<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

For the City Council to adopt the attached Resolution approving the retention schedule for City Fire Department records.

BACKGROUND

With the pending transition of the City's Fire Department to the Orange County Fire Authority (OCFA), all Fire Department records prior to the contract date of August 16, 2019, will be the City's responsibility for retention and/or destruction. Records after commencement of the contract will be OCFA's responsibility. The City's retention schedule for all departments was adopted by the City Council in 2015, and updates to the schedule are necessary to identify records including the Office of Record and to accurately align with the State of California's records retention schedule.

DISCUSSION

The attached Resolution to adopt the the City's Fire Department retention schedule has been reviewed by the City's Fire Department staff, City Clerk's Office staff, and the City Attorney's Office. Amendments to the 2015 adopted retention schedule are in line with State of California's records retention schedule and the Government Code. With adoption by the City Council, the retention schedule will be used to maintain the City's Fire Department records for the purpose of adhering to the Public Records Act.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE, CALIFORNIA, APPROVING THE RECORDS RETENTION SCHEDULE FOR THE GARDEN GROVE FIRE DEPARTMENT AS PROVIDED BY THE GOVERNMENT CODE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA, AND AMEND RESOLUTION NO. 9321-15

WHEREAS, the keeping of numerous records is not necessary after a certain period of time for the effective and efficient operation of the government of the City of Garden Grove;

WHEREAS, Section 34090 of the Government Code of the State of California provides a procedure whereby any City record that has served its purpose and is no longer required may be destroyed, and the destruction of said records will not interfere with the services and functions of the City; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Garden Grove does amend Resolution No. 9321-15 as provided herein.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Garden Grove does establish the following:

SECTION 1. The Garden Grove Fire Department Records Retention Schedule as set forth on Exhibit A, which schedule is attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference, are hereby authorized to be managed as provided by Section 34090 of the Government Code of the State of California and in accordance with the provisions of said schedule. The City Clerk's Office, may destroy records per the retention schedule with the consent in writing of the City Attorney, without further action by the City Council.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1, the duplicates of records not less than two (2) years old that are no longer required are hereby authorized to be destroyed as set forth in the attached Exhibit A.

<u>SECTION 3.</u> Paper records retained for longer than two (2) years may be destroyed if there is an electronic copy, whereas the electronic copy will become the original permanent copy.

<u>SECTION 4</u>. The destruction of any record as provided for herein shall be by burning, shredding, or other effective method of destruction.

<u>SECTION 5</u>. The term "records" as used herein shall include documents, instruments, books, microfilm, emails, electronic files and documents, CD's or paper.

<u>SECTION 6.</u> Records not identified on the schedule will follow County, State or Federal Guidelines for retention and/or destruction.

<u>SECTION 7</u>. This Resolution is effective upon its adoption.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

To obtain authorization for travel related expenses for Council Member Thu-Ha Nguyen to participate in the Multi-Cultural Leadership Korea Visitation Program and related visit to the Republic of Korea from October 9-19, 2019.

<u>BACKGROUND</u>

The Goodwill Cooperation Service International, Los Angeles (GCS Los Angeles), is sponsoring its 18^{t h} annual Multi-Cultural Leadership Korea Visitation Program in cooperation with Kyunghee University in Seoul, Korea. The purpose of the program is to assist non-Korean community leaders to better understand the people of Korean ancestry in the United States in terms of their history and culture so that a peaceful and cooperative spirit may be enhanced among the people living in our multi-cultural and multi-racial community.

As part of the program, participants attend lectures on Korean history, culture, politics, economics and on the Korean government. City staff and members of the City Council have participated in this leadership program since its inception in 2000 to strengthen and better understand the Korean-American business community in Garden Grove.

DISCUSSION

Council Member Thu-Ha Nguyen has been selected to participate in this year's Multi-Cultural Leadership Visitation Program, in Seoul, Korea, from October 9-17, 2019. As part of the visit, Council Member Nguyen will also meet with the City's colleagues in Anyang, Republic of Korea, on October 17-19, 2019, to discuss business, cultural, and governmental exchange activities as well as to continue to foster friendship and cooperation as we celebrate the 30th year of our Sister City relationship with the City of Anyang.

A majority of the program costs are covered by GCS Los Angeles. However, a nominal participation fee of \$700 is required for airfare. In addition, the City will be responsible for two additional nights of accommodation associated with the visit to Anyang. Pursuant to the City's expense guidelines and reimbursement policy for city council members, expenses for out-of-state and international travel require prior City Council approval.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The estimated cost related to travel and lodging is \$1,100. Funds for this expense will be paid from the FY 2019-20 City Council budget.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

• Authorize travel related expenses for Council Member Thu-Ha Nguyen to participate in the GCS Los Angeles, Multi-Cultural Leadership Korea Visitation Program to the Republic of Korea from October 9-17, 2019 and City of Anyang, Republic of Korea visit from October 17-19, 2019.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

For City Council to authorize issuance of purchase orders with Econolite Control Products (Econolite) and JTB Supply Company Inc. (JTB Supply) for the purchase of traffic control products.

<u>BACKGROUND</u>

Current purchasing policy requires competitive bidding for supply and equipment purchases exceeding \$1,999. Moreover, "open" orders are used for various categories of items, such as hardware, electrical supplies and minor equipment, when the required individual items or quantities cannot be determined in advance.

Due to the nature of traffic control day-to-day operations, specifically, staff's obligation to respond rapidly to traffic signal outages, pole knockdowns, etc., Traffic Engineering is requesting open purchase orders with JTB Supply and Econolite.

DISCUSSION

Econolite controllers exclusively support the City's traffic signal system. These devices are located at each signalized intersection and are housed in an aboveground cabinet. The controllers ensure proper timing and coordination of all red, green, and yellow signal phases as well as pedestrian movements. Econolite controllers have proven reliable and have kept traffic flowing safely and efficiently throughout the City.

JTB Supply provides traffic signal hardware from seventeen (17) manufacturers,

offering competitive pricing for most of their products. JTB Supply provides rapid turnarounds on our most urgent requests, and their nearby distribution center in the City of Orange allows our traffic signal electricians to pick up any emergency orders almost immediately.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The cost for the purchase orders will be covered in the Fiscal Year 2019-20 Engineering budget.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Authorize the Finance Director to issue a Purchase Order to Econolite Control Products, in the amount not to exceed \$75,000, to purchase Econolite controllers; and
- Authorize the Finance Director to issue a Purchase Order to JTB Supply Company, Inc., in the amount not to exceed \$125,000, to purchase traffic control products.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

To present to the City Council a resolution authorizing the City Manager or his designee to waive the formal bidding process as an emergency condition, declaring the necessity thereof, and authorizing staff to proceed with emergency repairs to the Police Department emergency generator.

BACKGROUND

The Public Works Vehicle Maintenance Division is responsible for providing safe and reliable vehicles and equipment. Recently, the emergency generator at the Police Department developed a diesel fuel leak and was deemed unrepairable. Due to the environmental issues associated with this tank, it was necessary to initiate repairs immediately. This emergency affects the health and safety of the public, as well as City property.

<u>DISCUSSION</u>

Quinn Power Systems is a recognized leader in the industry and is factory trained and authorized to repair Caterpillar generators. Additionally, they have been a longstanding vendor for repairs to the City's emergency generators. Staff is requesting that an emergency purchase order be issued so as to initiate repairs while a contract is being secured.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no impact to the General Fund. The total cost for all services is

approximately \$72,000 and will be funded through the Fleet Management operating budget.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that City Council:

- Adopt the attached Resolution authorizing the City Manager or his designee to waive the formal bidding process as an emergency condition, declaring the necessity thereof, and authorizing staff to proceed with emergency repairs to the Police Department emergency generator.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER OR HIS DESIGNEE TO WAIVE THE FORMAL BIDDING PROCESS AS AN EMERGENCY CONDITION, DECLARING THE NECESSITY THEREOF, AND AUTHORIZING STAFF TO PROCEED WITH EMERGENCY REPAIRS TO THE POLICE DEPARTMENT EMERGENCY GENERATOR

WHEREAS, Sections 22035 and 22050 of the Public Contracts Code provide that upon adoption by the City Council by a four-fifths vote of a resolution declaring that the public interest and necessity demand the immediate expenditure of public funds to safeguard life, health, or property in order to proceed with emergency work without notice for bids to let a contract for such emergency work;

WHEREAS, the staff report accompanying this Resolution sets forth the facts supporting a finding that an emergency exists relating to the condition of the emergency generator and that the public interest and necessity demand the immediate expenditure of funds to repair the generator to safeguard life, health or property;

WHEREAS, Section 22050 also provides that the resolution may delegate to the City Manager, or other officer, the authority to order any action required by the emergency and to procure the necessary equipment, services, and supplies for those purposes, without giving notice for bids to let the contracts; and

WHEREAS, the City Manager has ordered that the work commence in order to repair the generator as expeditiously as possible.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE, CALIFORNIA, HEREBY RESOLVES, FINDS AND DETERMINES AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. That the public interest and necessity demand the immediate expenditure of public funds to safeguard life, health, or property in order to proceed with emergency work for the repair of the emergency generator located at the Police Department.
- 2. That the emergency will not permit a delay that would result from a competitive solicitation for bids and that action is necessary to respond to the emergency related to the conditions of the emergency generator.
- 3. That the City Manager or his designee is hereby authorized to order any action required to remedy the emergency relating to the condition of the emergency generator and to procure the necessary equipment, services, and supplies for those purposes, without giving notice for bids to let contracts.

4. That to the extent the City Manager has already authorized the work to be commenced, the City Manager's actions authorizing the emergency work are hereby approved and ratified.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

To obtain City Council approval for a new four (4) year Memorandum of Understanding (hereinafter "MOU") with the Garden Grove Police Management Association (hereinafter "PMA").

BACKGROUND

The City, at the Council's direction, met and conferred with the PMA and agreed to an MOU term of July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2022. The prior MOU expired on June 30, 2018.

DISCUSSION

The MOU does not provide for any retroactive increases for the first year of the contract, FY 18/19. The City and the PMA agreed to the following in the second year, FY 19/20: 2% base salary increase and \$385/pay period POST Certificate Pay. The third year of the MOU, FY 20/21, provides for a 2.5% base salary increase, 1% salary increase to Step H of the salary range, and a \$150 increase to the City's monthly cafeteria benefits. The fourth year of the MOU, FY 21/22, provides a new 4% Step I at the top of the salary range, and a \$100 increase to the City's monthly cafeteria benefits.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The estimated incremental costs for the agreed MOU provisions, based on current

employee salaries, are approximately \$154,890 for FY 2019/20, an additional \$76,977 for FY 2020/21 and an additional \$35,766 for FY 2021/22.

Future budgets appropriations will be made as appropriate to accommodate these estimated costs.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

 Adopt the attached Resolution that approves the Memorandum of Understanding between the Garden Grove Police Management Association and the City.

That the Memorandum of Understanding on Salaries, Wages, and Fringe Benefits 2018-2022, by and between the Garden Grove Police Management Association and the City of Garden Grove, and signed by the President on behalf of the Garden Grove Police Management Association, and the Human Resources Director on behalf of the City of Garden Grove, is hereby approved.

2. That all prior Resolutions in conflict herewith are hereby repealed so as to avoid all conflict.

CITY OF GARDEN GROVE MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING PURSUANT TO THE CALIFORNIA MEYERS-MILIAS-BROWN ACT BY AND BETWEEN THE GARDEN GROVE POLICE MANAGEMENT ASSOCIATION AND THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE

2018 - 2022

THIS MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU) has been prepared pursuant to Resolution No. 4066-71, as amended, of the City of Garden Grove, which Resolution is generally identified as the "EMPLOYEE RELATIONS RESOLUTION" and the Government Code Sections 3500 through 3510, as amended, which is generally referred to as the Meyers-Milias-Brown Act.

This MOU has been developed as a result of the requests of the Garden Grove Police Management Association and the City of Garden Grove. The items in this MOU are subject to the approval of the City Manager and the City Council of the City of Garden Grove and will be placed into effect upon the taking of administrative action by the City Manager's Office and the adoption of the necessary ordinances and resolutions by the City Council, if acceptable to them, in accordance with the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth.

For simplicity of language and usage, whenever the male pronoun is used, it shall be assumed to apply to both genders.

The term of this Memorandum of Understanding shall be from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2022.

POLICE MANAGEMENT ASSOCIATION/CITY MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

2018 - 2022

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SECTION 1: MANAGEMENT RECOGNITION AND MANAGEMENT RIGHTS

- A. This MOU establishes wages, benefits, terms and conditions of employment for the Police Management classifications of Police Lieutenant and Police Captain.
- B. All management rights and functions except those which are clearly and expressly limited in this MOU shall remain vested exclusively in the City. It is expressly recognized merely by way of illustration and not by way of limitation that such rights and functions include, but are not limited to:
 - i. Manage the City.
 - ii. Establish and schedule working hours.
 - iii. Establish, modify, or change work schedules or standards.
 - iv. Institute changes in procedures.
 - v. Direct the work force, including the right to hire, promote, demote, transfer, suspend, discipline or discharge any employee.
 - vi. Determine the location of any new facilities, buildings, departments, divisions, or subdivisions thereof, and the relocation, sale, leasing or closing of facilities, departments, divisions, or subdivisions thereof.
 - vii. Determine services to be rendered and frequency thereof.
 - viii. Determine the layout of buildings and equipment and materials to be used therein.
 - ix. Determine processes, techniques, methods, and means of performing work.
 - x. Determine the size, character and use of inventories.
 - xi. Determine financial policy including accounting procedure; establish and administer the fiscal year budget.
 - xii. Determine the administrative organization of the City including those of departments, divisions, bureaus, units, and other subdivisions.
 - xiii. Determine selection, promotion, or transfer of employees.
 - xiv. Determine the size and characteristics of the work force.
 - xv. Determine the allocation and assignment of work to employees.
 - xvi. Determine policy affecting the selection of new employees.
 - xvii. Determine the establishment of quality and quantity standards and the judgment of quality and quantity standards of work required.
 - xviii. Determine administration of discipline.
 - xix. Determine control and use of City property, materials, and equipment.
 - xx. Schedule work periods and determine the number and duration of work periods.
 - xxi. Establish, modify, eliminate or enforce rules and regulations.
 - xxii. Place work with outside firms.
 - xxiii. Determine the kinds and numbers of personnel necessary to execute the City mission.
 - xxiv. Determine the methods and means by which such operations are to be conducted.
 - xxv. Require employees, where necessary, to take in service training courses during working hours.
 - xxvi. Determine duties to be included in any job classifications.

- xxvii. Take any necessary action to carry out the mission of the City in cases of an emergency, urgency, or other unusual situations.
- xxviii. Prescribe a uniform dress to be worn by designated employees.

The exercise of the foregoing powers, rights, authority, duties, and responsibilities by the City, adoption of policies, rules, regulations, and practices in furtherance thereof, and the use of judgment and discretion in connection therewith, shall be limited only by the specific and express terms of this MOU, and then only to the extent such specific and express terms are in conformance with law. As pursuant to the law, all subjects, in relation to wages, hours, and working conditions will continue to be the subject of meet and confer or meet and consult, whichever is applicable.

C. All provisions for wages, hours, fringe benefits, terms and conditions of employment not specifically enumerated herein shall continue to be provided in the same amount, time, place, and manner as was done during the period of the prior Police Management Resolution.

SECTION 2: SALARY RANGE MERIT STEP ELIGIBILITY

Step increases for individual employees are granted in recognition of merit. The normal time intervals between the steps are as follows:

Step B to Step C	One year	
Step C to Step D	One year	
Step D to Step E	One year	
Step E to Step F	One year	
Step F to Step G	One year	
Step G to Step H	One year	
Step H to Step I	One year	

SECTION 3: SALARY AND COMPENSATION

1. <u>Wages</u>

Effective in the pay period following July 1, 2019, all members shall receive a two percent (2.0%) increase to base salary.

Effective in the pay period following July 1, 2020, Step H on the salary schedule shall be five percent (5%) higher than Step G.

Effective in the pay period following July 1, 2020, all members shall receive a two and one half percent (2.5%) increase to base salary.

Effective in the pay period following July 1, 2021, Step I (a four percent 4% step) on the salary schedule shall be created. All members of the Association who, on July 1, 2021, are at Step H for at least one year, will move to Step I effective on the first day of the pay period following July 1, 2021. All members of the bargaining unit who, on July 1, 2021 have not been at Step H for at least one year, will be eligible to move to Step I on the first day of the pay period in which their next anniversary date occurs.

2. Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Certification Pay

Effective July 1, 2019, Police Lieutenants are eligible to receive \$385 per pay period for being currently enrolled in or having completed the POST Management Course.

Effective July 1, 2019, Police Captains are eligible to receive \$385 per pay period for possession of a POST Management Certificate.

SECTION 4: FRINGE BENEFITS

A. <u>Cafeteria Plan</u>

- i. The City shall make a monthly fringe benefit contribution for each eligible member of the unit to be used toward the cafeteria plan. These funds shall only be used for eligible plans included within the cafeteria plan. The plan includes health, dental, vision, and cash.
- ii. Health Care or Dependent Care: Employees may deduct monies on an annual basis into a medical reimbursement account or a childcare account up to the maximum permitted by law.
- iii. All employees must enroll in one of the PERS health program plans, unless they submit to the City both (1) proof of health coverage and (2) sign a health insurance waiver. Employees who fail to complete both requirements shall not be allowed to utilize their cafeteria plan

contributions for any other eligible plans. Employees who wish to opt out of medical coverage by the City must provide proof of minimum essential coverage ("MEC") through another sources (other than coverage in the individual market, whether or not obtained through Covered California).

- iv. An employee who selects the option of not enrolling ("Waiver of Coverage") in one of the PERS plans and who meets the conditions outlined in section 4.A.(iii) shall receive a \$205.00 per month (\$355.00 effective July 1, 2020, \$455.00 effective July 1, 2021) in cash paid out each pay period.
- v. Affordable Care Act: The parties agree that either party may reopen negotiations during the term of his MOU to consider the impact of the Affordable Care Act on the City, the Association and the employees it is recognized to represent. This reopener is limited to the impact of the Act and nothing else. The parties agree that neither side will be required to negotiate on any other topic, including, but not limited to compensation and benefits. No changes will be made without a mutual agreement of the parties.

vi. FRINGE BENEFIT CONTRIBUTIONS EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2020:

Employee only	\$805 per month
Employee plus 1	\$1270 per month
Employee plus 2 or more	\$1550 per month
Waiver of Coverage	\$355 per month

vii. FRINGE BENEFIT CONTRIBUTIONS EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2021:

Employee plus 1	\$1370 per month
Employee plus 2 or more	\$1650 per month
Waiver of Coverage	\$455 per month

B. Tuition Reimbursement

Police Lieutenants and Police Captains are eligible to participate in the Tuition Reimbursement Program offered to other management employees.

C. <u>Retirement Plan</u>

- i. Retirement Formula
 - a) Unit members who are regarded as "classic members" as defined by the Public Employees' Pension Reform Act of 2013 (PEPRA) are

covered by the 3% @ 50 formula (Government Code section 21362.2). "Classic member" is generally defined as any member hired before December 31, 2012 as well as any member hired after January 1, 2013 who is a lateral hire from another PERS agency, public agency with reciprocity or a member who has had less than a six month break in service from his/her previous public agency employment.

- i) One-Year Final Compensation option "single highest year" (Government Code section 20042).
- b) Unit members hired on or after January 1, 2013 who are defined as "new members" under PEPRA, are covered by the 2.7% @ 57 formula (Government Code section 7522.25(d)).
 - Final compensation will be based on the highest annual average pensionable compensation during the 36 consecutive months immediately preceding the effective date of his or her retirement, or some other 36 consecutive month period designated by the member per Government Code section 7522.32(a).

ii. Employee Contributions to the Retirement System

a) Employees subject to the 3%@50 Formula:

These employees shall contribute twelve percent (12%) as an employee retirement contribution. The twelve percent shall be comprised of nine percent (9%) of compensation earnable as the required CalPERS member contribution and three percent (3%) of compensation earnable per Government Code section 20516(a). All 12% shall be regarded as member contributions and credited to members' accounts.

b) Employees subject to the 2.7%@57 Formula:

Per the PEPRA and Government Code section 20516.5, these employees shall contribute the statutorily mandated employee contribution rate as determined by CalPERS for the City. The City will receive the normal cost rate from CalPERS in its annual valuation report which will also include the rate (which is in quarter of a percent increments) at which new members will be charged for their employee/member contribution.

iii. The City has adopted the CalPERS resolution in accordance with and as permitted by IRS Code section 414(h)(2) to ensure (i.e., "pick up" as that

term is used in section 414 (h)(2) of their employee contribution is made on a pre-tax basis.

iv. Pay Off at Retirement

At the time of an Association member's retirement, the City shall pay the employee an amount equal to 100% of his/her total accumulated but unused sick leave hours up to a maximum of 750 hours accumulated but unused sick leave. Any remaining accumulated but unused sick leave hours will be used toward the extension of his service period under the PERS retirement system, subject to Government Code Section 20965.

At the request of the Association member, 100% of his/her accumulated but unused sick leave hours may be used toward the extension of his service period under Government Code Section 20965 and no payout will occur.

D. Retiree Medical Contribution

Effective July 1, 2000, the City shall contribute to the Police Association Retiree Medical Trust Fund (or a similar retiree medical premium plan) an amount equal to the average annual cost, but not to exceed 1.6% of salary for the positions of Police Lieutenant or Police Captain. The salary total for the positions of Police Lieutenant and Police Captain will be, for the purposes of this calculation only, increased by 2%. In doing so, the Police Management Association warrants that there are no legal barriers to the validity of the trust fund or to payment by the City to such a trust fund, and that by making any such payment, the City would assume no obligation or liability to the trust fund (or alternative plan) or its beneficiaries, or to the Police Management Association.

E. Additional Fringe Benefits

Increases of additional fringe benefits made for the Police Association members shall also be provided to the Police Management Association.

F. Sick Leave

Association members shall accrue sick leave at the rate of ten (10) hours per calendar month.

G. <u>Uniforms</u>

The City shall provide up to four work uniforms per year on an as-needed basis.

The City shall report to CalPERS the monetary value of uniforms and uniform maintenance for those employees required to wear uniforms. This shall apply to "Classic" members, not new members per Title 2 California Code of Regulations section 571(a)(5) as defined by the Public Employees' Pension Reform Act of 2013. The monetary value by classification is listed in Exhibit A, entitled "UNIFORM ALLOWANCE."

Uniform allowance is defined as compensation paid or the monetary value for the purchase, rental and/or maintenance of required clothing, including clothing made from specially designed protective fabrics, which is a ready substitute for personal attire the employee would otherwise have to acquire and maintain.

H. <u>Holidays</u>

i. <u>General Provision</u>

Effective January 1, 2016, each Association employee will receive a total of 126 hours of pay in-lieu of holiday as designated below in subsection H(iv). The holidays are ten (10) holidays at ten (10) hours of pay and two (2) holidays at eight (8) hours of pay. This additional compensation will be paid as the holiday occurs and shall be reported to PERS as Special Compensation pursuant to Title 2, Division 1, Chapter 2 of the California Code of Regulations, specifically § 571(a)(5) – Statutory Items, Holiday Pay.

ii. <u>Part-Year Employment</u>

An Association employee who commences employment at a time other than the beginning of a calendar year shall only be entitled to receive those holidays described in subsection H(iv) that occur during the period actually worked.

iii. Effect of Unpaid Leave of Absence

An employee who is on an unpaid leave of absence during any holiday designated in subsection H(iv) is not entitled to receive any holiday benefits for that holiday.

iv. Designated Holidays

January 1st (New Year's Day) Third Monday of January (Martin Luther King Jr. Day)* Third Monday of February (President's Day) Last Monday of May (Memorial Day) July 4th (Independence Day) First Monday in September (Labor Day) Second Monday of October (Columbus Day)* November 11th (Veteran's Day) Fourth Thursday in November (Thanksgiving Day) The Day after Thanksgiving December 24th (Christmas Eve) December 25th (Christmas Day) December 31st (New Year's Eve)

- * Eight (8) hour Holiday
- v. Holiday End of Year Cash Out

Any portion of the annual holiday hours not used at the end of the calendar year will be relinquished in return for a cash payment equal to the value of those benefits based upon the employee's hourly rate of pay in effect on December 31 of the calendar year in question.

To the extent permitted by law, Holiday Cash Out will be reported to CalPERS as special compensation per Title 2 California Code of Regulations section 571(a)(5) for "Classic" members as Holiday Pay.

SECTION 5: ADMINISTRATIVE LEAVE

The Police Management positions listed in this MOU shall be exempt from all overtime provisions contained in the Municipal Code or in any Memorandum of Understanding in the group(s) supervised, except as specifically authorized by the City Manager.

Employees in Police Management positions shall receive forty (40) hours of Administrative Leave each January. Upon the Police Chief's recommendation, the City Manager may approve additional Administrative Leave hours, not to exceed forty (40) hours, for employees involved in additional major projects or assignments. The granting of additional leave time shall be at the sole determination of the City Manager.

Administrative Leave cannot be cashed out at any time. No employee may have more than eighty (80) hours of Administrative Leave time on the books at any time without the City Manager's approval. All Administrative Leave granted in a calendar year must be used by the end of the same calendar year, or it is forfeited. The City Manager shall establish procedures for employees who are hired or who terminate during a calendar year.

SECTION 6: EXEMPT POLICE MANAGEMENT CLASSES

All classes listed in this Police Management MOU shall be designated as exempt and be considered to be exempt from the provisions of the Municipal Code Section 2.44.390 and from the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) except as determined by the City Manager.

The appointment and removal of Division heads are governed by the Municipal Code Section 2.08.100.

Those employees who have used all their accrued leave benefits and are absent for less than one (1) day shall not have that time treated as an absence without pay.

Employees in this category shall be subject to disciplinary actions involving unpaid time off in accordance with FLSA regulations.

SECTION 7: EFFECTIVE DATE AND TERM

Following ratification of this MOU by the membership of the Association and approval thereof by the City Council of the City of Garden Grove, said agreement shall be effective from July 1, 2018, through and including June 30, 2022. During the term of said agreement, neither party shall propose any improvements in wages, hours, or working conditions concerning the affected employees which are to take effect prior to the expiration date of said agreement, except as explicitly outlined herein.

Council Member Brietigam commented that he initiated this matter because Garden Grove is the only city with districts without district budgets. He suggested that each district budget be in the amount of \$5,000 with the Mayor's budget to be \$10,000; that this funding would be used under limitations and with oversight by the City Manager with the purpose of using it for minor improvements or small events.

City Council consensus was in support of district budgets, but to have parameters established in order to prevent misuse of funds. Following further discussion, it was moved by Council Member Brietigam, seconded by Council Member O'Neill that staff be directed to research other cities, and to provide an analysis to establish parameters on district budgets. (F: 34.1) (F: 46.1)

MATTERS FROM THE MAYOR, CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS, AND CITY MANAGER (Continued)

Council Member Brietigam stated that he is working with staff on a business recognition event for businesses celebrating a milestone such as 20 or 30 years plus in District 1. He stated that the cost would be about \$200 for certificates, and that once he has the event date he is hoping the Mayor will attend. He expressed that the illegal fireworks exploding in his district over the July 4th holiday was overwhelming, and he would like to resolve this issue suggesting a report and reward program. He stated that the City is in the public service business and that now that the budget has been adopted, he would like time taken to look into keeping City Hall open every Friday. He suggested employee rotation on Fridays in

order for employees to maintain a 9/80 schedule. He noted that he read the recently published article that the City did not fully disclose the cost of pay increases for Police Department staff in an agenda report, and stated that the article is inaccurate and disingenuous.

Council Member O'Neill expressed appreciation for the proactive approach taken by the Police Department, which is a good start to address illegal fireworks. He stated that the Police and Fire Departments are doing a great job, noting the difficulty with catching people exploding illegal fireworks. He noted one of his constituents at tonight's meeting bringing up the condition of the street in his neighborhood, and commented on the challenge shared by all of the districts in funding road improvements. He suggested the need for a 30 year plan for street, curb and gutter improvements. He commended Code Enforcement for their work and expressed the importance of property maintenance.

Council Member T. Nguyen agreed with Council Member Brietigam's suggestion to explore a report and reward program for illegal fireworks as long as it is within a legal framework. She wished Council Member K. Nguyen an early happy birthday.

Council Member K. Nguyen requested staff have the Resolution promoting harmony and safety be translated into the predominant languages and made available to people in order for them to be aware of their rights.

Council Member Klopfenstein thanked Ana Pulido and the Channel 3 staff for their work on the tip and toss challenge video to promote west nile virus awareness, noting the very real threat of the virus to people and their pets. She wished Council Member K. Nguyen an early happy birthday.

City Manager Stiles noted that the Code Enforcement webpage has a link for reporting a violation. Census materials are slated to be provided to the City and more information on the process will be coming soon. The former Kia dealership on Garden Grove Boulevard has been demolished to make way for the next phase of the Brookhurst Triangle project. He noted that all of the Departments need to analyze how to meet staffing needs and any other challenges for keeping City Hall open every Friday. He stated that the Resolution promoting harmony and safety will be translated and posted online.

City Attorney Sandoval announced that no reportable action was taken during closed session. He noted that the Government Code does allow for a reward program for turning in perpetrators; however, it would be up to the City Council to establish and adopt parameters.

ADJOURNMENT

At 8:10 p.m., Mayor Jones adjourned the meeting. The next Regular City Council Meeting will be held on Tuesday, August 13, 2019, at 5:30 p.m. at the Community Meeting Center, 11300 Stanford Avenue, Garden Grove, California.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

For the City Council to conduct a public hearing to receive comments and to approve the City's 2019 Drinking Water Public Health Goal Report.

BACKGROUND

In 1974, Congress passed the Safe Drinking Water Act to ensure that municipalities provide safe, clean drinking water. The act sets the mandatory and enforceable levels of constituents in water known as Maximum Contaminant Levels (MCLs). The range and value of these constituents must be communicated to customers annually in our Water Quality Report. Staff prepared this report and it has been available on the City's website as of July 1, 2019, as required by the State Water Resources Control Board. Additionally, California's Health and Safety Code Section 116470(b) requires a separate report be generated detailing any contaminants that exceed the Public Health Goal levels (PHG) set by the state Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA), referred to as the Public Health Goal Report. If there are no exceedances of the PHGs, no report is required. Also, any PHG Report is not required to be sent to residents, however, it must be made available upon request.

DISCUSSION

The City of Garden Grove's water supply continues to be in full compliance with all enforceable standards required by state and federal regulatory agencies.

PHGs established by the OEHHA and Maximum Contaminant Level Goals (MCLGs) established by the United States Environmental Protection Agency are based solely on public health risk considerations being set at levels where the health risks are very low, or zero. The determinations of health risks at these low levels are frequently theoretical. The apparent purpose of the PHG Report is to give water system customers access to information on levels of contaminants, even below the enforceable mandatory MCLs. PHGs and MCLGs are not enforceable.

Additionally, agencies that operate water systems are required to report any exceeded PHGs or MCLGs to their governing bodies and to hold a public hearing to accept and respond to public comment related to any exceedances. The Public Health Goal Report is only required if a PHG was exceeded on a three (3) year reporting cycle.

For the 2019 Public Health Goal Report, seven (7) contaminants: arsenic, bromate, uranium, gross alpha, gross beta, total coliform bacteria, and perchlorate are required to be reported to governing bodies and consumers because they exceed the PHGs, although none of the samples exceeded any enforceable regulatory levels.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no financial impact to the city. The City of Garden Grove meets or exceeds all enforceable standards required by state and federal regulatory agencies.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Conduct a Public Hearing; and
- Approve the Public Health Goal Report as submitted.

2019 Public Health Goals (PHGs) Report

City of Garden Grove

1.0 Introduction

Under the Calderon-Sher Safe Drinking Water Act of 1996 public water systems in California serving greater than 10,000 service connections must prepare a report containing information on 1) detection of any contaminant in drinking water at a level exceeding a Public Health Goal (PHG), 2) estimate of costs to remove detected contaminants to below the PHG using Best Available Technology (BAT), and 3) health risks for each contaminant exceeding a PHG. This report must be made available to the public every three years. The initial PHG Report was due on July 1, 1998, and subsequent reports are due every three years thereafter.

The 2019 PHGs Report has been prepared to address the requirements set forth in Section 116470 of the California Health and Safety Code. It is based on water quality analyses during calendar years 2016, 2017, and 2018 or, if certain analyses were not performed during those years, the most recent data available. The 2019 PHGs Report has been designed to be as informative as possible, without unnecessary duplication of information contained in the Consumer Confidence Report, which is made available to customers by July 1st of each year.

There are no regulations explaining requirements for the preparation of PHGs reports. A workgroup of the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) Water Quality Committee has prepared suggested guidelines for water utilities to use in preparing PHGs reports. The ACWA guidelines were used in the preparation of this 2019 PHGs Report. These guidelines include tables of cost estimates for BAT. The State of California (State) provides ACWA with numerical health risks and category of health risk information for contaminants with PHGs. This health risk information is appended to the ACWA guidelines.

2.0 California Drinking Water Regulatory Process

California Health and Safety Code Section 116365 requires the State to develop a PHG for every contaminant with a primary drinking water standard or for any contaminant the State is proposing to regulate with a primary drinking water standard. A PHG is the level of a contaminant in drinking water that poses no significant health risk if consumed for a lifetime. The process of establishing a PHG is a risk assessment based strictly on human health considerations. PHGs are recommended targets and are not required to be met by any public water system.

The State office designated to develop PHGs is the California Environmental Protection Agency's Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment (OEHHA). The PHG is then forwarded to the State Water Resources Control Board, Division of Drinking Water (DDW) for use in revising or developing a Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL) in drinking water. The MCL is the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. State MCLs cannot be less stringent than federal MCLs and must be as close as is technically and economically feasible to the PHGs. DDW is required to take treatment technologies and cost of compliance into account when setting an MCL. Each MCL is reviewed at least once every five years.

Total chromium and two radiological contaminants (gross alpha particle and gross beta particle) have MCLs but do not yet have designated PHGs. For these contaminants, the Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG), the federal U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) equivalent of PHGs, is used in the PHGs Report.

3.0 Identification of Contaminants

Section 116470(b)(1) of the Health and Safety Code requires public water systems serving more than 10,000 service connections to identify each contaminant detected in

drinking water that exceeded the applicable PHG. Section 116470(f) requires the MCLG to be used for comparison if there is no applicable PHG.

The City of Garden Grove (City) water system has approximately 33,692 service connections. The following constituents were detected at one or more locations within the drinking water system at levels that exceeded the applicable PHGs or MCLGs:

- Arsenic naturally-occurring in local groundwater.
- Bromate formed when naturally-occurring bromide reacts with ozone during the disinfection process in surface water purchased from Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWDSC).
- Coliform Bacteria, Total naturally-occurring in the environment but can also be an indicator of the presence of other pathogenic organisms originating from sewage, livestock or other wildlife.
- **Perchlorate** industrial contamination in groundwater
- Gross alpha particle activity (gross alpha) naturally-occurring in local groundwater and surface water purchased from MWDSC
- **Gross beta particle activity** (gross beta) naturally-occurring in surface water purchased from MWDSC
- **Uranium** naturally-occurring in local groundwater and in surface water purchased from MWDSC.

The accompanying table shows the applicable PHG or MCLG and MCL for each contaminant identified above. The table includes the maximum, minimum, and average concentrations of each contaminant in drinking water supplied by the City in calendar years 2016 through 2018.

4.0 Numerical Public Health Risks

Section 116470(b)(2) of the Health and Safety Code requires disclosure of the numerical public health risk, determined by OEHHA, associated with the MCLs, Action Levels,

PHGs and MCLGs. Available numerical health risks developed by OEHHA for the contaminants identified above are shown on the accompany table. Only numerical risks associated with cancer-causing chemicals have been quantified by OEHHA. Cancer risk is stated in terms of "excess" cancer cases per million population.

Arsenic – OEHHA has determined the theoretical health risk associated with the PHG is one excess case of cancer in a million people. USEPA has determined the risk associated with the MCL is 2.5 excess cases of cancer in 1,000 people exposed over a 70-year lifetime.

Bromate – OEHHA has determined the theoretical health risk associated with the PHG is 1 excess case of cancer in a million people. USEPA has determined the risk associated with the MCL is 1 excess case of cancer in 10,000 people exposed over a 70-year lifetime.

Coliform Bacteria, Total – OEHHA has not established a PHG. USEPA has established an MCLG of 0.

Gross Alpha – OEHHA has not established a PHG. USEPA has established an MCLG of 0. USEPA has determined the risk associated with the MCL is 1 excess case of cancer in 1,000 people over a lifetime exposure.

Gross Beta – OEHHA has not established a PHG. USEPA has established an MCLG of 0. USEPA has determined the risk associated with the MCL is 2 excess cases of cancer in 1,000 people over a lifetime exposure.

Perchlorate – OEHHA has not established a numerical health risk for perchlorate because PHGs for non-carcinogenic chemicals in drinking water are set at a concentration at which no known or anticipated adverse health risks will occur, with an adequate margin of safety.

Uranium – OEHHA has determined the theoretical health risk associated with the PHG is 1 excess case of cancer in a million people. USEPA has determined the risk associated with the MCL is 5 excess cases of cancer in 100,000 people exposed over a 70-year lifetime.

5.0 Identification of Risk Categories

Section 116470(b)(3) of the Health and Safety Code requires identification of the category of risk to public health associated with exposure to the contaminant in drinking water, including a brief, plainly worded description of those terms. The risk categories and definitions for the contaminants identified above are shown on the accompanying table.

6.0 Description of Best Available Technology

Section 116470(b)(4) of the Health and Safety Code requires a description of the best available technology, if any is available on a commercial basis, to remove or reduce the concentrations of the contaminants identified above. The BATs are shown on the accompanying table.

7.0 Costs of Using Best Available Technologies and Intended Actions

Section 116470(b)(5) of the Health and Safety Code requires an estimate of the aggregate cost and cost per customer of utilizing the BATs identified to reduce the concentration of a contaminant to a level at or below the PHG or MCLG. In addition, Section 116470(b)(6) requires a brief description of any actions the water purveyor intends to take to reduce the concentration of the contaminant and the basis for that decision.

Arsenic – The BATs for removal of arsenic in water for large water systems are: activated alumina, coagulation/filtration, electrodialysis, ion exchange, lime softening,

oxidation/filtration, and reverse osmosis. Arsenic was detected above the PHG in the local groundwater (three wells). The City is in compliance with the MCL for arsenic. The estimated cost to reduce arsenic levels in local groundwater to below the PHG of 0.004 microgram per liter (μ g/l) using ion exchange was calculated. Because the DDW detection limit for purposes of reporting (DLR) for arsenic is 2 μ g/l, treating arsenic to below the PHG level means treating arsenic to below the DLR of 2 μ g/l. There are numerous factors that may influence the actual cost of reducing arsenic levels to the PHG. Achieving the water quality goal for arsenic could be approximately \$2,050,000 per year, or \$61 per service connection per year.

Bromate – The BATs for removal of bromate in water for large water systems are: coagulation/filtration optimization, granular activated carbon, and reverse osmosis. Bromate was detected above the PHG in water supplied by MWDSC. The City is in compliance with the MCL for bromate. The estimated cost to reduce bromate levels in MWDSC water to below the PHG of 0.1 μ g/l using reverse osmosis was calculated. Because the DDW DLR for bromate is 1 μ g/l, treating bromate to below the PHG level means treating bromate to below the DLR of 1 μ g/l. There are numerous factors that may influence the actual cost of reducing bromate levels to the PHG. Achieving the water quality goal for bromate could range from approximately \$1,580,000 to \$13,440,000 per year, or between \$47 and \$399 per service connection per year.

Coliform Bacteria, Total – The BAT for removal of coliform bacteria in drinking water has been determined by USEPA to be disinfection. The City already disinfects all water served to the public. Chlorine or chloramines is used to disinfect the water because it is an effective disinfectant and residual concentrations can be maintained to guard against biological contamination in the water distribution system.

Coliform bacteria are indicator organisms that are ubiquitous in nature. They are a useful tool because of the ease in monitoring and analysis. The City collects weekly samples for total coliforms at various locations in the distribution system. If coliform bacteria are detected in the drinking water sample, it indicates a potential problem that needs to be

investigated and followed up with additional sampling. It is not unusual for a system to have an occasional positive sample. Although USEPA set the MCLG for total coliforms at 0 percent positive, there is no commercially available technology that will guarantee 0 percent positive every single month; therefore, the cost of achieving the PHG cannot be estimated.

The City will continue several programs that are in place to prevent contamination of the water supply with microorganisms. These include:

- Disinfection using chlorine or chloramines and maintenance of a chlorine residual at every point in the distribution system
- Monitoring throughout the distribution system to verify the absence of total coliforms and the presence of a protective chlorine residual
- Flushing program in which water pipelines known to have little use are flushed to remove stagnant water and bring in fresh water with residual disinfectant
- Cross-connection control program that prevents the accidental entry of nondisinfected water into the drinking water system.

Gross Alpha, Gross Beta, and Uranium – The only BAT for the removal of gross alpha in water for large water systems is reverse osmosis, which can also remove gross beta, and uranium, if detected. Gross alpha was detected above the MCLG in the local groundwater (all 13 wells) and surface water supplied by MWDSC. Gross beta was detected above the MCLG in the surface water supplied by MWDSC. Uranium was detected above the PHG in the local groundwater (all 13 wells) and in the surface water supplied by MWDSC. The cost of providing treatment using reverse osmosis to reduce gross alpha levels in local groundwater and in MWDSC surface water to the MCLG of 0 picoCurie per liter (pCi/l) (and consequently gross beta in MWDSC surface water below the MCLG; and uranium in local groundwater and in MWDSC surface water below the PHG) was calculated. Because the DLR for gross alpha is 3 pCi/l, treating gross alpha to 0 pCi/l means treating it to below the DLR of 3 pCi/l. Achieving the water quality goal for gross alpha could range from \$6,580,000 to \$56,086,000 per year, or between \$195 and \$1,665 per service connection per year.

Perchlorate – The BATs for removal of perchlorate in water are: ion exchange and biological fluidized bed reactor. Perchlorate was detected above the PHG in the local groundwater (one well). The City is in compliance with the MCL for perchlorate. The estimated cost to reduce perchlorate levels in local groundwater to below the PHG of 1 μ g/l using ion exchange was calculated. Because the DLR for perchlorate is 4 μ g/l, treating perchlorate to below the PHG level means treating perchlorate to below the DLR of 4 μ g/l. There are numerous factors that may influence the actual cost of reducing perchlorate levels to the PHG. Achieving the water quality goal for perchlorate could range from \$175,000 to \$379,000 per year, or between \$5 and \$11 per service connection per year.

All Contaminants – In addition, a cost estimate to treat all water produced or purchased by the City using ion exchange and reverse osmosis to remove all the contaminants detected above the PHGs or MCLGs was calculated. All the contaminants listed in the attached table may be removed to non-detectable levels by ion exchange and reverse osmosis, except total coliform bacteria. Total coliform can be introduced and detected anywhere in the distribution system. As shown on the attached table, achieving the water quality goals for all contaminants, except total coliform bacteria, using ion exchange and reverse osmosis could range from \$6,760,000 to \$56,470,000 per year, or between \$200 and \$1,676 per service connection per year.

Your 2019 Water Quality Report

Since 1990, California public water utilities have been providing an annual Water Quality Report to their customers. This year's report covers calendar year 2018 drinking water quality testing and reporting.

The City of Garden Grove Water Services Division (City) vigilantly safeguards its water supply and, as in years past, the water delivered to your home meets the quality standards required by federal and state regulatory agencies. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) and the State Water Resources Control Board, Division of Drinking Water (DDW) are the



agencies responsible for establishing and enforcing drinking water quality standards.

In some cases, the City goes beyond what is required by testing for unregulated chemicals that may have known health risks but do not have drinking water standards. For example, the Orange County Water District (OCWD), which manages the groundwater basin, and the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWDSC), which supplies imported treated surface water to the City test for unregulated chemicals in our water supply. Unregulated chemical monitoring helps

USEPA and DDW determine where certain chemicals occur and whether new standards need to be established for those chemicals to protect public health.

Through drinking water quality testing programs carried out

by OCWD for groundwater, MWDSC for treated surface water and the City for the water distribution system, your drinking water is constantly monitored from source to tap for regulated and unregulated constituents. The state allows us to monitor for some contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations

of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of our data, though representative, are more than one year old.

The Quality of Your Water is Our Primary Concern

Sources of Supply

Your drinking water is a blend of mostly groundwater from 12 wells in the Orange County groundwater basin and also surface water imported by MWDSC. MWDSC's imported water sources are a blend of State Water Project water from Northern California and water from the Colorado River Aqueduct. Your groundwater comes from a natural underground reservoir managed by the Orange County Water District (OCWD) that stretches from the Prado Dam and fans across the northwestern portion of Orange County, excluding the communities of Brea and La Habra, and stretching as far south as the El Toro 'Y.'

Last year, as in years past, your tap water met all USEPA and state drinking water health standards. The City vigilantly safeguards its water supplies and once again, we are proud to report that our system has never violated a maximum contaminant level (MCL) or any other water quality standard. This brochure is a snapshot of last year's water quality. Included are details about where your water comes from, what it contains, and how it compares to federal and state standards.

Depend On Us to Deliver Quality Water

Turn the tap and the water flows, as if by magic. Or so it seems. The reality is considerably different, however. Delivering high-quality drinking water to our customers is a scientific and engineering feat that requires considerable effort and talent to ensure the water is always there, always safe to drink.



Because tap water is highly regulated by state and federal laws, water treatment and distribution operators must be licensed and are required to complete on-the-job training and technical education before becoming a state certified operator.

Our licensed water professionals have an understanding of a wide range of subjects, including mathematics, biology, chemistry, physics, and engineering. Some of the tasks they complete on a regular basis include:

- Operating and maintaining equipment to purify and clarify water;
- Monitoring and inspecting machinery, meters, gauges, and operating conditions;
- Conducting tests and inspections on water and evaluating the results;
- Documenting and reporting test results and system operations to regulatory agencies; and
- Serving our community through customer support, education, and outreach.

Basic Information About Drinking Water Contaminants

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over the surface of land or through the layers of the ground it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up



substances resulting from the presence of animal and human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.
- Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining and farming.
- **Radioactive contaminants**, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production or mining activities.
- **Pesticides and herbicides**,, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff and residential uses.
- Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gasoline stations, urban stormwater runoff, agricultural application and septic systems.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, USEPA and the DDW prescribe regulations that limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulations and California law also establish limits for contaminants in bottled water that must provide the same protection for public health. Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk.

Federal and State Water Quality Regulations — Water Quality Issues that Could Affect Your Health —

Immuno-Compromised People



Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised people, such as those with cancer who are undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have had organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly persons, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek

advice about drinking water from their health care providers.

Cryptosporidium

Cryptosporidium is a microscopic organism that, when ingested, can cause diarrhea, fever, and other gastrointestinal symptoms. The organism comes from animal and/or human wastes and may be in surface water. MWDSC tested its source water and treated surface water for *Cryptosporidium* in 2018, but did not detect it. If it ever is detected, *Cryptosporidium* is eliminated by an effective treatment combination including sedimentation, filtration, and disinfection.

The USEPA and the federal Centers for Disease Control guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from USEPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-4791 between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. Eastern Time (7 a.m. to 1 p.m. in California).

About Lead in Tap Water

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and compo-



nents associated with service lines and home plumbing. The City is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead

in your water, you may wish to have your water tested.

Drinking Water Fluoridation

Fluoride has been added to U.S. drinking water supplies since 1945. Of the 50 largest cities in the U.S., 43 fluoridate their drinking water.

In December 2007, MWDSC joined a majority of the nation's public water suppliers in adding fluoride to drinking water in order to prevent tooth decay. In line with



recommendations from the DDW, as well as the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, MWDSC adjusted the natural fluoride level in imported treated water from the Colorado River and State Project water to the optimal range for dental health of 0.6 to 1.2 parts per million. Our local water is not supplemented with fluoride. Fluoride levels in drinking water are limited under California state regulations at a maximum dosage of 2 parts per million.

Nitrate Advisory

At times, nitrate in your tap water may have exceeded onehalf the MCL, but it was never greater than the MCL of 10 milligrams per liter (mg/L). Nitrate in your drinking water in 2018 ranged from 2.2 to 5.5 mg/L. The following advisory is issued because in 2018 we recorded nitrate measurements in the drinking water supply which exceeded one-half the nitrate MCL.

Nitrate in drinking water at levels above 10 mg/L is a health risk for infants of less than six months of age. Such nitrate levels in drinking water can interfere with the capacity of the infant's blood to carry oxygen, resulting in a serious illness; symptoms include shortness of breath and blueness of the skin. Nitrate levels above 10 mg/L may also affect the ability of the blood to carry oxygen in other individuals, such as pregnant women and those with certain specific enzyme deficiencies. If you are caring for an infant, or you are pregnant, you should ask advice from your health care provider.

For Your Information...

Disinfection: Water provided by the City contains chlorine used for disinfection and chloramines used by MWDSC, also for disinfection purposes. Customers on kidney dialysis should consult their physicians. **Fish or Amphibians:** If you have fish or amphibians, make sure to remove any

chloramines and chlorine before changing or adding water to the tanks. Remember, allowing drinking water to stand will not remove chloramines. Consult your local aquarium store for products that will remove the disinfectants. **Page 191 of 289**

What are Water Quality Standards?

Drinking water standards established by USEPA and DDW set limits for substances that may affect consumer health or aesthetic qualities of drinking water. The charts in this report show the following types of water quality standards

- Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL): The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. How are Contaminants Measured? Primary MCLs are set as close to the PHGs (or MCLGs) Water is sampled and tested throughout the year. as is economically and technologically feasible.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL): The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants
- Secondary MCLs are set to protect the odor, taste, and appearance of drinking water.

- Primary Drinking Water Standard: MCLs for contaminants that affect health along with their monitoring and reporting requirements and water treatment requirements.
- Regulatory Action Level (AL): The concentration of a contaminant, which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

Contaminants are measured in:

- parts per million (ppm) or milligrams per liter (mg/L)
- parts per billion (ppb) or micrograms per liter (µg/L)
- parts per trillion (ppt) or nanograms per liter (ng/L)

What is a Water Quality Goal?

In addition to mandatory water quality standards, USEPA and DDW have set voluntary water quality goals for some contaminants. Water quality goals are often set at such low levels that they are not achievable in practice and are not directly measurable. Nevertheless, these goals provide useful guideposts and direction for water management practices. The chart in this report includes three types of water quality goals:

- Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs are set by USEPA.
- Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG): The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants
- Public Health Goal (PHG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. PHGs are set by the California Environmental Protection Agency.

Every three years, at least 50 residences are tested for lead and copper at-the-tap. The most recent set of samples was collected in 2016.

Lead was not detected. Copper was detected above the reporting level in 46 samples, but none of the samples exceeded the copper Action Level. A regulatory Action Level is the concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

Source Water Assessments

Imported (MWDSC) Water Assessment

Every five years, MWDSC is required by DDW to examine possible sources of drinking water contamination in its State Water Project and Colorado River source waters.

The most recent watershed sanitary surveys of its source water supplies from the Colorado River was updated in 2015 and the State Water Project was updated in 2016.

Water from the Colorado River is considered to be most vulnerable to contamination from recreation, urban/stormwater runoff, increasing urbanization in the watershed, and wastewater. Water supplies from Northern California's State Water Project are most vulnerable to contamination from urban/stormwater runoff, wildlife, agriculture, recreation, and wastewater.

USEPA also requires MWDSC to complete one Source Water Assessment (SWA) that utilizes information collected in the watershed sanitary surveys. MWDSC completed its SWA in December 2002. The SWA is used to evaluate the vulnerability of water sources to contamination and helps determine whether more protective measures are needed.

Groundwater Assessment

An assessment of the drinking water sources for the City was completed in December 2002. The groundwater sources are considered most vulnerable to the following activities associated with contaminants detected in the water supply: known contaminant plumes, historic agricultural activities and application of fertilizers, and parks. The groundwater sources are considered most vulnerable to the following activities not associated with detected contaminants: confirmed leaking underground storage tanks, dry cleaners, gas stations, and photo processing/printing.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

To transmit a recommendation from the Planning Commission to the City Council, and to request that the City Council introduce and conduct the first reading of the attached Ordinance approving Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019), to modify the parking area landscape setback along Euclid Street.

BACKGROUND

The subject property is located on the west side of Euclid Street, between Emperor Quang Trung and Forbes Avenue. The property has a General Plan Land Use designation of Industrial/Commercial Mixed Use, and is currently zoned Planned Unit Development (PUD) No. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90. The original PUD-104-81 was adopted in 1981 to rezone a 54-acre property for industrial and commercial use, as well as provide performance standards and permitted uses for the new PUD zone. The commercial portion of the PUD is located along Euclid Street, and includes a total of four (4) properties. Subsequent amendments to the PUD occurred in 1986 to alter the permitted uses and development standards, and in 1990 to amend the permitted uses in the commercial portion of the development.

The property owner of the Euclid Retail Center, 14231-14291 Euclid Street, requests an amendment to the minimum parking landscape setback requirement applicable to its property, in order to redevelop and rehabilitate the shopping center. The proposed amendment to the PUD will only apply to the Euclid Retail Center, which is identified as Area III B in the PUD development standards. The shopping center is 4.3-acres and is developed with a total of 4 (four) multiple-tenant commercial buildings totaling 47,922 square feet of floor area across the one property. The property owner intends to build a new two-story office and commercial building on a vacant building pad at the southern end of the site in order to revitalize the commercial center. In order to add the new two-story commercial building, the property owner proposes to reconfigure and expand the parking area in order to accommodate more on-site parking spaces that are above what is required by the PUD. This will necessitate the reduction to the parking landscape setback along Euclid Street through the proposed PUD amendment.

Upon approval of the PUD amendment to reduce the parking landscape setback along Euclid Street, the project proposed by the property owner will be consistent with the PUD. The proposed project includes:

- Construction of a new two-story 7,250 square foot commercial retail and office building on a vacant building pad at the southern end of the site. Both stories will consist of three (3) units of 1,075 square feet each, for a total of six (6) units, as well as a 240 square foot utility area. The proposal includes retail uses on the first floor, and office uses on the second, complying with the permitted uses of the PUD.
- Installation of new landscaping along Euclid Street, and within the parking area. The proposed overall landscaping of the site is 31,157 square feet (16% of the site). With the proposed seven (7) foot setback along Euclid Street, the site still provides adequate landscaping to enhance the visual character of the shopping center.
- Addition of 65 new parking spaces. The project has been designed to comply with the parking requirements based on the PUD development guidelines standards of one (1) parking space per 250 square feet of commercial retail and office use. A total of 221 parking spaces are required for the project based on this standard, and the site currently provides 251. The proposed parking for the project will be provided in the form of 316 parking stalls, a 95 space (30%) increase over what is required, and a 65 space (20%) increase over what is currently provided.

On June 20, 2019, the Planning Commission held a public hearing to consider Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019). At the meeting, no persons from the public spoke about the project. Planning Commission voted 5-0 with two Commissioners absent, and adopted Resolution No. 5956-19 recommending approval of PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019) to City Council.

DISCUSSION

The applicant proposes an amendment to PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 that will amend the required parking landscape area along Euclid Street. This will only apply to the Euclid Retail Center, Area III B in the PUD development standards. This reduction to the landscape setback will facilitate an expansion of the parking area that will allow for the construction of a new commercial building, and the rehabilitation of the overall site.

The proposed amendment to the PUD that will amend the required twenty (20) foot

parking landscape area along Euclid Street to a minimum of seven (7) feet. This will only apply to the Euclid Retail Center. As proposed by the applicant, the parking landscape setback will be 9'-1 $\frac{34}{7}$ along the southern half of the site along Euclid Street, and 7'-0" along the northern half of the site. Upon approval of the PUD amendment to reduce the parking landscape setback along Euclid Street, the project proposed by the property owner will be consistent with the PUD.

The proposed amendment will also assist with the revitalization and redevelopment of the Euclid Retail Center. This is consistent with the goals and policies of the General Plan that encourages: the revitalization of aging, underused or deteriorated commercial centers; a mix of retail shops and services to better meet the needs of the area's present and potential clientele; the City to work with property owners to revitalize deteriorated centers; and enhanced parking area landscaping, and improved lighting.

In addition, the proposed amendment will be consistent with the intent of the Planned Unit Development. The proposed uses are diverse and compatible with the established land use designations, and will ensure that the quality of the proposed project is greater than what could be achieved through a traditional commercial zoning classification.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

No fiscal impact to the City regarding this proposed amendment.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Conduct a public hearing; and
- Introduce and conduct the first reading of the attached Ordinance approving an amendment to Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019), entitled: AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE APPROVING PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT NO. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019) AMENDING THE GENERAL USE AND DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS FOR PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT NO. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 TO REDUCE THE REQUIRED MINIMUM PARKING AREA LANDSCAPE SETBACK FOR AREA III B.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE APPROVING PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT NO. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019) AMENDING THE GENERAL USE AND DEVELOPMENT STANDARDS FOR PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT NO. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 TO REDUCE THE REQUIRED MINIMUM PARKING AREA LANDSCAPE SETBACK FOR AREA III B

City Attorney Summary

This Ordinance approves a text amendment to the General Use and Development Standards for Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 to reduce the minimum required parking area landscape setback from Euclid Street from twenty (20) feet to seven (7) feet within Area III B of the PUD, consisting of the property located on the west side of Euclid Street, between Emperor Quang Trung and Forbes Avenue, at 14231 to 14291 Euclid Street, Assessor's Parcel No. 099-183-03.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE FINDS AND DETERMINES AS FOLLOWS:

WHEREAS, on April 19, 1982, the Garden Grove City Council adopted Resolution No. 6217-82, approving Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81, and rezoning an approximately 54-acre parcel located at the southwest corner of Forbes Avenue and Euclid Street to PUD-104-81, subject to all of the conditions and provisions as set forth in Planning Commission Resolution No. 3226;

WHEREAS, subsequent revisions to the development guidelines of Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81 were made in 1984, 1986, and 1990;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Planning Commission Resolution No. 4127, the current zoning designation, PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 was adopted;

WHEREAS, Area III B of the PUD consists of the approximately 4.396-acre parcel located between Emperor Quang Trung (formerly Business Center Parkway) and Forbes Avenue, at 14231 to 14291 Euclid Street, which is currently developed with a 47,922 square feet commercial retail center with 251 parking stalls, commonly referred to as the Euclid Retail Center;

WHEREAS, the minimum required landscape setback of the parking area from Euclid Street within Area III is currently twenty (20) feet;

WHEREAS, Bon Hoang for Westfield Construction and Development, on behalf of Phung Mai Nguyen, owner of the property containing the Euclid Retail Center, has requested approval of a text amendment to the General Use and Development Standards of Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86 (REV. 90) to reduce the required minimum landscape setback applicable to the property from twenty (20) feet to seven (7) feet, to facilitate the future redevelopment of the Euclid Retail Center by: constructing a two-story 7,250 square foot commercial retail and Garden Grove City Council Ordinance No. Page 2

office building; reconfiguring the parking area and adding 65 new parking spaces; and rehabilitating the landscaping;

WHEREAS, the uses, activities, and improvements contemplated by the proposed PUD amendment and redevelopment project are collectively referred to as the "Project";

WHEREAS, following a public hearing held on June 20, 2019, the Planning Commission adopted Resolution No. 5956-19 recommending City Council approval of Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019);

WHEREAS, pursuant to a legal notice, a public hearing was held by the City Council on August 13, 2019, and all interested persons were given an opportunity to be heard;

WHEREAS, the City Council gave due and careful consideration to the matter;

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby determines that the proposed Project is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA") (Public Resources Code Section 21000 et. seq.) pursuant to Section 15305 (Minor Alterations in Land Use Limitations) and Section 15303 (New Construction or Conversion of Small Structures) of the CEQA Guidelines (14 Cal. Code Regs., Sections 15305 and 15303); and

WHEREAS, the City Council hereby incorporates by reference the findings and reasons set forth in Planning Commission Resolution No. 5956-19, and makes the following findings regarding Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019):

A. The parking area landscape setback along Euclid Street proposed pursuant to the PUD amendment is compatible with the character of existing development in the vicinity, and will be well integrated into its setting.

B. The amended plan will produce a stable and desirable environment, and will not cause undue traffic congestion on surrounding streets.

C. Provision is made for both public and private open spaces.

D. Provision is made for the protection and maintenance of private areas reserved for common use.

E. The quality of the Project achieved through the proposed amendment to the existing planned unit development zoning is greater than could be achieved through traditional zoning.

F. The amendment to the PUD is internally consistent with the goals, objectives, and elements of the General Plan.

G. The amendment to the PUD will promote the public interest, health, and welfare.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>: The above recitals are true and correct.

<u>SECTION 2</u>: Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019) is hereby approved pursuant to the findings set forth herein and the facts and reasons stated in Planning Commission Resolution No. 5956-19, a copy of which is on file in the Office of the City Clerk, and which is incorporated herein by reference with the same force and effect as if set forth in full.

<u>SECTION 3</u>: Subparagraph (a) of Paragraph 1 (Setbacks from Streets), of Subsection C (Setbacks), of Section II (General Use and Development Standards), applicable to Planned Unit Development PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90, as set forth in the attachment to Planning Commission Resolution No. 4127, adopted November 8, 1990, is hereby amended to read as follows (additions shown in **bold/italics**; deletions shown in strikethrough):

"C. Setbacks

All setbacks will be measured from the property line. For the purpose of these supplemental regulations, a street side property line is that line created by the ultimate right-of-way of the frontage street.

1) Setbacks from Streets

The following setbacks shall be maintained from designated streets.

- a. Euclid and Hazard
 - Buildings shall be set back a minimum of forty (40) feet.
 - Parking shall be set back a minimum of twenty (20) feet, *except in in Area III B*.
 - Parking shall be set back a minimum of seven (7) feet for the property located at 14291-14321 Euclid Street in Area III B, located between Emperor Quang Trung (formerly Business Center Parkway) and Forbes Avenue.

<u>SECTION 4</u>: <u>Severability</u>. If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, words or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

<u>SECTION 5</u>: The Mayor shall sign and the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same, or the summary thereof, to be published and posted pursuant to the provisions of law and this Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after adoption.

BE IT RESOLVED that the Planning Commission of the City of Garden Grove, in regular session assembled on June 20, 2019, does hereby recommend approval of Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019), to amend the General Use and Development Standards for PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 (Planned Unit Development) zone to reduce the required minimum parking setback from Euclid Street from twenty (20) feet to seven (7) feet within Area III B of the PUD, to facilitate the redevelopment of the property located at 14231-14291 Euclid Street.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Planning Commission recommends that the City Council determine that the proposed Project is categorically exempt from environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) (California Public Resources Code Section 21000 et seq.), pursuant to Section 15305 (Minor Alterations in Land Use Limitations) and Section 15303 (New Construction or Conversion of Small Structures) of the CEQA Guidelines (14 Cal. Code Regs., Sections 15061).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED in the matter of Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86/90 (REV. 2019), the Planning Commission of the City of Garden Grove does hereby report as follows:

- 1. The subject case was initiated by Bon Hoang for Westfield Construction and Development, with the authorization of Phung Mai Nguyen, owner of the commercial lot located at 14231-14291 Euclid Street, containing the existing Euclid Retail Center.
- The applicant is requesting approval of an amendment to the General Use and Development Standards for Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90, to reduce the required minimum parking area landscape setback along Euclid Street from twenty (20) feet to seven (7) feet in order to allow for the redevelopment of the Euclid Retail Center.
- 3. The property has a General Plan Land Use designation of Industrial/ Commercial Mixed Use and is zoned Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90. The subject site is comprised of one (1) parcel,

with a total land area of 4.396-acres that is improved with an existing commercial retail shopping center, Euclid Retail Center, of 47,922 square feet. The applicant proposes to reduce the required parking setback along Euclid Street to facilitate the future expansion of the parking area, and future commercial redevelopment of the site.

- 4. The proposed Project is categorically exempt from CEQA pursuant to Section 15305 (Minor Alterations in Land Use Limitations) and Section 15303 (New Construction or Conversion of Small Structures) of the State CEQA Guidelines.
- 5. Existing land use, zoning, and General Plan designation of property in the vicinity of the subject property have been reviewed.
- 6. Report submitted by City staff was reviewed.
- 7. Pursuant to a legal notice, a public hearing was held on June 20, 2019, and all interested persons were given an opportunity to be heard.
- 8. The Planning Commission gave due and careful consideration to the matter during its meeting of June 20, 2019, and considered all oral and written testimony presented regarding the project.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, FOUND AND DETERMINED that the facts and reasons supporting the conclusion of the Planning Commission, as required under Municipal Code Sections 9.16.030.20, are as follows:

FACTS:

The subject property is located on the west side of Euclid Street, between Emperor Quang Trung (formerly Business Center Parkway) and Forbes Avenue. The property has a General Plan Land Use designation of Industrial/Commercial Mixed Use, and is zoned Planned Unit Development (PUD) No. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90. PUD-104-81 was adopted in 1981 to allow the construction of an industrial park and a commercial retail center. Subsequent revisions to the original PUD have modified the development guidelines and permitted uses.

The Euclid Retail Center is located within the commercial portion of PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 and comprises the portion of the PUD designated as Area III B. The shopping center is 4.3-acres and is improved with four (4) buildings, with a total building area of 47,922 square feet. The commercial center allows for a mix of commercial retail, personal services, restaurant, and professional office uses.

The proposed redevelopment of the commercial center is regulated by the standards and requirements of PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90. The PUD allows for new

construction and rehabilitation of the site without a land use entitlement, provided the project complies with the development guidelines of the PUD. Upon approval of the PUD amendment to reduce the parking landscape setback along Euclid Street, the project proposed by the property owner will be consistent with the PUD.

The property owner proposes to redevelop the Euclid Retail Center by: constructing a two-story 7,250 square foot commercial retail and office building on a vacant building pad at the southern end of the site; reconfiguring the parking area, and adding 65 new parking spaces; and rehabilitating the landscaping. The applicant proposes retail and office uses within the new building, which are compatible with the commercial uses allowed in the PUD.

FINDINGS AND REASONS:

Planned Unit Development:

1. The proposed development guideline revisions are compatible with the character of existing development in the vicinity and will be well integrated into its setting.

The proposed PUD amendment will reduce the parking setback area along Euclid Street from twenty (20) foot to seven (7) feet for the Euclid Retail Center. The proposed amendment will facilitate the redevelopment of the Euclid Retail Center by allowing the expansion and rehabilitation of existing parking and landscape areas. In doing so, it will also accommodate the construction of a new commercial building that will be compatible with the existing development, as well as compatible with surrounding commercial developments. Although the parking setback will be reduced along Euclid Street, sufficient landscape area will remain within the seven (7) feet that will allow for appropriate landscaping to be installed to continue to maintain the visual character of the property.

2. The plan will produce a stable and desirable environment and will not cause undue traffic congestion on surrounding streets or access streets.

The proposed PUD amendment will reduce the parking setback along Euclid Street to facilitate the redevelopment and revitalization of the Euclid Retail Center. The proposed amendment will allow the property owner to reconfigure and expand the parking area to accommodate additional parking spaces to support the current uses and to accommodate a new commercial building. The shopping center is designed with, and will continue to maintain, adequate vehicular circulation and access that will support the future redevelopment of the shopping center that is consistent with the standards established by PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90.

3. Provision is made for both public and private open spaces.

The PUD was established with specific development standards, as well as landscaping and parking requirements. The proposed amendment will reduce the parking setback area along Euclid Street from twenty (20) feet to seven (7) feet to facilitate the redevelopment of the Euclid Retail Center. While landscaping will be reduced along Euclid Street, the landscape setback will continue to remain sufficient in size to accommodate appropriate landscaping. In addition, the future redevelopment plan for the center includes rehabilitating of existing landscaping and providing new landscaping within the parking area that is consistent with the PUD. Any proposed project on the site is required to comply with the guidelines of the PUD to ensure that both public and private open spaces are preserved.

4. Provision is made for the protection and maintenance of private areas reserved for common use.

PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 incorporates development standards and guidelines that ensure the protection and maintenance of landscaped setbacks and open spaces. The proposed amendment to the PUD will not impact any provisions for the protection and maintenance of private reserved for common use as any proposed development will comply with the development standards of the PUD.

5. The quality of the project, achieved through the proposed Planned Unit Development zoning, is greater than could be achieved through traditional zoning.

The proposed amendment will reduce the parking setback from twenty (20) feet to seven (7) feet for the Euclid Retail Center, to allow for the redevelopment and revitalization of the shopping center, which includes reconfiguring and expanding the parking area, rehabilitating and creating new landscaped areas, and constructing a new commercial building. The proposed amendment will encourage the property owner to design a new parking lot layout and internal circulation pattern that is more efficient than the existing parking lot layout. The new parking spaces that will be created with the reduction of the parking setback will allow for new parking spaces to be created to serve the existing businesses as well as the new uses. The landscaping area along Euclid Street will continue to be maintained with appropriate landscape material that will enhance the visual character of the property.

6. The amendment to the PUD is internally consistent with the goals, objectives, and elements of the General Plan.

The proposed amendment to PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 is internally consistent with the goals, policies and elements of the General Plan. The amendment is requested in order to facilitate rehabilitation of the Euclid Retail Center. Goal LU-6.1 of the General Plan encourages the revitalization of aging, underused or deteriorated commercial centers; Policy LU-6.2 encourages a mix of retail shops and services to better meet the needs of the area's present and potential clientele; Policy LU-6.4 encourages the City to work with property owners to revitalize deteriorated centers; and LU-IMP-6C encourages enhanced parking area landscaping, and improved lighting. The proposed amendment will assist the Euclid Retail Center meeting these goals, objectives, and elements by allowing for the: expansion, repaving, and restriping the parking area in order to accommodate additional parking spaces, new landscaping, and a new commercial building.

7. The amendment to the PUD will promote the public interest, health, and welfare.

The amendment will promote the public interest, health, and welfare. The reduction in the required landscape area is requested to facilitate future rehabilitation of the Euclid Retail Center. Any proposed development on the property must comply with the PUD development guidelines. In addition, the amendment will still provide a sufficient landscaping area along Euclid Street to accommodate appropriate landscaping that will continue to enhance the visual character of the shopping center.

INCORPORATION OF FACTS AND REASONS SET FORTH IN STAFF REPORT

In addition to the foregoing the Planning Commission incorporates herein by this reference, the facts and reasons set forth in the staff report.

REQUEST:

The applicant is requesting approval of a text amendment to the development guidelines of PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 to reduce the required minimum parking landscape setback in order to facilitate the redevelopment and rehabilitation of a 4.396-acre site comprised of one parcel, and currently improved with the 47,922 square foot shopping center known as the Euclid Retail Center. The existing commercial buildings will not be altered as a result of the proposed project. The Planning Commision will consider the following: (i) a recommendation that the City Council determine that the Project is categorically exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA); and (ii) a recommendation that the City Council approve a text amendment to Planned Unit Development No. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90 to reduce the 20-foot parking landscape setback requirement along Euclid Street to facilitate the expansion of the existing parking lot, and future rehabilitation of the Euclid Retail Center.

BACKGROUND:

The subject property is located on the west side of Euclid Street, between Emperor Quang Trung and Forbes Avenue. The property has a General Plan Land Use designation of Industrial/Commercial Mixed Use, and is currently zoned Planned Unit Development (PUD) No. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90. The original PUD-104-81 was adopted in 1981 to rezone a 54-acre property for industrial and commercial use, as well as provide performance standards and permitted uses for the new PUD zone. The commercial portion of the PUD is located along Euclid Street, and includes a total of four (4) properties. Subsequent amendments to the PUD occurred in 1986 to alter the permitted commercial uses, parking, sign, and landscape requirements, and in 1990 to amend the

permitted uses in the commercial portion of the development to allow for bona fide eating establishments with entertainment with a Conditional Use Permit.

The property owner of the Euclid Retail Center, 14231-14291 Euclid Street, requests an amendment to the minimum parking landscape setback requirement applicable to its property, in order to redevelop and rehabilitate the shopping center. The proposed amendment to the PUD will only apply to the Euclid Retail Center, which is identified as Area III B in the PUD development standards. The shopping center is 4.3-acres and is developed with a total of 4 (four) multiple-tenant commercial buildings totaling 47,922 square feet of floor area across the one property. The property owner intends to build a new two-story office and commercial building on a vacant building pad at the southern end of the site in order to revitalize the commercial center. In order to add the new two-story commercial building, the property owner proposes to reconfigure and expand the parking area in order to accommodate more parking spaces on-site that are above what is required by the PUD, which will necessitate the reduction to the parking landscape setback along Euclid Street through the proposed PUD amendment.

DISCUSSION:

PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT

The property is currently zoned Planned Unit Development (PUD) No. PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90. A Planned Unit Development is a precise plan that provides the means for the regulation of buildings, structures, and uses of land to facilitate the implementation of the General Plan. The regulations of the PUD are intended to provide for a diversity of uses, relationships, and open spaces in an innovative land plan and design, while ensuring compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Code.

The applicant proposes an amendment to the PUD that will amend the required twenty (20) foot parking landscape area along Euclid Street to seven (7) feet. This will only apply to the Euclid Retail Center. This reduction to the landscape setback will facilitate an expansion of the parking area that will allow for the construction of a new commercial building, and the rehabilitation of the overall site. As proposed by the applicant, the parking landscape setback will be 9'-1 $\frac{3}{4}$ " along the southern half of the site along Euclid Street, and 7'-0" along the northern half of the site.

Through the proposed PUD amendment, the commercial center will be able to increase the number of on-site parking spaces from the current 251 spaces to 316 spaces. The property will experience a reduction to the amount of landscaping on property, however, the landscaping within the parking area will increase, and the existing landscaping will be rehabilitated as a result of the proposed project to redevelop the site. The parking area landscaping for the site will increase from 7,816 square feet (4.0% of the site) to 8,283 square feet (4.3% of the site), and the overall landscaping of the site will be 31,157 square feet (16% of the site). Sufficient landscaping area will

remain along Euclid Street to accommodate appropriate landscaping that will continue to enhance the visual character of the shopping center.

The proposed amendment will also assist with the revitalization and redevelopment of the Euclid Retail Center. This is consistent with the goals and policies of the General Plan that encourages the revitalization of aging, underused or deteriorated commercial centers; that encourages a mix of retail shops and services to better meet the needs of the area's present and potential clientele; that encourages the City to work with property owners to revitalize deteriorated centers; and that encourages enhanced parking area landscaping, and improved lighting.

In addition, the proposed amendment will be consistent with the intent of the Planned Unit Development, as the reduced landscaping and additional parking will ensure that the quality of the proposed project is greater than what could be achieved through a traditional commercial zoning classification.

PROPOSED REDEVELOPMENT OF THE EUCLID RETAIL CENTER:

The proposed redevelopment of the commercial center is regulated by the standards and requirements of PUD-104-81/86 REV. 90. The PUD allows for new construction and rehabilitation of the site without a land use entitlement, provided the project complies with the development guidelines of the PUD. Upon approval of the PUD amendment to reduce the parking landscape setback along Euclid Street, the project proposed by the property owner will be consistent with the PUD. A summary of the proposed site improvements to the Euclid Retail Center is provided below for informational purposes.

The property owner proposes to redevelop the Euclid Retail Center by: constructing a two-story 7,250 square foot commercial retail and office building on a vacant building pad at the southern end of the site; reconfiguring the parking area, and adding 65 new parking spaces; and rehabilitating the landscaping. The applicant proposes retail and office uses within the new building, which are compatible with the commercial uses allowed in the PUD.

Site Design, Circulation and Parking

The proposed project includes reconfiguring the on-site circulation, drive aisles, and parking, to accommodate the proposed development. The site is currently accessed via three (3) driveway approaches: on the north from Forbes Avenue, on the east from Euclid Street, and on the south from Emperor Quang Trung. None of the driveways will be altered as a part of this proposal.

The site will continue to maintain the vehicular access across the commercial center, via internal two-way drive aisles. The internal vehicular circulation will be changed as a result of the reconfigured parking layout. All on-site drive aisles have been designed to

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provide an effective circulation pattern, have been reviewed by the City's Engineering staff, and will accommodate two-way vehicular traffic, as well as trash truck and emergency vehicle access.

The project has been designed to comply with the parking requirements based on the PUD development guidelines standards of one (1) parking space per 250 square feet of commercial retail and office use. Currently, a total of 221 parking spaces are required for the project based on this standard, and the site provides 251. The proposed parking for the project will be provided in the form of 316 parking stalls, a 95 space (30%) increase over what is required, and a 65 space (20%) increase over what is currently provided. The PUD development guideline requirements for parking are less than what is normally required elsewhere in the City. Given Euclid Retail Center's current visitation patterns, the applicant and owner have recognized a need for more parking.

The distribution of the 316 parking stalls include 188 standard parking spaces, 119 compact parking spaces, and 9 handicap parking spaces. The 119 compact parking spaces constitute 37% of all parking onsite, which complies with the PUD maximum of 40% compact spaces. In addition, one parking space will serve as an electric vehicle charging station, and the site will provide bicycle parking.

Building Design:

The proposed commercial retail and office building will consist of two (2) stories of 3,505 square feet each, and a utility area of 240 square feet, for a total of 7,250 square feet, at a height of 33'-10" to the top of the roof. Both stories will consist of three (3) units of 1,075 square feet each, for a total of six (6) units and 7,010 square feet of commercial floor area. The proposal includes retail uses on the first floor, and office uses on the second, complying with the permitted uses of the PUD.

Landscaping:

The project will provide new landscaping along Euclid Street and within the parking area. The proposed overall landscaping of the site is 31,157 square feet (16% of the site). With the seven (7) foot setback along Euclid Street, the site still provides adequate landscaping to enhance the visual character of the shopping center. The applicant is required to provide a landscape and irrigation plan to the City that complies with the landscaping and water efficiency requirements of Title 9 of the Municipal Code. Planning staff will review the type and location of all proposed plant materials.

CEQA:

Staff has determined that the proposed project is exempt from environmental review under the California Environmental Quality Act ("CEQA"), pursuant to Section 15305 (Minor Alterations in Land Use Limitations) and Section 15303 (New Construction or

Conversion of Small Structures) of the State CEQA Guidelines. The Class 5 exemption (Section 15305) applies to minor alterations in land use limitations in areas with an average slope of less than 20%, which do not result in any changes in land use or density. Here, the proposed PUD amendment only changes the parking landscape setback requirement applicable to one parcel. The Class 3 exemption (Section 15303) applies to the construction of new small facilities or structures, including up to four (4) commercial buildings not exceeding 10,000 square feet in floor area, on sites zoned for such use, if not involving the use of significant amounts of hazardous substances where all necessary public services and facilities are available, and the surrounding area is not environmentally sensitive. Here, the applicant intends to construct one (1) new 7,250 square foot building and related parking facilities within an existing developed shopping center. For these reasons, Staff recommends that the proposed project be found to be exempt from CEQA.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends that the Planning Commission take the following actions:

1. Adopt Resolution No. 5956-19 recommending that the City Council determine that the Project is exempt from CEQA; and

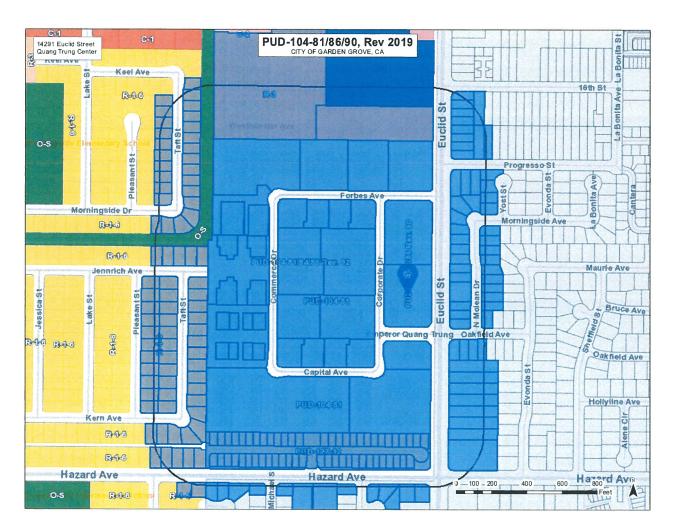

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

To request that City Council authorize staff to submit a grant application to the County of Orange Social Services Agency Families and Communities Together (FaCT) Program for grant funds to assist in funding services at Magnolia Park Family Resource Center.

BACKGROUND

Since 1999, the City has been the lead agency for the Garden Grove Community Collaborative, which provides the community with family preservation services at the Magnolia Park Family Resource Center. The majority of the funding for the Center comes through a grant from the County of Orange, Families and Communities Together (FaCT) Program. The original grant received in 1999 was extended in 2003, then in 2005, then in 2010, and once again in 2014 as part of a competitive grant process. County funded services provided by the Family Resource Center include counseling, case management, information and referral, family support services, parent education, domestic violence prevention and treatment services, and childcare services.

DISCUSSION

In July 2019, the County of Orange Social Services Agency released a request for proposals for the FaCT family resource center services, and staff is seeking authorization to submit the application.

The City will serve as the lead fiscal agency for this grant proposal. Other family services will be provided through the Garden Grove Community Collaborative that involves partner agencies from the community. The funded partners include Interval

House for the domestic violence prevention and treatment services; Human Options for differential response services, family stabilization services, and counseling services; and Team of Advocates for Special Kids (TASK) for parent workshops and IEP clinics and services.

The grant funding covers a three-year period from July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2023. The grant funding available for each one-year period is \$437,500, for a total amount of \$1,312,500 for the three-year period, with the option to extend two (2) additional one-year periods, without a competitive bid process, at the sole discretion of the County.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

As lead agency, the City will be overseeing the program and fiscal operations of \$437,500 annually of services through management of the Garden Grove Community Collaborative. As part of the grant application, the City's General Fund will match an annual amount of \$115,300 in salaries for the operation of the Magnolia Park Family Resource Center.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Adopt the attached Resolution authorizing the submission of an application for grant funds from the Orange County Social Services Agency Families and Communities Together; and
- Authorize annual grant funding match in the amount of \$115,300 from the General Fund.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

For the City Council to consider introduction and first reading of an ordinance amending and updating the City's regulations governing the use of burglary and panic/robbery alarm systems.

BACKGROUND

The City of Garden Grove adopted Municipal Code Section 8.60 in 1983 establishing codes that govern the use of alarm systems within the City. This Municipal Code section has remained relatively unchanged since that time.

DISCUSSION

The proposed changes to the alarm ordinance will address several areas of concern, reduce false alarm responses and better align practices to industry standards.

Major changes to the ordinance would include:

- Additional verification of burglary alarm activations. This would require that alarm companies attempt to make two phone calls to responsible parties before a police response is requested on burglary alarms. In 2018, 94% of alarm calls were false alarms. After the City of Anaheim implemented this process in 2012, they saw a 36% decrease in false alarm dispatches.
- Penalties for non-permitted systems. Alarm system users who fail to obtain or maintain a permit would be charged for any false alarm from their system. Currently, non-permitted alarm system users are afforded the same courtesy as permitted users, which are two false alarm activations at no charge.

- Addition of an alarm user awareness class. This class would be available to all alarm system subscribers. It would be used to educate users about false and excessive alarm activations. Any user that successfully completes this class will receive a certificate that may be used in payment for one false alarm activation if it is used within one year of its issuance.
- Issuance of administrative citations. Administrative citations will be issued for systems that suffer from excessive alarm activations, or for each activation for which a current and valid permit has not been obtained or maintained.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no financial impact to the General Fund by this action.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that City Council:

• Introduce and conduct first reading of the attached Ordinance amending and updating the City's regulations governing the use of burglary and panic/robbery alarm systems.

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE AMENDING CHAPTER 8.60 OF TITLE 8 OF THE GARDEN GROVE MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO ALARM SYSTEMS

City Attorney Summary

This Ordinance amends and updates the City's regulations governing the use of burglary and panic/robbery alarm systems.

WHEREAS, Chapter 8.60 of the Garden Grove Municipal Code sets forth regulations governing the use of burglary and robbery alarms in the City of Garden Grove, requiring permits for such alarm systems, authorizing the imposition of fees, and providing penalty for violations;

WHEREAS, Chapter 8.60 has not been substantively amended since it was adopted in 1983; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to update its regulations governing burglary and robbery alarm systems to reflect current practices, technology and industry standards.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE HEREBY ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS:

<u>SECTION 1</u>: The City Council finds that this Ordinance is not subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to Sections 15060(c)(2) (the activity will not result in a direct or reasonably foreseeable indirect physical change in the environment) and 15060(c)(3) (the activity is not a project as defined in Section 15378) of the State CEQA Guidelines, California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, because it has not potential for resulting in physical change to the environment, directly or indirectly.

<u>SECTION 2</u>: Chapter 8.60 of Title 8 of the Garden Grove Municipal Code, entitled "Alarm Systems," is hereby amended and restated in its entirety as set forth in Attachment "A" hereto. The date this Ordinance takes effect shall be inserted in Section 8.60.070 (Alarm System Standards) where indicated in Attachment "A".

<u>SECTION 3</u>: If any section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion of this Ordinance is, for any reason, held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Ordinance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted this Ordinance and each section, subsection, subdivision, sentence, clause, phrase, word, or portion thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, subdivisions, sentences, clauses, phrases, words or portions thereof be declared invalid or unconstitutional.

<u>SECTION 4</u>: The Mayor shall sign and the City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this Ordinance and shall cause the same, or the summary thereof, to be published and posted pursuant to the provisions of law and this Ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after adoption.

8.60.001: Purpose

The purpose of this Chapter is to set forth regulations governing the use of burglary and panic/robbery alarms, require permits thereof, establish fees and provide penalty for violations. The City finds and determines that the regulation of alarm systems and the control of false alarms is necessary to promote the health, welfare and safety of the people, in that some of the public are using alarm systems which either mechanically malfunction or are not operated properly by their users, causing an increase in false alarm reports, and thereby creating a hazard to the safety of peace officers and the public in general.

8.60.010: Definitions

For the purpose of this Chapter, the following definitions shall apply:

"Alarm agent" means any person who is self-employed or employed either directly or indirectly by an alarm business, and whose duties include any of the following: selling and maintaining, leasing, servicing, repairing, altering, replacing, moving or installing an alarm system in or on any building, place or premises.

"Alarm business" or "alarm company" means any person conducting or engaging in the business of selling, leasing, maintaining, servicing, repairing, altering, replacing, moving, removing, installing or monitoring an alarm system in or on any building, place or premises.

"Alarm system" is a device or connected devices designed for (1) the detection of, or the alerting of others to, an unauthorized entry on any premises, or (2) the alerting of others to a robbery in progress or other life threatening or emergency situation; and which, when activated, emits a sound or transmits a signal to indicate that an emergency situation exists, and to which police are expected to respond. Alarm system shall include a device or devices for video surveillance of any premises which is either monitored by an alarm business or which is designed to alert the alarm user of a possible unauthorized entry on the premises.

"Alarm user" means any person owning, leasing or operating an alarm system, or on whose property or premises an alarm system is maintained for the protection of such property or premises

"Alarm User Awareness Class" means a class conducted for the purpose of educating alarm users about the responsible use, operation and maintenance of alarm systems and the problems caused by false alarms.

"Applicant" means a person or proposed permittee who has made request for permission to use an alarm system under the conditions specified in this Chapter.

"Audible alarm" is an alarm system which, when activated, generates an audible sound on the premises.

"Burglary" means unlawful entry into any building with the intent of committing a theft or felony.

"Business" means any nonresidential use.

"Chief of Police" means the Chief of Police of the Garden Grove Police Department or his or her designee.

"Direct dial telephone device" (automatic dialing device) is any device which is interconnected to a voice grade telephone line and is programmed to select a predetermined telephone number, and which transmits by prerecorded voice

message or code signal an emergency message indicating a need for emergency response.

"False alarm" means the activation of an alarm system when an emergency situation, for which the alarm system was designed, does not exist, and to which the Police Department responds. "False alarm" shall not include activation of an alarm system due to external causes beyond the control of the user or subscriber of the alarm system.

"Non-response status" means the category in which an alarm system is placed as a result of specified violations of this Chapter pursuant to which the police department will not respond to alarm activations, other than Panic Alarm activations.

"Notice" means written notice, served personally, mailed, postage prepaid, addressed to the person to be notified at his last known address, or transmitted by electronic mail to the email address of a person who has consented to receive notice at such email address in conjunction with an alarm permit application or otherwise. Service of such notice shall be deemed effected upon completion of personal service, upon deposit of such notice in the United States mail, or upon transmittal of such notice by electronic mail.

"Panic Alarm" means an audible or silent Alarm System signal generated by the manual activation of a device to signal a life threatening or emergency situation requiring law enforcement response such as a robbery or home invasion robbery.

"Permittee" means any person who shall be granted a permit, as provided in this Chapter, and his or its agents and representatives.

"Person" means any individual, partnership, corporation, limited liability company, or other entity.

"Protected premises" means a business or residence in which an alarm system is installed or attached.

"Residence" means a premises used as a dwelling unit, including, without limitation, a single-family dwelling, apartment, condominium, or lodginghouse.

"Robbery" is the felonious taking of personal property in the possession of another, from his person or immediate presence, and against his will, accomplished by means of force or fear.

"SIA Control Panel Standard CP-01" means the American National Standard Institute (ANSI) approved Security Industry Association (SIA) CP-01 Control Panel Standard as may be updated from time to time, that details recommended design features for security systems control panels and their associated arming and disarming devices to reduce false alarms.

"Standards, regulations, requirements, and duties" means the minimum standards of performance for alarm systems installed within the city, as set forth in this Chapter. All devices to be installed under permit issued pursuant to this Chapter shall conform to such performance standards and regulations. The Chief of Police may require inspection and approval of all alarm systems installed within the City.

"Subscriber" means any person who purchases, leases, contracts for or otherwise obtains an alarm system or for the servicing or maintenance of an alarm system from an alarm business.

"User" means any person who obtains, possesses, leases or has installed an alarm system on any premises, whether business or residence.

"Verify" means an attempt by the alarm company to determine whether a burglary alarm signal is valid before requesting law enforcement dispatch by: (1) having an alarm company representative personally verify that the alarm is valid; (2) contacting the alarm site and/or alarm user by telephone, whether or not actual contact with a person is made; or (3) verifying by electronic means. Telephone verification shall require at a minimum that a second call be made to a different number, if the first attempt fails to reach an alarm user who can properly identify themselves, to attempt to determine whether an alarm signal is valid before requesting law enforcement dispatch. Electronic verification shall require verification of a crime by video and/or audible means.

8.60.015: Duties of the Alarm Company

- A. Prior to making an alarm system operable, the alarm company shall provide instructions explaining the proper operation of the alarm system to the alarm user and written information of how to obtain service from the alarm company for the alarm system.
- B. Prior to contacting the Garden Grove Police Department and requesting that the police respond to an alarm system activation, an alarm company shall attempt to verify that the burglary alarm signal is not a false alarm.
- C. An alarm company requesting that the police respond to an alarm system activation shall provide the Garden Grove Police Department with available information about the location and nature of the alarm.
- D. An alarm company shall immediately contact the Garden Grove Police Department to cancel a police response following a determination that response is unnecessary.
- E. An alarm company shall provide a list of new and cancelled alarm sites in the format required by the City every thirty (30) days or upon request by the City.

8.60.020: Business License Required for Alarm Companies

- A. It is unlawful for any person, to own, manage, conduct or carry on an alarm business that services, installs, monitors or responds to alarm systems at the protected premises within the City without first obtaining a City of Garden Grove business license and providing the following information at the time of submitting a business license application:
 - 1. Name of business, and if a corporation, limited liability company or limited partnership, its name, date and place of incorporation or registration with the California Secretary of State and address of its principal place of business, together with the name and business telephone number of the owner or manager and a twenty-four-hour emergency contact number; and
 - 2. The Alarm Company Operator number and an alarm company qualified manager's (ACQM) phone number.

8.60.030: Alarm Agent - Registration Required in Possession

Any person acting as or performing the duties of an alarm agent within the city shall carry on his or her person at all times while so engaged a valid registration card issued to him or her by the State Director of Consumer Affairs pursuant to the provisions of Section 7514(g) of the California Business and Professions Code, or any successor statute, and shall display such card to any officer or agent of the City upon request.

8.60.040 Subscriber's (Alarm User's) Permit Required

- A. No person shall operate or cause to be operated an alarm system on any premises for more than ten (10) days after the date of installation without first applying for, and thereafter obtaining and maintaining, an alarm permit therefor in accordance with the provisions of this Chapter.
- B. No alarm permit issued under the provisions of this Chapter shall be assignable or transferable.
- C. Alarm permits issued under the provisions of this Chapter are issued as follows:
 - 1. For businesses, for one (1) calendar year from January 1 to December 31, or from the date after January 1 that the application is submitted and approved to December 31 of the same year.

2. For residences, for three (3) calendar years from January 1 of the first year to December 31 of the third year, or from the date after January 1 of the first year that the application is submitted and approved to December 31 of the third year.

The alarm permit application fee will not be prorated based on the date of application.

- D. A separate alarm permit shall be required for each separate premises or address at which an alarm system is used or installed.
- E. A new alarm permit shall be required for a business whenever there is a change in the business's name, ownership, or location.
- F. For an alarm system installed at a residence, a new alarm permit shall be required whenever the name or identity of the alarm user or subscriber changes, including, but not limited to, where there is a change in ownership of the residence. When there is any change in occupants of a residence with an alarm system who are listed as emergency contacts on the permit application, the holder of the alarm permit shall update the information submitted to the City on his or her application as required under Section 8.60.060.

8.60.050 Permit Procedures – Fee

- A. Applications for permits required under this Chapter shall be filed, together with payment of the alarm permit application fee established by resolution of the City Council, on forms furnished by the Police Department. The application shall include, at a minimum, the following information:
 - 1. The address of the premises where the alarm system is to be located;
 - 2. The name, physical address, mailing address and telephone number of the alarm permit applicant;
 - 3. The name and telephone number of a second person who may be contacted in case of an emergency;
 - 4. The name and telephone number of the person or alarm business who will render service or repairs to the alarm system during any hour of the day or night; and
 - 5. The name, address, and telephone number of the alarm company.
- B. It shall be the responsibility of the permittee to apply for renewal of the permit and pay the alarm permit application fee at least ten (10) days prior to the expiration of any existing permit.

8.60.060: Notice of Changes

Whenever any change occurs relating to any information as required on the permit application form, the applicant or permittee shall give written or electronic notice thereof to the Chief of Police or designee within a reasonable time not to exceed twenty (20) days after such change.

8.60.070: Alarm System Standards

All alarm systems and appurtenant equipment installed on any premises after *[INSERT EFFECTIVE DATE OF ORDINANCE]* shall meet or exceed SIA Control Panel Standard CP-01 or its equivalent. The City reserves the right to inspect all alarm systems subject to all applicable laws, including Code of Civil Procedure Section 1822.50 et seq.

8.60.080: Alarm System User Regulations

- A. Repairs. When any false alarm caused by a malfunction of an alarm system has occurred, the permittee shall cause the alarm system to be repaired to eliminate the malfunction. The alarm system shall be put on "test" status until the required service or repairs have been completed.
- B. Power Supply. Alarm systems shall be supplied with an uninterruptible power supply in such manner that the failure or interruption of normal utility electricity will not activate the alarm system. The power supply must be capable of at least four (4) hours of operation.
- C. Direct Dial Telephone Devices. No person shall install, operate or maintain any alarm system that directly dials any telephone number of the police department, other than a number expressly designated for that purpose.
- D. Panic Alarm. No person shall activate a manual panic alarm unless the person who activates the alarm has a good faith belief, at the time the person activated the alarm, that a crime, attempted crime, or other emergency at the protected premises or protected property that requires law enforcement response is occurring, is about to occur, or has just occurred.
- E. Knowledge of Alarm System. An alarm user shall be knowledgeable of how to use his or her alarm system and be able to communicate with the alarm company upon activation in an effort to cancel false alarms and without delay schedule necessary follow-up service for their alarm system.

8.60.090 Audible Alarm Requirements

Audible residential alarms shall be equipped with an automatic shut-off mechanism capable of terminating the audible annunciator after activation within a maximum of fifteen (15) minutes. Audible business or commercial alarm systems shall be equipped with an automatic shut-off mechanism capable of terminating the audible annunciator after activation within a maximum of thirty (30) minutes.

8.60.100 Exemptions

The provisions of this Chapter are not applicable to:

- 1. Alarm systems installed on property owned, leased, or controlled by municipal, county, state, or federal government agencies or special districts, provided the property is being used for governmental purposes and is not leased or licensed to a third-party for non-governmental use; or
- 2. Audible alarm systems affixed to motor vehicles.

8.60.110 Prohibitions

It is unlawful to install or use an alarm system which, when activated, emits a sound similar to sirens for emergency vehicles or those used for civil defense purposes.

8.60.120: Placement of Alarm System on Non-Response Status

- A. In addition to any other remedies available to the City for violation of any provisions of this Chapter, following reasonable notice to the alarm user, the Chief of Police is authorized to place any silent or audible alarm system on non-response status if he or she determines that:
 - 1. The alarm system has activated seven (7) or more burglary false alarms within any consecutive three hundred sixty-five (365) day period;
 - 2. Immediately following an alarm activation, the alarm user or his designated representative has failed to respond in person to the subject premises within one (1) hour of a request for access to the protected premises, upon request to do so by a police officer or a public safety dispatcher who deems a response is necessary to insure the security of the premises or person(s) where the alarm system is installed; or

- 3. The alarm user has failed to pay any false alarm prevention fee or administrative citation imposed or issued to such user for any violation of this Chapter within the required time.
- B. The Chief of Police shall not place an alarm system on non-response status solely on the basis that an alarm permit has not been obtained.
- C. Should the Chief of Police place the alarm system on non-response status pursuant to this section, notice shall be given by certified mail, postage prepaid, to the permittee and/or alarm user specifying that the Police Department intends to place the location on non-response status and will no longer respond to alarm calls at that location, other than Panic Alarms, until the permittee has taken steps to eliminate or correct the problem(s), has documented the corrective action in writing to the Chief of Police, and has paid all outstanding assessed fees and/or fines.
- D. Upon request of the alarm user or subscriber, the Chief of Police shall remove the alarm system location from non-response status if the Chief of Police determines, in his or her reasonable discretion, (1) that the alarm user has taken reasonable necessary corrective action to remedy or prevent the issues that resulted in placement of the alarm system on non-response status, including, but not limited to, correction of any mechanical problems or defects with the alarm system, replacement of the alarm system with a new alarm system, and/or attendance of one or more False Alarm Prevention Classes, and (2) that all outstanding assessed fees and fines have been paid.

8.60.130: Limitation of Liability

The City is under no obligation or duty to any permittee or any other person by reason of any provision of this Chapter, or the exercise of any privilege of any permittee hereunder, including any delay in transmitting an alarm message to any emergency unit or damage caused by delay in responding, or not responding, to any alarm by any City officer, employee or agent. Issuance of an alarm permit by the City is not intended to, nor will it, create a contract, duty or obligation, either express or implied, of police response. Any liability and consequential damage resulting from the failure to respond to an alarm is hereby disclaimed and governmental immunity as provided by law is retained.

8.60.140 False and Non-Permitted Alarm Fees and Penalties

A. <u>Disconnection of Alarm System</u>. When emergency messages, signals or notices are received by the Police Department, which evidence a failure to comply with the requirements of this Chapter, or a permit issued hereunder, the Chief of Police is authorized to direct that the user or subscriber of the alarm system initiating such alarms, messages, signals, or notices to disconnect the alarm

system until it is made to comply with such requirements. Failure by any person to disconnect an alarm system when directed to do so by the Chief of Police shall constitute a violation of this Section and shall subject such person to criminal and/or administrative citations pursuant to the provisions of this Code.

- B. <u>Fees and Penalties for False and Non-Permitted Alarms.</u>
 - 1. The user or subscriber of any alarm system which has caused any signal, message, or alarm to be transmitted to the Police Department, either by telephone or other communication, or by communication from an alarm agent, or an alarm business, or by a person responding to an alarm, and which is determined by the Chief of Police, in his or her reasonable discretion, to be a false alarm, shall be in violation of this Section and shall pay a false alarm prevention fee in an amount established by resolution of the City Council to offset the cost of personnel, equipment, supplies, and administrative costs incurred by the City in responding to the false alarm and administering this Chapter. The user or subscriber of a burglary alarm system for which there exists a current and valid alarm permit shall only be subject to a false alarm prevention fee for a false alarm if such alarm system has generated two (2) or more false alarms within the prior consecutive three hundred sixty-five (365) day period. The user or subscriber of an alarm system for which a current and valid alarm permit has not been obtained and maintained shall be subject to a false alarm prevention fee upon the occurrence of each false alarm.
 - 2. In addition to the payment of applicable false alarm prevention fees, an alarm user or subscriber shall be subject to issuance of an administrative citation pursuant to Chapter 1.22 of this Code (a) for each false alarm in excess of seven (7) false alarms within consecutive three hundred sixty-five (365) day period, or (b) for each activation of an alarm system, whether false or valid, for which a current and valid permit has not been obtained and maintained.
 - 3. Repeated false alarms from the same alarm system may also result in placement of the alarm system on non-response status pursuant to Section 8.60.120 and/or revocation of a user's alarm permit pursuant to Section 8.60.150.

8.60.145: Alarm User Awareness Class

The Chief of Police will oversee creation and implementation of an Alarm User Awareness Class to educate alarm users about the problems and expense created by excessive false alarms and provide instruction in the proper use and maintenance of alarm systems, protocol for false alarms, and advice on how to reduce false alarms.

Such an Alarm User Awareness Class may be offered in person or online, as determined by the Chief of Police in his or her discretion.

- A. An alarm user may attend any established Alarm User Awareness Class designated by the Chief of Police.
- B. Each alarm user who attends an Alarm User Awareness Class shall be responsible for paying all provider fees associated with the program.
- C. An alarm user who successfully completes an Alarm User Awareness Class shall receive a certificate. The certificate may be used in lieu of one (1) payment for one (1) false alarm prevention fee due as a result of a violation of Section 8.60.140, provided that the certificate is submitted within one (1) year of its issuance. No more than one (1) alarm user per premises or property may use a certificate in lieu of payment of a false alarm prevention fee within a one (1) year period.
- D. An alarm user who receives a certificate for successfully completing an Alarm User Awareness Class provided pursuant to this section is not eligible to receive another such certificate for a period of one (1) year.

8.60.150 Permit Revocation

- A. In addition to any other remedies available to the City for violation of any provisions of this Chapter, following reasonable notice to the alarm user, the Chief of Police is authorized to revoke a previously issued alarm permit if he or she determines that:
 - 1. The alarm user, or his/her employee(s) or agent(s), has knowingly made any false, misleading, or fraudulent statement of a material fact to the Police Department in the permit application or renewal process;
 - 2. Any of the circumstances justifying placement of the alarm system on non-response status pursuant to Section 8.60.120 exist;
 - 3. The alarm user has failed to pay any fees or administrative fines imposed on such user for any violation of this Chapter within the required time; or

4. The alarm user is otherwise in violation of any of the provisions of this Chapter.

B. When an alarm permit is proposed to be revoked, the Chief of Police shall give the permittee at least fifteen (15) days written notice of his or her intention to do so, and the basis for the proposed revocation. A copy of said written notice shall also be provided to the alarm company at the address provided on the

> permit application filed pursuant to Section 8.60.050. Upon failure of the user and/or permittee, within fifteen (15) days of the date of the written notice, to (1) to provide written proof satisfactory to the Chief of Police that the issues or violations serving as the bases for the proposed revocation have been corrected, or (2) to file an appeal to the City Manager pursuant to Section 8.60.155, the permit shall be revoked at the expiration of such fifteen-day period, and the alarm shall not be used until a new permit has been issued pursuant to Section 8.60.190.

8.60.155 Appeal to City Manager

- A. If any user or permittee is aggrieved by any action of the Chief of Police pursuant to the provisions of this Chapter, such person may appeal to the City Manager, or his or her designee, by filing with the City Clerk, a notice of appeal fully setting forth the facts and circumstances regarding the action or determination of the Chief of Police which is the subject of the appeal.
- B. This notice of appeal shall be filed not later than fifteen (15) days after service of a notice of the decision which is to be appealed. Where an appeal has been timely filed with the City Clerk, an order of revocation or any other decision of the Chief of Police pursuant to this Chapter shall be stayed pending a determination of the appeal by the City Manager or his/her designee. The permittee shall be allowed to continue to use the alarm system until the appeal process has been exhausted. The order of revocation shall be effective from its initial date of issuance if the City Manager or his or her designee upholds the revocation decision.
- C. The City Manager or his or her designee shall set a time and place to conduct the appeal hearing and provide notice of such to the appellant at least ten (10) days prior to the hearing. The hearing need not be conducted according to technical judicial rules relating to evidence and witnesses. Any relevant evidence shall be admitted if it is the sort of evidence on which responsible persons are accustomed to rely upon. A copy of the document or instrument providing notice of violation or of the action or determination of the Chief of Police which is the subject of the appeal shall be admitted into evidence as prima facie evidence of the facts stated therein. The decision of the City Manager or his or her designee shall be final.
- D. Failure to timely file a notice of appeal with the City Clerk within fifteen (15) days of the Chief of Police's decision shall constitute a waiver of the appellant's rights to an appeal hearing. If no appeal is filed, the revocation, or other decision of the Chief of Police pursuant to this Chapter shall become final and effective.
- E. All alarm permit application fees paid by permittee shall be forfeited in the event of revocation.

8.60.160: Confidentiality

Except as otherwise required by law, information furnished and secured pursuant to this Chapter shall be confidential in character and shall not be subject to public inspection, and shall be kept so that the contents thereof shall not be known except to persons charged with the administration of this Chapter.

8.60.165: Reserved

8.60.170: Right of Entry

The Chief of Police and his or her designee are authorized to enter upon any property in the city upon which an alarm system has been installed for the purpose of inspection. If permission to enter upon any such property for purposes of inspection is refused, the Chief of Police or his or her designee shall apply to a judge for a warrant authorizing entry upon such property to perform any such inspection.

8.60.175: Administration

The Chief of Police is directed to administer the provisions of this Chapter. The Chief of Police shall have the power and authority to promulgate rules, regulations, and requirements consistent with the provisions of this Chapter and may designate an employee or employees of his or her department to make decisions, investigate, or take any other action permitted or required under this Chapter.

8.60.180 Misdemeanor Complaints

- A. In addition to any administrative, civil, or other fees, fines and/or penalties provided under this Code and/or state law, the operation and activation of any alarm system subsequent to notification of the provisions of this Chapter, and failure to obtain and maintain the permit therefore as required by this Chapter, shall constitute a misdemeanor pursuant to Section 1.04.010 of this Code.
- B. In addition to any administrative, civil, or other fees, fines and/or penalties provided under this Code and/or state law, the operation and activation of any alarm system subsequent to the revocation of an alarm system permit previously issued for such system shall constitute a misdemeanor pursuant to Section 1.04.010 of this Code.

8.60.185: Violation of Chapter

- A. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portion of this Chapter is for any reason held to be invalid or unconstitutional by the decision of any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this Chapter. The City Council declares that it would have adopted this Chapter and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, phrase or portions thereof, irrespective of the fact that any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, phrases or portions might be declared invalid or unconstitutional.
- B. Neither adoption of the ordinance codified in this Chapter nor the repeal hereby of any ordinance shall in any manner affect the prosecution for violation of ordinances, where such violations were committed prior to the effective date of the ordinance codified in this Chapter; nor be construed as affecting any of the provisions of such ordinance relating to the collection of any such license or penalty or the penal provisions applicable to any violation thereof, nor to affect the validity of any bond or cash deposit in lieu thereof, required to be posted, filed or deposited pursuant to any ordinance, and all rights and obligations thereunder appertaining shall continue in full force and effect.
- C. The provisions of this Chapter, insofar as they are substantially the same as existing provisions of this Code relating to the same subject matter, shall be construed as restatements and configurations and not as new enactments.

8.60.190 Re-Issuance of Alarm Permit

- A. After revocation of an alarm permit, or in the case of an alarm system for which a permit has not been obtained that has been placed on non-response status, no new alarm permit shall be issued for the premises until the following requirements are satisfied:
 - 1. Written proof of correction is provided to the Chief of Police;
 - 2. All false alarm fees and/or administrative citations imposed or issued to such user for any violation of this chapter have been satisfied;
 - 3. The alarm system is determined, in the sole discretion of the Chief of Police, to be in an acceptable working order; and
 - 4. A new alarm permit application and the alarm permit application fee are submitted to the City.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

To secure City Council authorization to purchase nine (9) new police patrol vehicles from Wondries Fleet Group through the Sourcewell competitive bid process, Contract #120716.

<u>BACKGROUND</u>

The Police Department has several patrol vehicles that will meet the City's guidelines for replacement in Fiscal Year 2019-20. Experience has shown that the City's buying power is enhanced through joining with other public agencies to purchase police fleet vehicles.

DISCUSSION

Efforts to obtain a quote from a local Ford dealer were unsuccessful, as there are no Ford dealers within the city limits. City staff recommends piggybacking on the results of a recent Sourcewell competitive bid program for police patrol vehicles. The results of this bid process deemed Wondries Fleet group as the lowest responsive bid.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

For City Council to award a contract to Siemens Mobility, Inc. in the amount of \$458,931 to provide professional services for the conversion of all city-owned street lights and safety lights from high pressure sodium (HPS) to light emitting diode (LED), City Project No. 7284, and to authorize the carryover of Fiscal Year 2018-19 General Funds for Engineering capital project expenditures.

BACKGROUND

In November 2016, City Council authorized entering into an agreement with Southern California Edison (SCE) for the conversion of all Edison-owned street lights from HPS to LED. A major incentive of this program was a cash rebate to participating cities. With the successful conversion of approximately 7,000 Edison-owned street lights, the City is now in receipt of a rebate in the amount of \$755,708.

On February 12, 2019, City Council authorized staff to appropriate and set aside funding from this rebate to convert all City-owned street lights and safety lights from HPS to LED in FY 2018-19. Additionally, City Council authorized the remainder of this appropriation to be used for other Public Works Engineering capital projects, specifically for La Bonita Storm Drain Project. Since the projects were not completed by year end FY 2018-19, funds will need to be carried over to FY 2019-

DISCUSSION

Staff recently solicited qualification-based proposals from six consultant firms to provide professional services for the conversion of street and safety lights to LED, including the completion of an inventory of city-owned street lights and safety lights, the procurement of a GIS data file, procurement of shelf stock for street light fixtures, and the delivery of a street light tag identification system.

Of the six firms, three submitted proposals. Staff evaluated each of the proposals and determined that Siemens Mobility, Inc. is the most qualified firm to provide these services. The following is a summary of the ratings:

FINANCIAL IMPACT

Funding for this contract will be covered by SCE rebate funds, which had been appropriated in Fiscal Year 2018-19, and through this City Council action, will be carried over into Fiscal Year 2019-20.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Authorize the Finance Director to carry over \$755,708 in General Funds (Fund 111), which were appropriated in Fiscal Year 2018-19 into Fiscal Year 2019-20 for funding subject project and for completing the La Bonita Storm Drain Project;
- Award a contract to Siemens Mobility, Inc. in the amount of \$458,931 to provide professional services for the conversion of all city-owned street lights and safety lights from high pressure sodium to light emitting diode, City Project No. 7284; and
- Authorize the City Manager to execute the professional services agreement on behalf of the City and to make minor modifications as appropriate.

CONSULTANT AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made this day of 2019, by the CITY OF GARDEN GROVE, a municipal corporation, ("CITY"), and Siemens Mobility, Inc., a California Corporation ("CONSULTANT").

RECITALS

The following recitals are a substantive part of this Agreement:

- 1. This Agreement is entered into pursuant to Garden Grove Council authorization dated _____
- 2. CITY desires to utilize the services of CONSULTANT to provide professional services for the conversion of all city-owned street lights and safety lights from High Pressure Sodium (HPS) to Light Emitting Diode (LED), City Project No. 7284.
- 3. CONSULTANT is qualified by virtue of experience, training, education and expertise to accomplish services.

AGREEMENT

THE PARTIES MUTUALLY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. <u>Term of Agreement</u>: This Agreement shall cover services rendered from date of this Agreement until CONSULTANT completes the services as outlined in CONSULTANT's proposal, Exhibit "A", unless earlier terminated per Section 3.5
- 2. Services to be Provided: The services to be performed by CONSULTANT shall consist of the services as further specified in CONSULTANT'S proposal attached hereto as Exhibit "A" and incorporated herein by reference. CONSULTANT agrees that is provision of Services under this agreement shall be within accepted accordance with customary and usual practices in CONSULTANT'S profession. By executing this Agreement, CONSULTANT warrants that it has carefully considered how the work should be performed and fully understands the facilities, difficulties, and restrictions attending performance of the work under this agreement.
- 3. **<u>Compensation</u>**. CONSULTANT shall be compensated as follows:
 - 3.1 <u>Amount</u>. Compensation under this Agreement shall be per the cost schedule included in CONSULTANT's Proposal.
 - 3.2 <u>Not to Exceed</u>. Compensation under this Agreement shall not exceed \$458,931.00 (Four Hundred Fifty Eight Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty One Dollars), as detailed in Appendix A.

- 3.3 <u>Payment</u>. For work under this Agreement, payment shall be made per monthly invoice. For extra work not a part of this Agreement, a written authorization by CITY will be required.
- 3.4 <u>Records of Expenses</u>. CONSULTANT shall keep complete and accurate records of payroll costs, travel and incidental expenses. These records will be made available at reasonable times to CITY.
- 3.5 <u>Termination</u>. CITY and CONSULTANT shall have the right to terminate this Agreement, without cause, by giving thirty-(30) days written notice of termination to the other party. If CITY terminates the project, then the provisions of paragraph 3 shall apply to that portion of the work completed.

4 Prevailing Wages.

The CITY has been advised that the Prevailing Wages Law applies to the work. CONSULTANT and its subcontractors must be registered with the California Department of Industrial Relations pursuant to Labor Code Section 1725.5. This Agreement shall not be effective until CONSULTANT provides proof of registration to the CITY. CONSULTANT shall be responsible for CONSULTANT'S compliance in all respects with the Prevailing Wage Law, including the payment of the prevailing wage rates to all the laborers involved, and with California Labor Code Section 1770 et seq., including the keeping of all records required by the provisions of Labor Code Section 1776 and the implementing administrative regulations. CONSULTANT shall submit payroll records to the Labor Commissioner pursuant to Labor Code section 1771.4(a)(3) and shall comply with the job site notices posting requirements established by the Labor Commissioner pursuant to Title 8, California Code of Regulations Section 16461(e) or other regulation promulgated pursuant to Labor Code Section 1771.4(a)(2). Pursuant to Labor Code Section 1771.4, this Project is subject to compliance monitoring and enforcement by the California Department of Industrial Relations. The CITY shall be a third party beneficiary of the forgoing covenant with rights to enforce the same as against the CONSULTANT.

5 Surety Bonds

CONSULTANT shall, prior to entering into performance of this Agreement, furnish a performance bond, on the CITY's bond form in the amount of one hundred percent (100%) of the contract price, to guarantee the faithful performance of the work, and a payment bond, on the CITY's form in the amount of one hundred percent (100%) of the contract price, to guarantee payment of all claims for labor and materials furnished. Bonds submitted on any form other than the CITY's form will be rejected. The required bonds shall be from a surety licensed to do business in the State of California and with a current A.M. Best's rating of A-, VII. This Agreement shall not become effective until such bonds are supplied and approved by the CITY.

CONSULTANT shall have **ten (10) working days from the award of the Agreement** to execute the contract and supply the CITY with all the documents and required information, including but not limited to, the necessary bonds and insurance certificates and endorsements.

6 Insurance Requirements

- 6.1 <u>Commencement of Work</u> CONSULTANT shall not commence work under this Agreement until all certificates and endorsements have been received and approved by the CITY. All insurance required by this Agreement shall contain a Statement of Obligation on the part of the carrier to notify the CITY of any material change, cancellation, or termination at least thirty (30) days in advance.
- 6.2 <u>Workers Compensation Insurance</u> For the duration of this Agreement, CONSULTANT and all subcontractors shall maintain Workers Compensation Insurance in the amount and type required by law, if applicable. The insurer shall waive its rights of subrogation against the CITY, its officers, officials, agents, employees, and volunteers.
- 6.3 <u>Insurance Amounts</u> CONSULTANT shall maintain the following insurance for the duration of this Agreement:
 - 6.3.1 Commercial general liability in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence; (claims made and modified occurrence policies are not acceptable); Insurance companies must be admitted and licensed in California and have a Best's Guide Rating of A-, Class VII or better, as approved by the CITY;
 - 6.3.2 Automobile liability in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence; (claims made and modified occurrence policies are not acceptable) Insurance companies must be admitted and licensed in California and have a Best's Guide Rating of A-, Class VII or better, as approved by the CITY.
 - 6.3.3 An Additional Insured Endorsement, **ongoing and completed operations,** for the policy under section 4.3 (a) shall designate CITY, its officers, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers as additional insureds for liability arising out of work or operations performed by or on behalf of the CONSULTANT. CONSULTANT shall provide to CITY proof of insurance and endorsement forms that conform to city's requirements, as approved by the CITY.

An Additional Insured Endorsement for the policy under section 4.3 (b) shall designate CITY, its officers, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers as additional insureds for automobiles owned, lease, hired, or borrowed by CONSULTANT. CONSULTANT shall provide to CITY proof of insurance and

endorsement forms that conform to CITY's requirements, as approved by the CITY.

For any claims related to this Agreement, CONSULTANT's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects to CITY, its officers, officials, employees, agents, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the CITY, its officers, officials, employees, agents, or volunteers shall be excess of the CONSULTANT's insurance and shall not contribute with it.

If CONSULTANT maintains higher insurance limits than the minimums shown above, CONSULTANT shall provide coverage for the higher insurance limits otherwise maintained by the CONSULTANT.

- 7 <u>Non-Liability of Officials and Employees of the CITY</u>. No official or employee of CITY shall be personally liable to CONSULTANT in the event of any default or breach by CITY, or for any amount, which may become due to CONSULTANT.
- 8 <u>Non-Discrimination</u>. CONSULTANT covenants there shall be no discrimination against any person or group due to race, color, creed, religion, sex, marital status, age, handicap, national origin or ancestry, in any activity pursuant to this Agreement.
- 9 Independent Contractor. It is understood and agreed that CONSULTANT, including CONSULTANT's employees, shall act and be independent contractor(s) and not agent(s) or employee(s) of CITY, and that no relationship of employer-employee exists between the parties. CONSULTANT's assigned personnel shall not obtain or be entitled to any rights or benefits that accrue to, or are payable to, CITY employees, and CONSULTANT shall so inform each employee organization and each employee who is hired or retained under this Agreement. CITY is not required to make any deductions or withholdings from the compensation payable to CONSULTANT under the provisions of this Agreement, and is not required to issue W-2 Forms for income and employment tax purposes for any of CONSULTANT's assigned personnel. CONSULTANT hereby expressly assumes all responsibility and liability for the payment of wages and benefits to its assigned personnel, and all related reporting and withholding obligations. CONSULTANT hereby agrees to indemnify and hold CITY harmless from any and all claims or liabilities that CITY may incur arising from any contention by any third party, including, but not limited to, any employee of CONSULTANT or any federal or state agency or other entity, that an employer-employee relationship exists by reason of this Agreement, including, without limitation, claims that CITY is responsible for retirement or other benefits allegedly accruing to CONSULTANT's assigned personnel.
- 10 <u>Compliance With Law</u>. CONSULTANT shall comply with all applicable laws, ordinances, codes and regulations of the federal, state and local government. CONSULTANT shall comply with, and shall be responsible for causing all contractors and subcontractors performing any of the work pursuant to this Agreement, if any, to comply with, all applicable federal and state labor standards, including, to the extent applicable, the prevailing wage requirements promulgated by the Director of Industrial Relations of the State of California Department of Labor. The City makes no warranty or representation concerning whether any of the work performed pursuant to this Agreement constitutes public works subject to the prevailing wage requirements.

- 11 **Disclosure of Documents.** All documents or other information developed or received by CONSULTANT are confidential and shall not be disclosed without authorization by CITY, unless disclosure is required by law.
- 12 <u>Ownership of Work Product</u>. All documents or other information developed or received by CONSULTANT shall be the property of CITY. CONSULTANT shall provide CITY with copies of these items upon demand or upon termination of this Agreement.
- 13 <u>**Conflict of Interest and Reporting.**</u> CONSULTANT shall at all times avoid conflict of interest or appearance of conflict of interest in performance of this Agreement.
- 14 <u>Notices</u>. All notices shall be personally delivered or mailed to the below listed addresses, or to such other addresses as may be designated by written notice. These addresses shall be used for delivery of service of process

- 15 **CONSULTANT'S Proposal.** This Agreement shall include CONSULTANT'S proposal, Exhibit "A" hereto, which shall be incorporated herein. In the event of any inconsistency between the terms of the proposal and this Agreement, this Agreement shall govern.
- 16 **Licenses, Permits and Fees.** At its sole expense, CONSULTANT shall obtain a **Garden Grove Business License**, all permits and licenses as may be required by this Agreement.
- 17 **Familiarity With Work.** By executing this Agreement, CONSULTANT warrants that: (1) it has investigated the work to be performed; (2) it has investigated the site of the work and is aware of all conditions there; and (3) it understands the facilities, difficulties and restrictions of the work under this Agreement. Should CONSULTANT discover any latent or unknown conditions materially differing from those inherent in the work or as represented by CITY, it shall immediately inform CITY of this and shall not proceed, except at CONSULTANT'S risk, until written instructions are received from CITY.

- 18 **<u>Time of Essence</u>**. Time is of the essence in the performance of this Agreement.
- 19 **Limitations Upon Subcontracting and Assignment.** The experience, knowledge, capability and reputation of CONSULTANT, its principals and employees were a substantial inducement for CITY to enter into this Agreement. CONSULTANT shall not contract with any other entity to perform the services required without written approval of the CITY. This Agreement may not be assigned voluntarily or by operation of law, without the prior written approval of CITY. If CONSULTANT is permitted to subcontract any part of this Agreement, CONSULTANT shall be responsible to CITY for the acts and omissions of its subcontractor as it is for persons directly employed. Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create any contractual relationship between any subcontractor and CITY. All persons engaged in the work will be considered employees of CONSULTANT. CITY will deal directly with and will make all payments to CONSULTANT.
- 20 **Authority to Execute.** The persons executing this Agreement on behalf of the parties warrant that they are duly authorized to execute this Agreement and that by executing this Agreement, the parties are formally bound.
- 21 **Indemnification.** To the fullest extent permitted by law, CONSULTANT agrees to protect, defend, and hold harmless CITY and its elective or appointive boards, officers, agents, and employees from any and all claims, liabilities, expenses, or damages of any nature, including attorneys' fees, for injury or death of any person, or damages of any nature, including interference with use of property, arising out of, or in any way connected with the negligence, recklessness and/or intentional wrongful conduct of CONSULTANT, CONSULTANT'S agents, officers, employees, subcontractors, or independent contractors hired by CONSULTANT in the performance of the Agreement. The only exception to CONSULTANT'S responsibility to protect, defend, and hold harmless CITY, is due to the active negligence, recklessness and/or wrongful conduct of CITY, or any of its elective or appointive boards, officers, agents, or employees.

This hold harmless agreement shall apply to all liability regardless of whether any insurance policies are applicable. The policy limits do not act as a limitation upon the amount of indemnification to be provided by CONSULTANT.

- 22 **Modification**. This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes any previous agreements, oral or written. This Agreement may be modified only by subsequent mutual written agreement executed by CITY and CONSULTANT.
- 23 **Waiver.** All waivers of the provisions of this Agreement must be in writing by the appropriate authorities of the CITY and CONSULTANT.

- 24 <u>**California Law.**</u> This Agreement shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California. Any action commenced about this Agreement shall be filed in the central branch of the Orange County Superior Court.
- 25 **Interpretation**. This Agreement shall be interpreted as though prepared by both parties
- 26 **Preservation of Agreement.** Should any provision of this Agreement be found invalid or unenforceable, the decision shall affect only the provision interpreted, and all remaining provisions shall remain enforceable.

Appendix A

APPENDIX A- Scope and Price Schedule

GIS Field Audit of City Owned Streetlights

Siemens will provide field inspection of the City-owned streetlights that are HPSV included in the St Lighting Inventory List_2019.xlsx provided by the City. This includes assessing all available system data provided by the City and Southern California Edison (SCE), having a GIS technician visit each streetlight and document associated attributes, and creating a database of all streetlight poles identified in the field. The attributes to be collected are:

Fixture quantities

Pole material type

- Pole condition (Good, Fair, Poor)
- Pole location (nearest street address)
- Fixture TypeFixture Wattage
- Pole location (latitude and longitude)
- Mast arm length

Siemens will then take the data collected and reconcile with the available SCE billing data. In addition, once the quantities of fixtures are identified then the appropriate materials will be ordered.

LED Conversion, Pole tag installation and fuse inspection

Siemens will provide LED conversion services of the fixtures selected and approved by the City. Once the quantity of material has been selected, Siemens will purchase and install the LED fixtures with Siemens technicians. During the fixture installation Siemens staff will affix a City approved pole tag to the streetlight poles identified by the City and will update the database.

In addition, during the LED fixture installation, Siemens technicians will inspect each streetlight pole and determine if an in-line fuse is present and if it is in good condition. If there are no fuses present, then the appropriate fuses and fuse holders will be installed during the inspection.

For the fixtures located in the underpasses, Siemens is relying on the information provided by the City for the quantity of fixtures to be installed and the location of these fixtures. In addition, existing fixture controls will be utilized, and third party bird spikes will be applied to the fixtures during fixture installation.

For the fixtures located in the 12926 Main St. parking lot, Siemens is relying on the information provided by the City for the quantity of fixtures to be installed. In addition, existing fixture controls will be utilized.

The schedule of values in Table 1 below represents the total cost for LED conversion services, inclusive of labor, material, equipment, sales tax and overhead.

It should be noted that currently the LED fixture market is volatile due to import tariff uncertainty, with anticipated price fluctuations to occur in the near future. Should the material be ordered more than 30 days from contract execution then additional costs may apply.

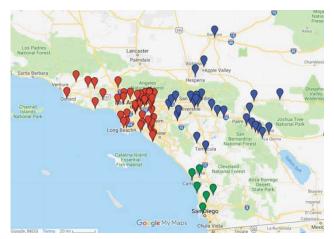

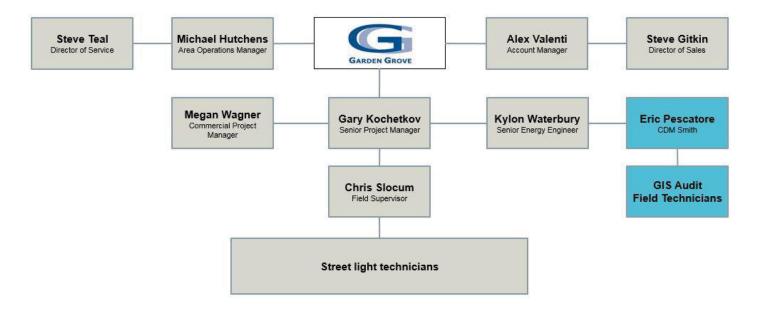


AUDIT SUBCONTRACTOR

CDM Smith will be our subcontractor for the audit portion of this project. During the Audit Phase, CDM Smith will visit each city-owned streetlight and document the associated attributes and GIS coordinates. The Siemens-CDM Smith partnership is not a new collaboration; recently Siemens and CDM Smith have worked together on streetlight LED conversion projects for the City of Huntington Beach and dozens of other communities in the United States. Siemens and CDM Smith have a proven track record of working well together supporting the goals of the communities they have served. CDM Smith has developed a customized, cloud-based ArcGIS online (AGO) program that gives accurate information of the city's current streetlight system and fixtures and is updated in real time by field personnel during auditing and retrofitting work.

CDM Smith is a global water, environment, transportation, energy and facilities firm helping public and private clients improve the environment and infrastructure- with eight offices in California. Founded in 1947 as a three-person firm, the company has grown and diversified into a multidisciplinary staff of 5,000. CDM Smith's project office for this effort would be located in nearby Los Angeles. SIEMENS Ingenuity for life PROJECT APPROACH

A streetlight conversion project, at its most basic, is straightforward: convert existing lights to more efficient LED fixtures. The process is very similar across our territory and across the country. However, there are several detailed steps that must take place to ensure a successful project, as detailed in this section.

PHASE 1- GIS FIELD AUDIT OF CITY OWNED STREETLIGHTS

Siemens will conduct a field audit of the City owned streetlight poles to verify and document the location and attributes of each streetlight. This will result in a final inventory of City owned streetlights to be converted.

The following is a step-by-step overview of the audit process:

- Our audit team will review the available SCE inventory information provided by the city and create a baseline inventory. Our approach will be to create a base layer of the SCE owned LS-1 lights and then perform the field audit of all other lights in the City right-of-way, to ensure all City-owned streetlights are inventoried. It is our experience that there are significant discrepancies in the SCE data and this is the opportunity for the City to establish accurate data.
- 2. In addition, the Siemens team will coordinate with City staff to understand if there are any specific Home Owners Associations (HOA's) or other areas located in the City that may be excluded from this effort. Proper planning at this phase reduces confusion later in the program.
- 3. Once a baseline inventory is finalized, a field verification will be completed by CDM Smith. This survey will include several teams of individuals in order to complete the data collection effort as scheduled.
- 4. Once CDM Smith has completed their field work, Siemens performs a quality check and an audit report is generated, detailing the results of the field work.
- 5. Siemens then compares this data with the information from the SCE inventory and creates an updated list of fixtures to be converted. We will then have a review meeting with City staff to finalize the scope of work and develop an implementation plan.

CDM Smith has a great deal of experience nationally as well as in California. They will staff their audit teams to accurately complete the work in the timeframe that the City requires. We anticipate that the audit will take 2 weeks for the City of Garden Grove.

ATTRIBUTE INFORMATION

During the field audit many attributes will be collected for each streetlight. Below is an example of some of the data collected during the audit and incorporated into the database:

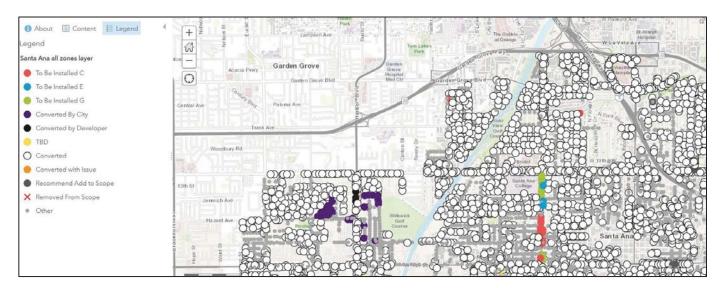
- Fixture quantities
- Pole location (street address)
- Pole location (latitude and longitude)
- Pole material type
- Pole condition (Good, Fair, Poor)¹
- Fixture Type
- Fixture Wattage
- Mast arm length

¹ Any pole that is deemed poor will have a detailed description of issues identified and pictures documented. Any conditions that would be considered dangerous to the public will be reported to the City immediately.

GIS MAPPING

We have used GIS mapping in all of our most recent projects, and our customers would report that GIS mapping has been a key component to the successful execution of the project and the maintenance to follow. The map below is from our current project in neighboring Santa Ana. The GIS mapping is used in order to:

- 1. Reconcile the SCE billing inventory to actual field conditions,
- 2. Create a tool for tracking the audit,
- 3. Expedite installations by clearly displaying fixtures converted/not converted, and
- 4. Provide the customer with a future asset management tool at the end of the project



SCOPE OF WORK FINALIZATION

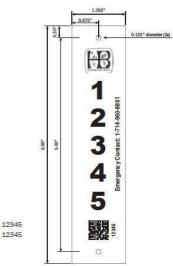
With the completion of the field audit, Siemens will conduct a meeting with City staff to finalize the scope and develop the bill of materials. This will include a detailed review of the data collected, utilizing the mapping tool, where Siemens and City staff will collaborate on reviewing the entire City. Siemens will then develop a final scope of work document, containing the executable scope items, reporting documentation and a final project schedule, including implementation and completion phases.

Siemens has experienced installing all of the major LED fixtures, including Leotek and GE, and can provide input on the design of the LED streetlight system at no additional cost to the City.

POLE TAGS

Siemens has designed a prototype pole tag concept that can be affixed to all pole types throughout the City. The pole tag is a thin anodized aluminum utility tag that can be configured with many different characters. Siemens will work with the City to determine the most appropriate numbering convention. This option allows for full customization including any alpha-numeric combination, logos, emergency numbers and more. An example tag design is shown here.

Siemens will affix the pole tags on all City-owned poles (except the safety lights) during the LED conversion. During the pole tagging process an asset database will be created that will incorporate the new asset ID numbers. This database will allow Siemens and City staff to access asset location, attributes, maintenance related activities, as well as, allow members of the community



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PHASE 2- LED INSTALLATION

Siemens will develop a City specific project plan which will include pre-construction meetings, staging of material, installation and maintenance activities. Before any work begins, Siemens Project Manager will confer with City staff and finalize the plan to ensure it fits the City's needs.

Siemens assumes that four in-person meetings will be needed and that there will be periodic progress calls throughout the program. The in-person meetings will be a project kick off, audit and design review, LED conversion pre-construction meeting and a project close out meeting. Any additional meetings will be welcomed, should the City require them.

Siemens will have a dedicated field supervisor, project manager, commercial project manager, project coordinator, and warehouse staff to support the project. Siemens staff will use Microsoft Project to track the overall progress of the project and to create overview progress reports, as well as mobile technology that will track progress in real time through the use of tablets in the field.

Siemens' Project Manager will staff work crews as necessary to adhere to schedule requirements to ensure that any delays related to fixture delivery or weather events are minimized. Again, a critical component of this effort is to communicate project status on a weekly basis. All LED installation work shall be performed by IBEW Licensed Electricians with IMSA Roadway Lighting Level I certification (or other certifications as required), and all installation work shall be paid at prevailing wage rates.

All LED installation work shall be performed in accordance with NEC, NESC and OSHA provisions, and exclusively by individuals certified by OHSA as a "Qualified Electrical Worker" or any other requirement imposed by the electric utility. Siemens staff will perform work in the right-of-way establishing traffic control measures per the MUTCD guidelines.

Installation progress will be tracked daily by the project's Field Supervisor and Project Manager, and a brief status report that includes project status and any current issues will be provided to the City on a weekly basis, Project team meetings will be held on a regular basis as determined by the City and Siemens. These meetings will include the Siemens' project management



staff, Siemens' field supervisor, and City staff. In addition to progress reports, these meetings will ensure that the project is on schedule, any issues are being addressed, the work is being done safely and to the satisfaction of all stakeholders.

Quality control will be a top priority during the implementation phase of the project. The Siemens project manager and field supervisor will routinely visit the field to perform quality control and identify opportunities for improvement. Siemens staff will routinely perform internal project audits and reviews to ensure the project is being executed correctly and efficiently. In addition, Siemens project management and supervisory staff will communicate on a regular basis with City staff and City existing street light maintenance contractor in relation to any issues found in the field that require attention.

Throughout the implementation phase, status data will be recorded, in real time, through the use of mobile devices. This will allow for access to real-time project data for both Siemens and Garden Grove. Below is a sample from a recent project of the web-based dashboard that the City can use to monitor project status:

Following the completion of the conversion, Siemens will self-audit the project, and then work with the City on final project inspection and acceptance, at which time any punch list items will be addressed, and the warranty period will begin.

Removal and Disposal

All materials removed that can be recycled will be recycled appropriately. Resulting hazardous waste and general refuse will be handled in accordance with all applicable regulations and best practices.

Siemens will be responsible for the removal and disposal of existing luminaire heads and any other discarded materials as part of the California Recycle and Disposal Laws. Any hazardous materials including universal waste will be discarded according to the provisions set forth in California law.

SCE Billing Adjustments

Siemens will complete the necessary documentation to process the billing adjustment. Siemens will submit this information to SCE to enable them to update the LS-2b HPS tariff to the appropriate LED rate. This step is completed once the LED fixtures have been installed. It typically takes SCE 30-90 days to update the bills, back dated to the date of LED installation.

Project Completion

Once the billing is verified then a final project closeout report will be generated. This will consist of a complete inventory database of the installed system with GIS locations and attributes of the LED street light system.

Record Documents

Siemens will provide a comprehensive summary report of the project that includes (but is not limited to) the following:

- Final Installation Data
- Summary of inventory, including fixture quantities, wattages, and installation dates
- A summary of any scope changes that occurred

Warranty

Siemens' provides a 12-month workmanship warranty on all labor and materials, post-substantial completion, as standard practice. After the one-year workmanship warranty expires, Siemens will pass through to the City all manufacturers' warranties if there is no long-term maintenance contract in place.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

For the City Council to adopt the attached resolution establishing the City of Garden Grove Pension Funding Policy.

BACKGROUND

With the adoption of City of Garden Grove Fiscal Year 2019-21 biennial budget on June 25, 2019, the City Council asked staff to formulate a policy to effectively address the City's unfunded pension liability for the purpose of strengthening the City's financial sustainability.

The City of Garden Grove's pensions are pre-funded, as opposed to pay-as-you-go retirement systems like Social Security. In pre-funded systems, the employer and employee make contributions into a pension trust each year, over the course of an employee's working life. The money in the trust are invested and earnings together with contributions accumulate in the trust account.

The City contracts with the California Public Employee Retirement System (CalPERS) as an investment and administrative agent for the City's pension plans. In the most recent Annual Review of Funding Levels and Risks published by CalPERS in November 2018, the average funded status of public agency miscellaneous and safety plans based on June 30, 2017 funding valuations were 72.7% and 69.4% respectively. However, the funded status of the City's miscellaneous and safety plans for the same period were 70.1% and 65.0% respectively, considerably lower than the state average. This is concerning as the unfunded pension liability has a direct and significant impact on the City's CalPERS contribution rate. In other words, the greater the City's unfunded pension liability, the higher the City's required contribution rate and related payment obligation.

In 2018, the League of California Cities issued its findings from a recent Retirement

System Sustainability Study (the 2018 League Study). The first finding stated "rising pension costs will require cities over the next seven years to nearly double the percentage of their General Fund dollars they pay to CalPERS." For Garden Grove, we have budgeted \$22.4 million for CalPERS contribution for FY2019-20 in the General Fund.

The City is determined to proactively address the unfunded pension liability before the growing costs further threaten the City's fiscal sustainability. The initial step is to develop a pension funding policy. The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) recommends government employers that provide defined benefit pensions create a funding policy that establishes the government's commitment to fund benefit obligations based on regular actuarial valuations, and through a systematic and disciplined manner to accumulate resources for future payments, thereby avoiding the transfer of costs into the future.

DISCUSSION

The intent of the City of Garden Grove Pension Funding Policy (the Policy) is to establish a formal methodology for financing the current and future pension liabilities. The purpose of the methodology is to ensure that current assets plus future contributions from both employees and employer, as well as investment earnings will be sufficient to finance all defined pension obligations provided in the City's plan documents. The Policy is intended to reflect a reasonable and fiscally conservative approach with intergenerational equity.

Following the best practices for sustaining defined benefit pension plans, the Policy requires paying down unfunded liability or stabilizing future contribution rates, considering full pension costs when making hiring decisions, applying Actuarially Determined Contribution (ADC) as the basis for annual contribution, contributing 100% of the ADC, and prohibiting any pension benefit increases until funded status reaches 100%.

The 2018 League Study provided six options for California cities to address the growing unfunded pension liability, including:

1. Pay down unfunded liability by shortening amortization period or contributing additional funds above the ADC.

Staff observation:

Under this option, the City would contribute funds directly to CalPERS. All additional contributions would be subject to the same investment strategies applicable to existing plan assets. Therefore, funds contributed to CalPERS could not be applied to future ADC's.

2. Consider local ballot measures to enhance revenues.

Staff observation:

Voter approved the passage of Measure O in November 2018.

3. Create a Pension Rate Stabilization Program by establishing an IRC Section 115

Trust Fund.

Staff observation:

IRC Section 115 Trusts are irrevocable trust accounts that can be used by local governments to fund pension contributions and liabilities. Recent statistics show that over 150 cities and counties use IRC Section 115 Trust as a rate stabilization vehicle.

Trustee of the IRC Section 115 Trust is not CalPERS, the investment of trust assets are not subject to CalPERS investment policies and thus diversifies the investment. The funds in the trust can only be used for pension related costs. The City would retain full control over the funds, subject to investment options offered by trustee. Funds could be used to offset spikes in employer contributions, making this a desirable option for the City.

4. Change service delivery methods and levels of certain public services.

Staff observation:

The City has contracted certain services and reduced the levels of some services in past years to battle a structural deficit. This approach would contradict the City Council's goal to maintain and enhance our service levels on critical services such as public safety.

5 . Use procedures and transparent bargaining to increase employee pension contributions.

Staff observation:

The City has negotiated with certain bargaining groups and increased employee contributions in the past.

6. Issue Pension Obligation Bonds (POB).

Staff observation:

This approach is not recommended as it only delays and compounds the financial impact of unfunded pension liability. Financial experts including the GFOA strongly discourage local agencies from issuing POB's.

The proposed Policy does not preclude any of the six options discussed above. However, in comparing all six options, Option 3, creating a pension rate stabilization program by establishing an IRC Section 115 Trust Fund is more desirable, as it commits the City to allocate additional funding to reduce its pension liability, yet provides flexibility for smoothing out the required employer contribution when significant rate increase occurs. This option also allows diversification on investment thus reduces the risk due to market fluctuation. In order to implement the pension rate stabilization program through IRC Section 115 Trust, direction is needed on plan funding.

Effective Fiscal Year 2019-20, the City started pre-paying its annual Unfunded Actuarial Liability (UAL). This is an option provided by CalPERS. By prepaying the UAL, cash flow savings can be realized. Based on the June 30, 2017 CalPERS actuarial valuation, cash flow savings for the Miscellaneous Plan is \$256,092, and

\$417,067 for the City's Safety Plan, with a total of \$673,159 for Fiscal Year 2019-20. Staff is recommending investing these funds into the respective plans through IRC Section 115 Trust. Staff also recommends the City commit a certain percentage of the General Fund surplus each year to be invested in pension pay down or rate stabilization. Staff will bring a General Fund Reserve Policy to the City Council for consideration in December 2019, the reserve policy will discuss the possible additional contribution towards unfunded pension liability from the General Fund's operating surplus.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no cost to approve the proposed City of Garden Grove Pension Funding Policy. However, a total of \$673,159 is requested to be redirected for the implementation of the proposed Policy. These funds are currently appropriated as personnel costs in the Fiscal Year 2019-20 Adopted Budget. By prepaying the CalPERS UAL, the City will realize a cash flow savings of \$673,159 based on CalPERS valuation report. Minimum costs associated with the IRC Section 115 trust plan administration will be absorbed by investment earnings generated by the assets within the trust accounts.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that the City Council:

- Adopt the attached resolution establishing the City of Garden Grove Pension Funding Policy;

- Approve an appropriation of \$673,159 from the cash flow savings resulting from the prepayment of the Fiscal Year 2019-20 UAL to be invested in the IRC Section 115 Trust accounts.

WHEREAS, the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) recommends that government employers that provide defined benefit pensions create a funding policy that establishes the government's commitment to fund benefit obligations based on regular actuarial valuations, and through a systematic and disciplined manner to accumulate resources for future payments, thereby avoiding the transfer of costs into the future.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council of the City of Garden Grove does hereby approve and establish the City of Garden Grove Pension Funding Policy attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.

<u>PURPOSE</u>: To establish a systematic and disciplined method to accumulate resources to be used towards funding pension liability and future benefit payments, and to provide reasonable assurance that the cost of pension benefits will be funded in an equitable and sustainable manner.

POLICY:

- 1. The City shall establish a plan to pay down its pension liabilities and/or stabilize future contribution rates.
- 2. Pension fund contributions shall have the same budget priority as other personnel costs such as salaries and benefits.
- 3. Actuarially Determined Contribution (ADC) shall be obtained annually and serve as the basis for pension fund contributions to the respective plans.
- 4. The ADC should be calculated in a manner that fully funds the long-term costs of promised benefits, while balancing the goals of:
 - a. Keeping contributions relatively stable; and
 - b. Equitably allocating the costs over the employees' period of active service.
- 5. The City shall continue to contribute a minimum of 100% of the ADC annually to the respective plans.
- 6. Changes in net pension liabilities, each plan's funded status, and other related ratios shall be communicated to the public annually through the publication of the City's Comprehensive Annual Financial Report.
- 7. Pension benefit increases that require a CalPERS contract amendment should not be recommended nor approved until the pension plan reaches 100% funded status.

<u>OBJECTIVE</u>

To provide the City Council with an update on the annual City Council budget appropriation practices of neighboring cities in Orange County with district elections and potential district budget allocations within the City's adopted budget.

BACKGROUND

At the July 9, 2019, City Council meeting, the Garden Grove City Council discussed the idea of implementing an annual City Council budget appropriation whereby each council member, including the mayor, could be allotted a set amount of dollars to utilize within their respective districts or citywide. Along these lines, the City Council directed staff to survey cities in Orange County to determine if any cities with districts provide each of their city council members with an annual budget appropriation. For those district cities with budget appropriations, the City Council requested that staff research the annually appropriated dollar amount, past and present uses of the funds, oversight practices, and funding sources.

DISCUSSION

City staff surveyed each of the 34 incorporated cities in Orange County and ultimately learned that 15 of the 34 cities have districts while 19 do not. Of those 15 cities, only three currently provide each of their city council members with some sort of set annual budget appropriation for use in the community. Santa Ana, Seal Beach, and Newport Beach each appropriate annual budgets for their city council members, ranging from \$6,000 to \$20,000 (see table). The remaining 12 cities with districts

either did not have a set annual budget appropriation for each council member or were still in the process of transitioning to district elections. In fact, six of the 15 district cities in Orange County have only partially transitioned to district elections with transitions expected to be complete by the 2020 and 2022 November elections (see table).

Additionally, staff's survey of the Orange County cities showed that most cities, whether district cities or not, already have an established council account or operations budget to support city council administrative staff, travel and training expenses, as well as other reoccurring council costs. For example, the City of Anaheim allocates approximately \$72,000 annually for each of its council members to use solely for hiring administrative labor support and aides. Like Garden Grove, other cities including Costa Mesa and Dana Point also have sponsorship and discretionary funds that are shared by the entire city council. However, only Santa Ana, Seal Beach, and Newport Beach currently have individual budget appropriations for each city council member to use on an annual basis.

City of Santa Ana (6 Districts - \$10,000)

The City of Santa Ana's Special Event Sponsorship Program provides the mayor and city council the opportunity to allocate sponsorship funding up to \$10,000 per fiscal year (contingent upon annual City Budget approval), for special events conducted by qualified nonprofit organizations or City-recognized neighborhood associations. City council members may utilize these general fund monies anywhere in the city (not just in their respective districts) with oversight from the City Manager's Office. In the past, council members have used these funds to sponsor student fashion shows, assist with high school football fundraisers, support Planned Parenthood marches, and sponsor grand opening ceremonies for nonprofit organizations. Any unexpended dollars are NOT carried over into the next fiscal year budget. The Santa Ana City Council also has a separate \$14,000 allocation annually for community events and neighborhood projects.

City of Seal Beach (5 Districts - \$20,000)

The City of Seal Beach provides each of the city council members and the mayor with an annual budget of \$20,000. City council members may utilize these general fund monies anywhere in the city (not just in their respective districts) with oversight from the City Manager's Office. City council members have used these funds to pay for Main Street aesthetic improvements, plant trees, donate to general care centers for kitchen upgrades, and improve park equipment (shade structures and playgrounds). Unlike Santa Ana, however, Seal Beach allows for unexpended dollars to be carried over into the next fiscal year budget if it is being utilized for an ongoing project or purpose.

City of Newport Beach (7 Districts - \$6,000)

The City of Newport Beach's District Discretionary Grant Account allows the city council to direct revenue towards worthy projects or programs which the city council deems beneficial to Newport Beach residents' quality of life. The city council sets the annual allocation amount for the District Discretionary Grant Account during the budget process and all city council members, including the mayor, receive the same

budget allocation. Expenses must have an "identifiable public benefit" and must align with the city council's priority of focusing on local groups within Newport Beach, regional groups in Orange County, and more broadly, other groups in California that benefit Newport Beach residents. In the past, council members have used these funds to sponsor the annual Balboa Island Improvement Association parade, support the Bayside Village HOA parade, and donate to the Boys & Girls Club. Any unencumbered funds are deposited in the General Fund Reserve Account and expenditures are reported to the city council annually.

City of Garden Grove

The City of Garden Grove maintains a City Council Contingency account, which contains \$41,365 that can be used at the City Council's discretion for projects or needs that may come up during the year and are not separately budgeted. These funds can potentially be allocated proportionally for use by council members within each district as well as by the mayor citywide.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

There is no additional financial impact should the City Council wish to implement district budget allocations within the City's Council Contingency account.

RECOMMENDATION

Should an allocation of the City Council Contingency account be considered, it would equate to approximately \$5,000 for each council member and the mayor. The remaining \$6,365 in the account would still be available for use at the Council's discretion. It is recommended that all purchasing policies and practices currently in place be adhered to and that the expenditures be administered through the City Manager's office. Periodic reporting could be shared through the City Manager's Weekly Memo to the City Council. It is recommended that the City Council consider this report and provide direction to staff.
