<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

To provide Housing Authority Commissioners the April 2019 Housing Authority Status Report.

BACKGROUND

The Housing Choice Voucher Program assists low-income families, senior citizens, and handicapped persons in the payment of their monthly rent. Under this program, a qualified participant pays a portion of his/her adjusted household income for rent. The remainder of the rent is paid by the City's Housing Authority utilizing funds received from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The units rented under the program are inspected on a biennial basis to ensure that they are decent, safe, sanitary, and have no code violations. Approximately 2,337 senior citizens, disabled persons, and families are funded by the Section 8 Rental Assistance Program.

DISCUSSION

The following is a status report for the month of April 2019:

<u>Program Eligibility</u>: All participants of the Housing Choice Voucher Program must be income eligible. Applicants are ranked on the Waiting List by local preferences. When an applicant is next on the Waiting List, they have an Initial Qualifying (IQ) interview where their eligibility is verified. If they are eligible, they receive a program briefing and their voucher. The Authority replaces those families who terminate from the program as a part of normal turnover. Once on the program, they are re-certified for eligibility at least annually and their portion of the rent adjusted according to their income.

<u>INITIAL QUALIFICATION (IQ) INTERVIEWS</u>: Staff conducted 37 Initial Qualification interview (IQ) from the Waiting List and the following:

- (a) Emergency Situations 0
- (b) Referred by a Garden Grove Homeless Shelter 0
- (c) Incoming Portability 0

Briefings: Four briefings were conducted this month, and 20 vouchers were issued.

<u>Re-certifications</u>: Staff conducted 223 re-examination interviews with participants to determine continued eligibility. One hundred and one were interviewed who had interim changes in income, which necessitated an adjustment in their portion of the rent.

<u>Moves</u>: Staff met with ten (10) tenants currently on the program that were moving and were briefed on move procedures.

<u>Terminations</u>: There were ten (10) families who terminated from the program during the month.

<u>FAMILY SELF-SUFFICIENCY PROGRAM (FSS)</u>: Assists families to become employed and no longer dependent on public assistance. The Family Self-Sufficiency Program enters into contracts with Voucher participants to provide support services such as education, training, and career development.

<u>Status of FSS participants this month</u>: There were no prospective FSS participants interviewed for the month of April. There were two contracts signed and two contracts were terminated. There are a total of 385 families who have signed contracts for the FSS program. Forty-four contracts are active. Five update meetings were held with FSS participants.

One hundred and thirty-two families have completed their FSS goals and 64 of these are self-sufficient and no longer need housing assistance. Eight families have purchased houses. There are 33 escrow accounts. Twenty-five escrow accounts are active with monthly deposits.

The Authority has paid out a total of \$1,081,506 in escrow funds to tenants who have completed their contract obligations. Each graduate that successfully completes his or her family obligations on the contract after October 21, 1998, reduces the minimum program size. The original program size of 140 is now reduced to 13.

<u>UNIT INSPECTIONS</u>: All units that are leased under the Housing Choice Voucher program must pass an initial Housing Quality Standards (HQS) inspection before the Housing Assistance Payments contract is signed, and must pass a biennial HQS inspection to continue to receive rental assistance payments. HQS inspections determine that the unit is decent, safe and sanitary, and has passed City building codes.

<u>New Leases</u>: There were 17 requests for new lease approvals with seven units passing and 10 units failing.

Annuals: There were 100 annual inspections conducted this month. Forty units

passed and 60 units failed to meet Housing Quality Standards (HQS) and code requirements. The owners were requested to make the necessary repairs.

<u>Re-inspections</u>: There were 106 re-inspections conducted on units that failed their first inspection.

<u>Move-out</u>: There were no move-out inspections conducted.

<u>Specials</u>: There were no special inspections conducted.

<u>Quality Control</u>: There were four quality control inspections conducted this month. These inspections are required by HUD to ensure that field staff is in compliance with inspection requirements and are conducted by supervisory staff.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

To provide a report regarding rental assistance and other support available to veterans through the Section 8 Rental Assistance Program and other HUD programs.

BACKGROUND

At the April 23, 2019, Housing Authority meeting, the Housing Authority Commission directed staff to look into what help may be available to assist Veterans through the Section 8 Rental Assistance Program. As part of this effort, it was requested that staff reach out to the City's Congressional representatives and other Housing Authorities to communicate the need for resources for veterans and to see what additional resources, if any, may be available.

DISCUSSION

In July 2010, the Garden Grove Housing Authority began accepting applications for its Section 8 Rental Assistance Program and created the program's current waiting list. At that time the Housing Authority received over 17,000 applications for rental assistance. Applications from very low-income families were placed on the waiting list, with veterans and victims of domestic violence prioritized to be on top of the list. The Housing Authority spent nearly three years contacting all qualifying applicants in these two prioritized categories. They were interviewed and provided rental assistance, including nearly 400 veterans. The remaining applicants on the waiting list are very low-income families, seniors, individuals with disabilities and other qualifying individuals. Presently, there are approximately 14,000 applicants waiting to receive assistance. The Housing Authority may have the ability to provide additional assistance to veterans who are not currently on the waiting list; but, this would further delay assistance to the current applicants on the waiting list.

Resources Available to Veterans

Most Orange County Housing Authorities operate similarly to Garden Grove Housing Authority with similar prioritization for Section 8 rental assistance. However, there are several Housing Authorities that offer supplemental programs for veterans. For example, the Orange County, Santa Ana and Anaheim Housing Authorities offer assistance to homeless veterans through the HUD-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing program, which combines Housing Choice Voucher rental assistance for homeless veterans with case management and clinical services provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs. Since Garden Grove Housing Authority does not have a HUD-VASH program, we are able to refer qualifying Veterans to the Long Beach Veterans Administration who will work to assist in placing qualifying veterans in one of the existing programs. Garden Grove Housing Authority can look into potential opportunities to seek funding for similar programs in Garden Grove in the future as well.

Outreach to Congressional Representatives

Over the past several years Garden Grove Housing Authority staff has met with and written letters to its Congressional representatives advocating for additional resources to augment the Section 8 Rental Assistance Program to more adequately meet the community's needs. We are pleased to report that past advocacy efforts have resulted in an approximate \$2 million budget increase in the current fiscal year, which will help the program address increases in rental costs and provide assistance to approximately 150 families who are currently on the waiting list. In response to Housing Authority direction, we have sent additional letters, emails, and made phone calls to our Congressional representatives expressing the need for supplemental resources to assist our veterans. We will continue to follow-up to advocate for funding for this purpose.
