerline, intersections, and medians in accordance with the map attached hereto and as designated and scheduled by the CITY. The sweeping process shall include removal and disposal of all accumulated debris, with CONTRACTOR responsible for location of local dumpsites and associated costs thereof. The Public Works Director will determine the specific schedule. The entire intersection is to be swept.

Work to be Done – Sidewalk Sweeping Services. Sidewalk sweeping services are on an as-needed basis. The same CONTRACTOR shall perform street and sidewalk sweeping services. CONTRACTOR is to furnish all labor, materials, traffic control, equipment and transportation, be responsible for locating dump sites, do all the work required for proper disposal of debris and costs thereof, and to complete work, in accordance and compliance with Federal, State, County and CITY standards and regulations. For purpose of preparing your proposal, and as a definition for the agreement, "sidewalk sweeping" means the removal and disposal of all debris from all areas back of curb face to the farthest portion, known as pedestrian right-of-way. The Public Works Director will determine the specific sidewalks to be swept and schedule the time for the work to be done. It is anticipated that work will be scheduled within the time period of Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

<u>Work to be Done - Special Street Sweeping Services</u>. In addition to the regularly scheduled work required hereunder, the Director of Public Works may request additional sweeping service. The CONTRACTOR, as provider of sweeping service for

the CITY, shall be required to provide street sweeping for emergency situations such as traffic hazards. Special sweeping requests, which can be pre-scheduled, such as parade routes, will be preceded by 48 hours' notice to the CONTRACTOR from the Director of Public Works to CONTRACTOR.

Work to be done - Parking Lot Sweeping. CONTRACTOR to furnish, in addition to the sweeper, equipment necessary to clean around car stops, inlets and outlets and areas difficult to reach. All parking lot sweeping shall be completed between 2:00 a.m. and 5:00 a.m., on a regular day as directed by the CITY.

Work to be Done – Catch Basin Cleaning. CONTRACTOR shall furnish all labor, material and equipment necessary, and shall clean all existing catch basins, vault box and inlet gates by use of a vactor type truck. The process shall include removal and proper disposal of debris and costs thereof. Quarterly reporting shall be conducted on total tonnages collected, along with tonnages from site specific catch basin areas to help comply with the State Mandated Trash Amendments. All activity shall be in accordance and compliance with Federal, State, County and CITY standards and regulations. It is anticipated that work will be scheduled within the time period of Monday through Friday, 7:00 a.m. – 3:30 p.m. to be determined by the Director of Public Works.

<u>Sub-contractors</u>. CONTRACTOR shall not assign, transfer, or enter into any subcontract under this agreement, nor any part thereof, without first obtaining the written consent of CITY, authorized by the Public Works Director. If CONTRACTOR is permitted to subcontract any part of this Agreement, CONTRACTOR shall be responsible to CITY for the acts and omissions of its subcontractor as it is for persons directly employed. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create any contractual relationship between any subcontractor and CITY. All persons engaged in the work will be considered employees of CONTRACTOR. CITY will deal directly with, and will make all payments to, CONTRACTOR.

Street Sweeping Equipment. The quality and quantity of the equipment used by CONTRACTOR for the sweeping of streets shall comply with Rule 1186.1 (Less Polluting Sweepers) and be sufficient to perform the work required herein within the hours of work specified herein. An absolute minimum of three (3) primary sweepers and one (1) back-up sweeper shall be provided. The sweepers shall be regenerative air vacuum type sweepers that comply with all Federal, State, County and CITY requirements and shall be used exclusively for the CITY OF GARDEN GROVE under this agreement. All sweepers shall be maintained in optimum condition and have safety features and shall be painted a uniform color and shall bear in legible letters the CONTRACTOR's name and the following wording:

UNDER CONTRACT TO THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE

Sweeping Equipment Drivers. CONTRACTOR shall furnish three (3) identifiable primary sweeper drivers, specifically and regularly assigned to the CITY OF GARDEN GROVE. CONTRACTOR'S drivers shall maintain good safety and driving records, in accordance with Federal, State, County and City regulations. The sweeping equipment shall not travel at a speed in excess of eight (8) miles per hour and use both side brushes when sweeping. The drivers shall be able to clearly communicate to City staff in English and

keep City staff informed when they leave from or return to an area. The CITY shall retain the right to demand the replacement of any driver.

Sweeper Maintenance. The CONTRACTOR shall maintain a facility for repair and care of sweepers used in the CITY OF GARDEN GROVE. Sweepers in use under this agreement shall be given priority response for repair and/or equipment delivery replacement. The facility must be available to CITY for inspection of capacity and repair time. CONTRACTOR shall minimize the down time of the street sweeping equipment during sweeping hours to no more than 2 hours. If a street sweeper is having continual maintenance issues, the City maintains the right to demand the permanent replacement of the sweeper for use in Garden Grove.

<u>Inclement Weather</u>. The Public Works Director, or authorized designee, shall be the sole authority for canceling scheduled street sweeping due to inclement weather. During inclement weather, a standby period until 9:30 a.m. will be observed before a scheduled residential sweep will be canceled.

<u>Holidays</u>. The CONTRACTOR shall not sweep streets on Saturdays or Sundays without prior authorization, nor on any of the following holidays observed by the CITY:

New Year's Day President's Day Memorial Day Fourth of July Labor Day Veterans Day Thanksgiving Day Christmas Day

<u>Disposal of Sweepings</u>. CONTRACTOR shall not deposit sweepings on CITY streets or in alleys. CONTRACTOR SHALL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR ALL COSTS RELATED TO TEMPORARY DUMP SITE FEES, PERMITS, LAWS AND REGULATIONS, PICK UP, REMOVAL, AND DISPOSAL OF ALL SWEEPINGS. CITY shall retain the right to demand abandonment of any temporary dump site within CITY limits and may request CONTRACTOR to establish different temporary dump sites, the location of which will be approved by the Director of Public Works prior to dumping.

<u>Stormwater Quality Requirements.</u> Contractor shall comply with all Federal, State, and Local laws and regulations designed to protect the beneficial use of waters of the State or U.S.

<u>Courteous Operation</u>. Contractor shall perform sweeping operations in a manner that causes a minimum inconvenience to the residents and businesses within the CITY. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that sweeper operators conduct their activities in a professional and courteous manner. CONTRACTOR shall formally investigate any complaints received by the CITY in a prompt and expedient manner, and shall provide a written report to the CITY regarding the resolution of said complaint within seven (7) business days from the date the complaint is forwarded to CONTRACTOR. CONTRACTOR shall ensure that equipment and vehicles do not create unnecessary

noise or dust during routine operations and shall be sensitive to performing sweeping operations in residential areas prior to 8:00 a.m.

Courteous operation shall also include other operational aspects to be discussed and outlined once the contract is awarded.

Accident Reports. Contractor shall provide a copy of any and all accidents involving CONTRACTOR'S vehicles, personnel and equipment while operating within the CITY, to the CITY within seven (7) days from the date of the accident. Said report shall include the date and time of the accident, and a copy of any law enforcement reports resulting from the accident. CONTRACTOR shall provide the name and contact information of CONTRACTOR'S safety officer, including cell phone for emergency contact.

Quality of Work. CONTRACTOR shall provide sufficient vehicles, equipment and staff to accomplish a high level of quality of services to the CITY. CONTRACTOR shall operate equipment in such a manner that it shall meet the design specifications of the equipment and shall do a thorough and complete job of removing debris and dirt from CITY streets. The CITY will regularly inspect all services to determine level of quality. For purposes of inspection, the level of quality shall include the following:

- a. Removal of all trash, litter or light foreign objects from along the curb line and the entire width of the sweeper path.
- b. Removal of all dirt, fine and light objects along curb line and the entire width of the sweeper path.
- c. Removal of trash, litter, leaves, dirt, or light foreign objects from storm drain inlet windows.

Quantities. Quantities indicated are the CITY'S best estimate of the total quantities required during the performance period, but actual quantities required may be greater or less than those indicated. Therefore, the successful Proposer shall agree to hold quoted per-unit prices firm during the performance period, whether total purchase quantities are greater or less than the quantities estimated.

CITY shall notify CONTRACTOR of any deficiencies upon discovery, and CONTRACTOR shall have 24-hours to re-sweep the area. Failure to consistently maintain quality of work levels may result in termination of any contract resulting from this solicitation.
